Economic @ Downtown Development/Jobs/Tourism	10/11/05	Nearly 100 people in Rochester could be out of a job by next summer. Late this evening we've learned JDS Uniphase is closing down its Rochester branch by June 30. JDS U is a worldwide leader in optical technology, designing and manufacturing products for fiber optic communications. A company spokesperson told us that the company will consider relocating some of those employees. The spokesperson says the closure is in response to a "changing business model." JDS-U moved into the Rochester market about 5 years ago.
	10/14/05	Minnesota-based Mesaba Airlines is following Northwest Airlines into bankruptcy court. But the regional carrier says it will continue flying as it tries to fix its financial problems. Mesaba flies under the Northwest Airlink name, and became a victim of its partner's Chapter 11 filing. Mesaba officials say cash shortages were the main reasons for the bankruptcy decision.
	10/24/05	Chamber members gather to say Goodbye to their leader. Freeborn County-Albert Lea Chamber of Commerce director Marjory Hamersly is retiring on Friday. She was congratulated and thanked by dozens of well wishers at her retirement party in the Chamber boardroom. Hamersly had the

- position for 3 years before announcing her retirement earlier this year. She has been replaced by Susie Petersen, a long time member of the areas business community.
- 11/2/05
It's an enormous project for any city in the state, let alone Lake City and its population of about 5,000. The Jewel Golf Community expects to double the town's size, but things have been moving a little slower than the owners would like. Things got off to an interesting start when the Mayor announced the city had received a legal complaint that the Jewel intended to file against Lake City tomorrow. The major issue at hand: putting aspects of this major project on hold. The Oak Hurts Development will be built around the Jewel Golf Course and includes more than 1,000 acres of land. As we come to the end of the construction season, the Jewel says there are some items that have been in the works, and approval is needed to free up thousands of dollars of credit. Well, the council denied one of those projects at its last meeting, hence the pressure of legal action. The city attorney says the issue involves miscommunication and just the sheer challenge of the small city staff managing such a large project.
- 11/10/05
It's not even Thanksgiving, but department stores are already thinking about the upcoming holiday season. Store managers hire scores of seasonal workers, to help make the shopping experience more bearable for you, the consumer. A lot of seasonal workers are just out to make an extra buck or two so they themselves can afford gifts. For others, it's an interview for perhaps a long term job. Managers we talked to say the hiring season is up for grabs until the end of the month. So, people are heading to department stores to find jobs. The busiest time for most business is from now until the beginning of next year, so the masses of additional help is just what the managers need.
- 11/13/05
It's not often you turn 150 years old, so Albert Lea is turning out all the stops in celebration. The sesquicentennial birthday bash began with a kick off party at Skyline mall. Originating in 1856 Albert Lea will turn 150 on New Years Eve which will begin a year of celebration. Each month next year a different aspect of the community will be celebrated.
- 11/16/05
It won't be long before residents begin to see some changes in downtown Austin. The downtown revitalization committee and representatives from H-G-A consulting will meet with the city council to share some of their ideas.
- 11/23/05
The Chamber of Commerce is working to support the hotels and restaurants in Rochester. Hospitality is the second largest employer in the city. The Chamber's effort is called "Hospitality First" and a task force is

