### Section I. Issues.

The station has identified the following issues as significant issues facing our community in this quarter:

- **A. Voter Registration:** Information on registering to vote in advance of the November elections.
- **B. Distracted Driving:** A PSA campaign to address dangers of social media posts while driving.
- **C. Flu Vaccination:** The increased importance on vaccinating children for the flu during Covid-19.
- D. Diversity Counsel Events: Diversity events planned for the fall 2021 semester

# Section II. Responsive Programs

The station has broadcast programming dealing with each of these issues. Programming details are listed below.

 A. Voter Registration Length: Two Minute Feature; 30 second PSA Dates/Times: Feature aired once per day at various times August 15-September 30; PSA twice per day at various times.

Student produced feature detailing upcoming voter registration events. Updates to remove old events and add new ones occurred as needed. Information on online registration for both Illinois and Missouri was presented. A 30-second PSA on voter registration aired twice a day during the period.

# **B.** Distracted Driving

**Length:** (5) two minute features. **Dates/Times:** July 1 – September 30

Mass Communication students created a new PSA campaign called "It Can Wait" to encourage listeners to resist the urge to use social media and text messaging while driving. Many situation on when a listener may say, "It can wait," were presented in various scripts. Getting homework done, taking out the trash, doing laundry are all activities that the commercial actor said, "it can wait." If you are willing to say many things can wait, then surely waiting to respond to a message while driving can as well.

### C. Flu Vaccination

Both organizations are stressing the added importance of doing so this year because of COVID-19.
