
WKXA News Director Matt Demczyk has noted the following as significant issues during the October 1st – December 31st 2020 time period:

Subject: Circle K Robbed

News Broadcasts: 12/9

The Findlay Police Department says the Circle K at 100 Crystal Avenue was robbed by a man with a gun. Police say a man entered the store and asked the clerk for assistance with cigarettes. As the clerk was assisting the man, police say the man ordered the clerk to give him all of a certain brand of cigarettes and all the money in cash register. Police say the suspect pulled a small gun halfway out of his hoodie pocket during the robbery. The suspect fled on foot northbound through an alley behind the store.

Subject: Columbus Grove Fire

News Broadcasts: 11/23

Authorities are investigating a fire in Columbus Grove that destroyed four businesses. The Putnam County Sheriff's office says a call came in about a fire on north high street. The fire then spread west to the 100 block of west sycamore. The businesses that were destroyed were small, family-owned businesses right in the heart of town. A GoFundMe page has been set up to raise money to help the businesses.

Subject: Five More COVID Deaths

News Broadcasts: 12/30

Five more Hancock County residents died of COVID-19 in the past week. The Wednesday numbers from Hancock Public Health show that there have now been 81 deaths from the virus, an increase of five from last Wednesday. Active cases dropped from 402 on December 23rd to 272 on December 30th. On Wednesday, 26 people in Hancock County were hospitalized from the virus, a drop of 12 from last Wednesday. Statewide, there have been more than 690,000 cases and more than 8,800 deaths during the pandemic.

Subject: Cross Likely Has COVID

News Broadcasts: 12/17

State Representative Jon Cross (R-Kenton) is isolating and awaiting the results of a COVID test.

Cross says his wife has tested positive and he likely has it also.

Cross says he's had mild symptoms of a light fever, body aches, fatigue and he lost his sense of smell.

Cross has been very critical of the governor's handling of the pandemic, in particular business closures and curfews. He tells WFIN News that his bout with COVID won't change his stance at all.

Subject: FCS Partial Remote Schedule

News Broadcasts: 11/29

Findlay City Schools is moving to a fully remote learning schedule for grades 6-12.

K-5 will remain in their current 2-day per week hybrid model. This change will go into effect on November 30th and last at least until January 11th. "While we know remote learning is not optimal, we are working hard to ensure a smooth transition for all students," said Superintendent Troy Roth.

In a school board meeting Monday night he stated the reason for the change is because they are having trouble finding enough substitute teachers.

Traffic on Interstate 75 in Findlay was brought to a standstill thanks to several fires along the roadway.

The fires started at around 4 p.m. along the southbound lanes just south of Findlay.

The fires sent smoke across the interstate, making it difficult for drivers to see.

The Ohio State Highway Patrol responded and shut down the southbound lanes.

Subject: First COVID Vaccines Administered

Hancock County EMS personnel were the first people in the county to receive the COVID-19 vaccine at a clinic in Findlay on Friday morning. "We got the people that are taking care of us going first, just to show everybody the faith they have in the vaccine," said Health Commissioner Karim Baroudi. Baroudi says these first doses of vaccine will be administered to healthcare workers, first responders and those at the greatest risk of severe illness. He expects the vaccine to be available to the general public sometime in March.

Subject: Interstate 75 Incident

A person was taken to Blanchard Valley Hospital after suffering a self-inflicted gunshot wound on the side of Interstate 75 north of Findlay. The driver eventually pulled to the side of the interstate a little north of State Route 613 and that's where they suffered a self-inflicted gunshot wound. After firing the shot, the individual surrendered without further incident and was taken to Blanchard Valley Hospital. The sheriff's office describes the wound as not life-threatening.

