1. Need a gift? **4-H Camp Gift Certificate** may be the perfect idea for your child or grandchild. Stop in to the Extension office on the second Floor of the Court House. You can decide the denomination. We do not have final camp costs, yet but, total will be over \$160 per camper. A gift from you can help someone who might not get to go. We do not usually have final costs until April; that leaves a short turn around for saving if families have not begun before then.
2. **Teen Award selection interviews** are Monday, December 30, 2013. Applicants should watch their mail for a letter giving them their interview time. These interviews will be in the LL Conference Room at the Court House.
3. **4-H Camp Counselor Selection** is a group process from 1:30-5:30p.m. on Sunday, January 5, 2014 at the Youth Building of the Crawford County Fairgrounds. Again a date that should be on the calendar. A reminder to those youth working, you need to ask off now.
4. **Have a beef project? It will need tagged on the morning of Saturday, January 11** at the Crawford County Fairgrounds to be eligible for show at either the Crawford County or Ohio State Fair.
5. Are you a returning member thinking about **what 4-H project to take in 2014?** New this year is 4-H Project Central. Visit www.ohio4h.org/projectcentral or stop by the OSU extension office and ask to look at the book boxes. Many of the clubs also borrow them for members to review.
6. **Learn to Sew with Mom/Grandma**, January 20, 2014 from 12:30 p.m.-4:00 p.m. in Bucyrus Public Library. The intent of this workshop is to teach basics and create an interest in sewing to grow the clothing project numbers in the future.