- working on increasing awareness, strengthening the industry, and education for those who work within it.
- 12/1/05 The opening of Diamond Joe casino will create 400 new jobs, and all of them are still up for grabs. The Iowa casino opened it's employment center about one month ago in the basement of Northwoods State Bank. Applications are being accepted for all positions in the areas of gaming, security, food and beverage service, and accounting. Employees say they have accepted more than 1000 applications but have not officially filled any positions. A second round of interviews will take place in January but the casino's general manager says he plans on accepting applications right up to the grand opening in early April.
- 12/3/05 Santa and Mrs. Claus are spreading their cheer in downtown Rochester. The festive couple arrived at the Peace Plaza this afternoon with a familiar "Ho, Ho, Ho!" The scene included Christmas carols, hot chocolate, and free carriage rides through the downtown streets. But the big event was a chance to meet Santa. Kids waited in line and bundled up in the chilly weather for a chance to shake Jolly St Nick's hand. The event was put on by the Rochester Downtown Business Association.
- 12/16/05 Everything may be bigger in Texas, but if you want to get to Dallas, you'll have to make a stopover. It's only been 7 months since its ribbon cutting ceremony, but a federal rule means Rochester is already losing it's flight to Dallas/Fort Worth. The developments come after Southwest Airlines challenged a rule called the Wright Amendment, which limits the number of destinations its plans can fly to and from Dallas/Fort Worth. An American Airlines spokesperson tells us the daily Dallas flight out of Rochester will end March 2nd.
- 12/25/05 It's a day most business shut down, but one has their biggest day of the year. While most of the city remained quiet, Chatcau Theater in Rochester was abuzz with activity. Long lines and a packed parking lot were a welcome site for general manager Mitch Stevenson who says Christmas day is one of their most profitable.
- 12/27/05 An ethanol plant may be on the way in Mower County. But first, county board members must decide if the company's demands are fair. The city of Lyle is one of the finalists, so a county board members see that as a positive thing. But the final decision may very well come down to what the people in the area want. At today's meeting, board members passed a resolution to continue looking at bringing the absolute energy plant to northwest Lyle.

12/29/05

It's a 150th birthday that one group is celebrating 150 times. The Spruce Up Austin Group is commemorating 150 years by planting 150 trees. All of the trees will be planted on public property. Local nurseries, Austin utilities, and park and rec are all contributing to the project. Spruce Up Austin is also encouraging residents to plant sesquicentennial trees on their own property.

Political/Governmental

Should it be extended? That's the election question in Rochester. The city is asking residents to approve another half-cent sales tax during the special October referendum. City leaders predicted low voter turnout mostly because of this unique October time frame. Rochester officials says they've done their best to educate the public about the sales tax, but it's tough to get people out to vote for a single-issue election. A "yes" vote would extend the sales tax until 2014 and is expected to bring in \$40 million. \$32 million of that money would fund transportation projections, and another eight would support education facilities.

10/10/05

Residents of the Elgin Millville and Plainview school districts will go to the polls later this year to vote yes or no to consolidation. The schools argue that enrollment is shrinking and they won't be able to handle the economic repercussions.

10/15/05

Minnesota Governor Tim Pawlenty has pulled the plug on a special legislative session. Pawlenty blames his decision on DFL Lawmakers saying he couldn't count on support from them to focus on the stadium issues in a special session.

But DFL Senate Majority Leader, Dean Johnson, says the governor didn't get much support from his own Republican Party. Last week a prominent Republican lawmaker urged the Governor not to call a special session because most house Republicans are opposed to a fall special session to deal with sports stadium bills.

10/26/05

House minority leader Matt Entenza is announcing his candidacy across the state today to be Minnesota's next Attorney General. Entenza is a former deputy attorney general and also a prosecutor in Hennepin County and says he wants to focus on Telemarketers and helping local counties fight meth.

So far Republican Jeff Johnson is the only other person running for the position. Present Attorney General, Mike Hatch, is running for governor.

11/3/05

State leaders, led by Governor Pawlenty laid out detailed plans about how Minnesota will deal with a potential bird flu pandemic. One

of the goals is to vaccinate the entire state within a week if an outbreak happens.

The worst case scenario would include the closing of schools, mass vaccination, and quarantines if the flu were to come our way. Pawlenty said the state needs to walk a fine

line between informing people and alarming them.

11/18/05

Some possible legislative changes for lawful gambling may impact charities some time down the road. Lawful gambling has raised more than a billion dollars for charities across the state. State lawmakers are looking at a state run casino and a smoking ban, some feel this will impact the charitable gambling industry.

11/20/05

The Democratic leader of the Iowa Senate says the legislature may look at options for controlling sex offender during the next session. The senate is interested in looking at requiring electronic monitoring that tracks where an offender is at every moment.