Subject: Leipsic Business Destroyed In Fire

A man is facing charges in connection with the shooting death of a Findlay man nearly three years ago. A Hancock County Grand Jury has indicted Jayden M. Edwards on charges of Complicity to Aggravated Murder, Complicity to Aggravated Robbery and Complicity to Aggravated Burglary. Prosecutors say the 24 year old Edwards was heavily involved in the shooting death of 56-year-old Jeffery Gary at an address on Fox Street in Findlay on February 11th, 2018. Edwards is currently serving time at North Central Correctional Institution in Marion on a separate aggravated robbery case.

Subject: Pedestrian Hit By Car

A pedestrian was struck by a car in a downtown Findlay intersection on Tuesday afternoon. It happened at 12:23 p.m. Tuesday at the intersection of South Main Street and East Sandusky Street. The Findlay Police Department says Dorothy A. Jones, 72, of Findlay, was walking across South Main Street in the crosswalk on the north side of the intersection when she was hit by a car that was turning from West Sandusky Street onto South Main Street to go northbound.

Subject: Putnam County Highest COVID Rate

News Broadcasts: 10/27

Putnam County has the highest COVID-19 rate in the state based on population by a wide margin. Data from the Ohio Department of Health shows Putnam County has had 294 cases over the last two weeks, leading to a rate of 868.3 cases per 100,000 people. Putnam County's population is 33,861. Putnam County has had a total of 1,156 cases and 27 deaths.

A man is facing charges after allegedly leading authorities on a pursuit with his young child in the vehicle. The Putnam County Sheriff's Office says it responded to 212 North High Street in Columbus Grove to investigate an incident that was reported as a kidnapping. The sheriff's office says they learned that Michael B. Strykul, 52, and Dorothy A. Selhorst, 43, have a 4-year-old child and that Michael took the child during an argument with Dorothy. Deputies say they tried to stop Michael's vehicle and a pursuit ensued that later ended in Lima after his vehicle was disabled from stop sticks. The sheriff's office says the child was okay and was returned to its mother.

Subject: Som Carryout Robbed

A clerk told police the suspect waved a gun in her face as he robbed her convenience store in Findlay. It happened at Som Carry Out at 825 North Main Street at around 9:30 Wednesday night. Police say the suspect went to pay for a drink and asked for four packs of cigarettes. The clerk asked if he needed anything else and that's when he instructed the clerk to give him all the money in the cash register. The clerk said, when she didn't comply immediately, the suspect pulled a gun and began waving it. The clerk gave the suspect the money and he fled southbound from the store. Officers checked the area with a K9 but the suspect was not located.

Subject: Pedestrian Hit and Killed

The Ohio State Highway Patrol says a pedestrian was killed in a hit and run crash in Seneca County. The crash happened on State Route 53 in Pleasant Township, north of Tiffin. The highway patrol says Amanda Borer, 35, of Tiffin, entered State Route 53 from the west chasing after the family dog. The patrol says Borer was struck by a northbound car being driven by Carrie M. Conner, 33, of Tiffin. Investigators say Conner fled the scene and her car was located at a residence in Seneca County on Tuesday but her whereabouts are unknown. She is wanted for questioning for her involvement in the crash and charges are pending, the patrol says. Borer was pronounced dead at the scene and transported to the Lucas County Coroner's Office.

Subject: FCS Third Levy Attempt

Findlay City Schools will have an operating levy on the November 3rd ballot. Superintendent Troy Roth says the levy is smaller than the one that was defeated in a special election in August and in the primary in April. As Roth said, since the millage is lower, even if this levy is approved, the district will still have to make some cuts to personnel and in other areas. The 3.9 mill levy would cost taxpayers significantly less than the 5.9 mill levy that voters twice rejected.

Ohio's \$2.1 billion capital budget for 2021 has money in it for a variety of local projects. Findlay-Hancock County Economic Development Director Tim Mayle was on with WFIN's Chris Oaks to discuss the budget. He says the area will be getting a second installment of \$15 million dollars for construction of the Eagle Creek Flood Basin project just south of Findlay. The overall project is anticipated to cost around \$60 million. The 600 to 800-acre floodwater storage basin would be constructed west of U.S. 68 and just north of Township Road 49 in Hancock County.
