Compared to last year the number of available properties is half of the inventory for 2020 largely due to Covid-19 anxieties of having strangers walk through their house as well as general uncertainty for where and when to move. Realtor applications such as Zillow and Redfin have been much more popular in 2020, and although this is convenient for customers to shop for homes it is recommended to still sell the home with a realtor due to selling with a realtor has a higher chance of selling the home, as well as getting more money from the property then if sold alone. If you are considering selling your home walk through your house with a realtor and have them take note of what details need addressing to improve the condition of the home before putting the property on the market for sale. This movement began considering the realization in 2013 that Rockford was the 3 rd most miserable place to live in the U.S. behind Flint and Detroit Michigan. To

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				become a top 25 community 14 impact areas were identified that require addressing from education, safety, economy, and jobs, to arts, recreation, finances, and city planning. Covid-19 has caused some fundamental changes such as meetings being entirely cut for safety reasons but maintaining public engagement in the program remains among the top priorities which has led to adapting a larger social media campaign and partnership with other local organizations with like interests like <i>Great Neighborhoods</i> to keep this movement going through Covid. Great Neighborhoods is an organization that focuses on how to help gather the resources to help Rockford area neighborhoods build desirable renovations to neighborhoods. Although both organizations are privately funded, they can always use more local volunteers, and donations. One woman dies every 80 seconds due to heart disease. It is the number one killer of women every year including even Covid-19. Symptoms can vary widely with 40% not feeling chest pain. Symptoms of heart disease issues can include jaw pain, neck pain, back pain, shortness of breath, nausea, cold sweats, and chronic fatigue. 80% of heart disease is preventable with avoiding smoking, low sugar in take and fat, maintaining blood pressure, getting exercise, and knowing your family medical history. Cholesterol is necessary in our bodies to regulate hormones and other processes, but we naturally produce excess cholesterol through our biology making it imperative to avoid fried foods, red meats, and exercise regularly for 30-45 minutes 5 days a week to minimize this negative cholesterol. Eating 3 servings or more of blueberries per week can reduce the risk of heart disease by 34%. Testosterone causes a higher risk of heart complications, but estrogen doesn't and can even be a natural protectant against heart disease. Therefore, when women hit menopause and their estrogen declines there is a higher incidence of heart disease. Statin's can be a good medical supplement for women to regulate heat rate and cholesterol levels. For these reasons it is important to keep your primary care doctor informed and have a cardiologist sooner rather than later. 				the third leading cause of cancer in the United States, and second leading cause of cancer related deaths, and it can be detected early by polyps which can be found through testing and removed before growing into cancerous growths. There are several types of tests including a colonoscopy, stool tests, where a scope is placed in the colon to examine the colon and look for abnormalities that are then examined and biopsied. About 30% of people who get colonoscopies are found to have polyps in the first colonoscopy. Recovery time is immediate although plan to not drive the day of the procedure as the procedure could temporarily impair your driving. Results from a colonoscopy tend to arrive within a week of the procedure. People with no family history of colon cancer are recommended to begin screenings at age 50, but if you have a family history of colon cancer this should be monitored much more carefully and early. African Americans are at an increased risk of colon cancer however, which leads to African Americans being recommended to get screenings at age 45. If the results are negative, those results are good for 10 years. Diet that involves heavy consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables as a protective effect against developing colon cancer as does an active lifestyle, non-smoking, and maintaining an ideal weight. Consult your primary care physician and contact a Gastroenterologist if you have concerns or want to know more information about your colon health.