Currently, Iowa has a two-thousand foot limit rule that keeps offenders from living near schools and day care centers. The Iowa Civil Liberties Union is challenging that law, in what could become the first US Supreme Court test of sex offenders' residency laws.

12/7/05

A political opponent is pulling out a major player. A former state representative brings in a heavy hitter to make an announcement about her political future. Carla Nelson is running to try to reclaim her seat in the Minnesota house of representatives, the seat Tina Lieblich now holds. Nelson held the 30-A-house seat in 2003 and 2004 as a Republican, and will now run head-to-head against Lieblich.

12/10/05

One group say unions in the work force is an important step to improving lives. In conjunction with human right's days the Southeast Central Labor Council and community members talked about the right to organize unions. The discussion centered on the biggest challenges workers face when trying to attempt to form them. Workers themselves talked about their experiences and explained how unions build strong societies.

12/15/05

They provide a variety of services to our community, from shelter, to food, to healthcare. But their job has been getting tough. About 55 area non-profit organizations spent half the day speaking with legislators about a variety of concerns. One of the, funding cuts from the state. The goal of the forum is to have lawmakers go back to St. Paul with an understanding of what non profits need, and participants say they do understand legislators have a lot to

		do. The forum was organized by the Rochester Area Foundation.
	12/21/05	A judge's decision to strike down Minnesota's tobacco fee does not mean smokers will see a price drop anytime soon, or ever for that matter. Governor Tim Pawlenty is trying to get the state supreme court to quickly review the judge's decision in hopes of overturning it. Meanwhile the uncertainty is of concern to lawmakers. The judge ruled in favor of the tobacco companies because he says it violates a tobacco settlement from 1998. The settlement is supposed to take care of any health related costs.
	12/28/05	Flood assistance is available for Austin residents but if they don't spend it soon the state will take it back. Last summer the Austin Housing and Redevelopment authority received \$100,000 from the state to be used by owners of flood damaged property. Of that 100,000, 87,000 is still available, but if the money is not used by next fall, the state will take it back. The money is in the form of matching forgivable loans, meaning it would supplement a regular HRA loan but would not need to be paid back if the borrower owns the property for 10 years.
Health Care Developments	10/6/05	Avian flu, or bird flu, will have devastating effects if and when it hits the area. Area health officials are pre-warning people to do their part to fight what would be a pandemic. The Avian flu virus has already infected and killed tens of millions of birds in the last eight years. It has also killed at least sixty-four people since the outbreak hit Asia two years ago. It's not clear when an outbreak could happen in the US, but health officials say are expecting it to happen and are already preparing.
	10/13/05	Health officials say three more cases of polio have been confirmed in a Minnesota Amish community. Immunizations are less common in these communities because of religious beliefs. Minnesota health officials say these three cases weren't contracted naturally. They believe the children got the virus from someone that was given a live vaccine, no longer used in the US. Although the risk is low, health officials are urging people who haven't had a polio vaccine to get one now.
	10/31/05	Olmsted County public health officials say they've had more than one thousand people come in and get their shot since they started offering them a week ago. That's a major contrast to last year during the vaccine shortages.
	11/3/05	State leaders, led by Governor Pawlenty laid

- out detailed plans about how Minnesota will deal with a potential bird flu pandemic. One of the goals is to vaccinate the entire state within a week if an outbreak happens.

