Problem # 3: Telling The Truth About Chemical Abortions

While some states have advanced significant restrictions on surgical abortions since Roe was reversed last summer, the push to expand chemical abortion is stronger than ever. In the past decade, the number of chemical abortions has skyrocketed by 120%. Estimates are that chemical abortions account for over 50% of all abortions.

Proponents argue that chemical abortions are safe, but nothing could be further from the truth. When used for an abortion, the drug mifepristone starves a child of nutrients by blocking progesterone, the primary hormone that attaches the embryonic child to the uterine lining, which is the baby's primary source of nutrition.

Chemical abortion also harms mothers. One study based on robust data from Finland's healthcare system found that one in five women had an adverse event after mifepristone. It also found that the rates of complication were four times higher with chemical abortion than surgical abortion.

If we are to love those in unexpected pregnancies, we must tell the truth about chemical abortions.

Problem # 7: Marijuana And Pregnancy

Despite advocates' claims that marijuana use is harmless, another study indicates otherwise. Apparently, the number of hospital visits for pregnant women has almost doubled in Ontario since Canada legalized recreational marijuana in 2018. Of those visits that were marijuana related, the majority were emergency room visits.

According to lead researcher Dr. Daniel Myran, although marijuana-related incidents were only a fraction of overall visits, almost all of them were serious. And according to other research, babies born to marijuana-using mothers are more likely to be born prematurely, have lower birth weights, and be admitted to neonatal care units. Exactly how marijuana harms preborn children will require additional research, but the clear risks are reason enough to recommend that pregnant moms avoid using marijuana altogether.

This is another contradiction to the narrative peddled to us for years. Recreational marijuana use is simply not as safe as we are told it was.
