The first editorial airs within KFVE newscasts on Monday, 9-9:30 PM and on Tuesday, 6:30-7 PM, and the second weekly editorial airs within newscasts on Thursday 9-9:30 PM and Friday, 6:30-7 PM. The editorials are typically 75-90 seconds in length.