- 11/4/05 People concerned about being HIV positive may have a more private way to get some answers in the future. The Food and Drug Administration is considering making a quick response oral test available over the counter.
- The test has had some promising results with studies showing it is more than 99% accurate. Area health professionals say there is a risk of misdiagnosis with false negatives and false positives.
- 11/9/05 Barrett's esophagus is the most dramatically increasing cancer out there and has a very low survival rate. The good news is recently published research shows a non-surgical treatment used to kill cancer cells is also successful in preventing their development.
- 11/11/05 A nationwide shortage of pharmacists has those in the field concerned about the future. To help with the shortage, pharmacies are using more automation and mail service pharmacies. The shortage will more likely affect rural pharmacies than pharmacies in bigger cities.
- 11/17/05 Health experts say one of the major results of smoking is lung cancer. It kills more Minnesotans every year than any other cancer.
- Health experts say the survival rate is not good for many lung cancer patients because screening is not effective. By the time people are diagnosed, the cancer is usually in the later stages.
- There are programs and new drugs to help smokers get healthy again. People interested in quitting should contact their doctor.
- 11/21/05 Minnesota Senator Norm Coleman brought in a panel of experts to Rochester to clarify some confusion with Medicare's new prescription drug benefit, "Part D".
- The drug benefit is open to everyone on Medicare and each plan has a different monthly premium, coverage, and deductible.
- 11/29/05 A group of volunteers are reaching out to help foreigners with medical concerns. As part of a first ever "Health Fair" at Rochester's Hawthorne Education Center, health education providers have set up special booths to help answer questions about

anything from breast cancer to healthy eating habits. Hundreds of adult literacy students and others are able to pick up important information about health. Translators and volunteers from various organizations are also answering questions.

12/5/05

Mayo Clinic dialysis services has opened a new regional center dedicated to serving patients in Southeastern Minnesota and Northern Iowa. Patients who need dialysis often have to travel long distances for treatment, a new center in Albert Lea will change that. A state of the art dialysis center is open for patients through an agreement with Mayo Health System. The facility includes 18 outpatient dialysis treatment stations. Mayo Clinic dialysis services also offers outpatient dialysis in Fairmont, Owatonna, Wabasha, Decorah, and LaCrosse.

12/11/05

Children who come to the Mayo Clinic for care will have a much more child-friendly environment to be in. South Dakota banker and businessman T. Denny Sanford gave Mayo \$15 million to build an outpatient pediatric center. Clinic leaders made the announcement this morning on the 16th floor of the Mayo building, where it will be located. The new center will house medical and surgical pediatric specialties and technology. The money will also support a professorship, a fellowship, and a research partnership between Mayo and the new Sanford Children's Hospital in Sioux Falls.

12/22/05

A dermatologist at Olmsted Medical Center says there are a few ways to avoid dry skin altogether. Doctor Peggy North says first of all, people should avoid showering daily. She recommends alternating days with a sponge bath. Along that line, she says people should avoid really hot showers because they tend to strip the skin's natural moisturizing oils. And using minimal soap is best. Doctor North also says when it comes to moisturizers, fragrant-free creams, not lotions, are best. She says creams provide better moisture.

Education

10/5/05

Rochester firefighters are going to be teaching area fourth graders about fire safety. The students will be going through mock fire drills with non-toxic smoke and learn the importance of sprinkler systems in the home. The unit's first run with the kids is tomorrow afternoon at Gage Elementary.

10/16/05

Dozens of people in Rochester turned out for a parade of prayer to dispel religious myths and reinforce truths. The group toured a Mosque, a Catholic church, an Episcopal church, and a Synagogue.

The outcome was to help answer questions within the community about other people's beliefs and understand differences.

