(1) *University of Hawaii "28 Great Moments"*: A segment that highlights 28 great moments in UH Sports, showcasing epic games and heroic plays over the last 28 years along with commentary by former student-athletes and coaches. This feature aired from April 25th – May 28th during the 9 PM news and Sunrise news.

Editorials ("Think About It...")

General Manager John Fink prepares, writes, and presents editorials for airing on KFVE. During the quarter, two editorials were aired each week, each of which airs twice during the given week. The first editorial airs within KFVE newscasts on Monday, 9-9:30 PM and on Tuesday, 6:30-7 PM, and the second weekly editorial airs within newscasts on Thursday 9-9:30 PM and Friday, 6:30-7 PM. The editorials are typically 75-90 seconds in length.

Public Services Messages

Over the quarter, KFVE aired 898 public service announcements. Over 700 were thirty seconds in length ranging from Kokua for Japan in the wake of the Japan earthquake and tsunami disaster to the Hawaii Foodbank Drive, Department of Transportation's Click-It or Ticket campaign, and Special Olympics Hawaii: Fueling Dreams.

Local Amateur Athletics (various broadcast times and lengths)

KFVE provides a broadcast outlet for presentation of local sporting activities of special interest to the area. For example, during the past quarter the station broadcast eleven (11) University of Hawaii baseball games, two (2) University of Hawaii softball games, and five (5) University of Hawaii men's volleyball games.