- 10/18/05 The Austin school district is saying thanks to the Hornel Foundation for donating hundreds of thousands of dollars over the past few years. Today the Foundation visited Ellis Middle School to view how their money is being spent.
- Most of the grant money this year is being spent for technology upgrades. Those upgrades included new computers and software.
- 10/19/05 Rochester teachers approved the 2005-2007 Rochester Education Association contract two weeks ago and now the contract has been approved by the school board.
- Highlights of the contract include a cost-of-living increase and new incentives for pursuing graduate work. The deal also calls for teachers hired after January first of the upcoming year to pay a portion of their health insurance premium. Current teachers would continue to pay nothing for single coverage.
- 10/22/05 Enrollment in Iowa's public schools has dropped for the ninth consecutive year. A preliminary report by the state education department shows that 60% of Iowa's public school districts saw a decline. A spokesperson says this year's drop is small compared to past years, so they consider it stable.
- 10/30/05 An excited group of students and parents were in attendance as administrators broke ground for a new school in Lyle today. The new school was a subject of debate for three years and four referendums. The goal is to move the students into the new school half way through the next year.
- 11/1/05 Michael Resnick, a University of Minnesota researcher on youth development was in Rochester speaking at the annual Faces Forum. The forum attempts to educate the community on issues dealing with the family.
- 11/7/05 Rochester Montessori School has a new location in northwest Rochester. The school had been located downtown, sharing space with Christ United Methodist church for twelve years.
- The facility is the only private non-denominational school in the city. A grand opening celebration is being planned for Saturday, December 10th.
- 11/22/05 A group of students from St. Charles belonging to a group called Leaders for Life have organized an activity involving the grim reaper. Students will be "killed" about every hour of the day in attempts to make a statement about living chemically free.

- Students will be pulled from class by the grim reaper and will reappear wearing black clothes and having white faces. The "dead" students will not be allowed to speak to other students.
- 12/2/05 The voters have spoken, and now two school Districts covering three towns will be coming together as one. Residents in Plainview, Elgin and Millville gave overwhelming approval to a plan to consolidate their schools. In the final tally, more than 1800 votes said yes to the consolidation with about 600 others voting no. The proposal passed in each of the three towns. Consolidation won in a landslide in Plainview and yes voters were also in the majority in Elgin and Millville.
- 12/6/05 College students are getting a little help paying their tuition bills, thanks to some scarves and gift baskets. It's the third annual scarves for scholars fundraiser for the University of Minnesota Rochester, and this year, as in the past, several community members are providing items for this Friday's big raffle. Coordinators say buy a ticket for yourself, or as a Christmas gift to honor a friend or loved one, and in so doing help a student go to college.
- 12/9/05 Minnesota higher education could be getting a boost. The MNSCU board of trustees approved a request to the legislature of the \$31.5 million for 2006. The request will cover several areas in the 32-institution system, including a global initiative to develop exchange programs and training for aviation, automotive technology, home health care, and manufacturing, bioscience development to build on a skilled labor force, technology costs to boost security and student services, and more funding to cover the significant increase in fuel costs.
- 12/12/05 The Stewartville teachers union and their district are inching close to a contract agreement. A state mediator is coming in Tuesday to try and help speed up negotiations that have been ongoing since late spring. The teachers say their salaries aren't competitive in comparison with other districts in our area. They are also concerned about benefits.
- Crime Prevention & Domestic Violence** 10/3/05 A group of residents from Fillmore County remembered women who have died today in honor of Domestic Violence Awareness month. The program included planting a new tree in front of the courthouse to honor those women.
- Domestic Violence Awareness month is always in October. Women who are in abusive relationships can get help by contacting their county's victim or family services office.

10/8/05	<p>The Mower County K 9 team of Tazer and sergeant Jeff Ellis achieved a near perfect score to place first at the National Certification last weckend. This is Tazer's fourth championship in a row. This years second place winners were from Wabasha County.</p>	
10/17/05	<p>Crime Prevention Specialist, Darrel Hildbrant says his office has received numerous calls from concerned citizens about a telephone scam targeting the local area. If you receive a call you're urged not to talk to them but simply to hang up.</p>	
10/20/05	<p>A group calling itself the "National Verification Office" is calling people asking for social security and checking account numbers. In return, they give you an "800" number that is phony.</p>	
10/20/05	<p>Complaints of vandalism and drug activity around Peace Plaza have surveillance cameras rolling again. There is a new office in the downtown Galleria Mall that allows police to keep surveillance of the downtown area every hour of the day and every day of the year. These cameras cost about two thousand dollars apiece and come right out of the taxpayers pockets.</p>	
11/25/05	<p>The Rochester police department says there is an increase in thefts once it starts to get cold outside. Mainly because people are able to conceal merchandise in bulky clothes.</p>	
12/01/05	<p>If you are out shopping and see you spot a thief, local law enforcement encourages you to give a description to the nearest clerk. Do not try to handle it yourself because stores usually have their own procedures.</p>	
12/01/05	<p>The Minneapolis-St. Paul international airport is testing a new passenger screening system next month. The program emphasizes more on how people act, than what they're carrying. Airport police say the unit is trained by former Israeli airport security experts in behavioral pattern recognition. The test period beings in January. Minneapolis is the second large US airport to test the new system. Boston's Logan International was the first.</p>	
12/20/05	<p>Changes need to be made in order to pass a school referendum in Kingsland. That's what a survey released by the district has found. The Kingsland superintendent says that although the majority of residents are willing to raise their own taxes, they aren't willing to raise them as much as the district wanted them to. Last month Kingsland voters rejected a \$16 million referendum to expand two of the schools and close a third.</p>

- 11/5/05 Diversity Council facilitators led group discussions on the problems with racism in Rochester. People were able to discuss their own experiences and perspectives on race and religion. About one hundred people turned out for the event.
- 11/6/05 Rochester Area Disabled Athletics and Recreation held it's 12th Annual Bowl a-Thon this afternoon. The event raises money for the non-profit organization that offers a wide variety of activities to Rochester's disabled community.
- 11/24/05 North Americans are not the only nationality to celebrate Thanksgiving. The Regal family of Rochester celebrate the day by inviting new

		comers and sampling Thanksgiving meal treats. They hold one big meal for families new to America and have a traditional dinner.
	11/30/05	Home Instead Senior Care put trees inside the two Dunn Brothers Coffee Shops in Rochester. Names of seniors hang as ornaments, listing a gift he or she would like to receive. Most of the elderly have no family close by and are lonely during the holidays. Seniors can be sponsored by removing their name from the tree. The group hopes to give gifts to 115 people.
	12/30/05	It's almost New Years, and law enforcement is bringing in extra patrol officers to help keep roads safe from drunk drivers. In Olmsted County, there will be seven more patrol officers on New Years than on any other typical day.
Environment	10/1/05	A family in Southeastern Minnesota has teamed up with Rochester Public Utilities to become more energy friendly. The Bills family uses solar power for energy in their home. The panels cost about \$18,000 to install, but the family says it's well worth it. The panels have saved hundreds in bills so far and three tons of coal each year. They expect a full return from their investment in under sixteen years.
	11/5/05	You can take your Halloween pumpkins to Olmsted County composting site or to any area Wal-Mart or Hy-Vee stores. Silver Lake Foods is also accepting pumpkins for compost.

A new state law requires teens to grab the wheel, not the phone. State traffic safety officials say young and inexperienced drivers are singled out by the law because they are more prone to accidents than older drivers. And while traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for teenagers in Minnesota and the nation, a police lieutenant says those numbers are lower in Rochester.

Substance Abuse

10/28/05

Sara Henjy was a trouble-causing meth addict that has turned her life around. She sharing her story with others in hopes of changing lives.

She had a great childhood, but experimented with drugs and alcohol in high school and resulted in trying meth for the first time. She spent the next few years in and out of treatment centers and the addiction resulted in a divorce and losing custody of her children. After sharing her story with A and E television and going through an intervention, she has remained clean.

She is now employed with the sheriff's department and educates others by sharing her story. Recently, she was in Austin to speak during regional training for adult educators.

11/15/05

Law enforcement across Southeast Minnesota have announced their "Take the Southeast By Storm" program. Forty-four sheriff's offices and police departments join forces with the State Patrol to educate traffic enforcement in high schools. Southeastern Minnesota sees more traffic fatalities in December than any other month.

The campaign stresses the danger of drinking and driving, the importance of buckling up, and promoting safe driving habits.

A group of students from St. Charles belonging to a group called Leaders for Life have organized an activity involving the grim reaper.
