

Quarterly Public Report for WNRN Public File

A-- During the 4th quarter (October 1, - December 31, 2012), WNRN News reported on and followed the following stories which other local print, broadcast media and governmental agencies found of interest to the City of Charlottesville and surrounding counties:

Route 29 Western By-Pass

On October 17th we reported that the Southern Environmental Law Center, based in Charlottesville, announced October 16th that confidential information was taken in an Internet security breach. The SELC hasn't disclosed what was taken, but the theft has been reported to the FBI. In a statement released on the 16th, the SELC said quote "We believe this was done intentionally as an attempt to undermine SELC's mission." end quote. The SELC advocates for local groups to help prevent pollution and is one of the strongest opponents of the Western US 29 Bypass.

Hurricane Sandy

On October 22nd we reported Hurricane Sandy is on course to ravage the East Coast sometime later that day. Amtrak had cancelled service across the northeast, and flights for the whole region were grounded. New York City had shut off its subway system and enacted evacuations for low lying areas due to a storm surge of up to ten feet. As of October 22nd, the storm was predicted to make landfall in New Jersey.

On October 29th we reported as of the 2 o'clock advisory from the National Hurricane Center, Hurricane Sandy was about one-hundred-ten miles southeast of Atlantic City, New Jersey and one-hundred-seventy-five miles south-southeast of New York City. Even though the center of the storm would pass to our north we already had seen some of its effects. On October 29th there were nearly six-hundred-fifty people without power in Albemarle County and there were other outages reported in Amherst County, and at least seven areas in Richmond. Statewide there were nearly five-thousand people in the dark.

Superstorm Sandy's effects are receding in Virginia, but a few impacts are still being felt locally. A flood warning is in effect for Culpeper Virginia this morning. The affected area is the Rappahannock River at Remington. Augusta Correctional center, Buckingham correctional center and Fluvanna Correctional Center are on Code Red. CATEC has cancelled adult evening classes tonight. Electrical companies report that most of their customers have power restored in central Virginia. Northern Virginia residents still are experiencing outages but should expect electricity turned back on by Thursday night.

On October 24th we reported Hurricane Sandy made landfall in Cuba that day after it slammed its way past Jamaica that Wednesday. The Hurricane center said that Sandy would leave Cuba that morning and head towards the Bahamas later that day. The

hurricane was expected to produce 6 to 12 inches of rain across the Caribbean as it made its way along the coast. The hurricane had killed two people in Jamaica but others said that they are prepared to face the storm with one Cuban citizen saying "We don't think there is any danger."

On October 26th we reported Weather forecasters said a major storm is set to hit the East Coast the following week. Dubbed "Frankenstorm," meteorologists said that remnants of hurricane Sandy are set to collide with arctic air from Canada and a winter storm coming from the west, likely bringing high winds, heavy rain, high tides and possibly even snow to an area stretching from New York and New Jersey inland to Ohio. According to a forecaster for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, weather models suggest an unprecedented mess lasting from Sunday through the following Wednesday, with damages estimates expected to reach as high as one billion dollars.

On October 29th we reported The ripple of effect of Hurricane Sandy continued to spread. Amtrak had cancelled service for the Northeast corridor for all of the following Tuesday. Officials Greene County was also taking measures to ensure safety. The county has declared a local emergency and the Emergency Operations Center were activated at 10am this morning. There have also been emergency shelters in Green County at Ruckersville Elementary School and at the Dyke Volunteer Fire Department. Residents that are heading to these shelters are asked to bring blankets, food, and medications the shelters could not accommodate pets at this time.

On October 29th we reported Sandy's wrath was being felt up and down the East Coast today. On the Outer Banks of North Carolina, fourteen crew members were rescued at sea. The U.S. Coast Guard pulled the sailors from the Atlantic after they were forced to abandon a replica of the HMS Mutiny, used in the film Mutiny on the Bounty. Rescue crews are still looking for two other members of the ship's crew. Sandy also has flooded streets on the Outer Banks and the beach road is heavily damaged. The storm had also taken a section of the Avalon Pier in Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina. In New Jersey, most of Atlantic City is seeing some flooding and all routes in and out of Ocean City are impassible. In our own state a curfew has been set on Chincoteague Island. The entire island was underwater and there was no way off the barrier island. According to officials thirty-five-hundred people were still on the island even though they were told to evacuate.

On October 29th we reported Sandy had picked up momentum and had New Jersey it its crosshairs. As of 4pm on October 29th the center of the storm was sixty-five miles southeast of Atlantic City, New Jersey and moving at twenty-eight miles per hour. The sustained winds at the center were ninety miles per hour and tropical force winds extended five hundred miles from the center. The eye of the storm was expected to make landfall on the Jersey Shore within the next few hours. The storm surge along the northeast was predicted to be six to eleven feet from Long Island to Delaware. The storm surge on the Delmarva Peninsula was expected to be four to eight feet. Transportation across the country was coming to a stand-still. We reported earlier that day Amtrak had cancelled service for October 29th and the 30th along the Northeast corridor. Meanwhile

nearly fourteen-thousand flights had been cancelled as airports from New England south to North Carolina were shut down. Hurricane Sandy was the first storm since 1985 to shut down the New York Stock Exchange and the economic effects were just starting. Experts on disasters were estimating that Sandy could cause anywhere from two to one-hundred billion dollars in damage as the storm was effecting nearly sixty million people.

On October 30th we reported Dominion Virginia Power estimated the uniquely severe Hurricane Sandy could cause as many as one million customers to lose electricity. In Central Virginia about five-thousand, five-hundred Dominion customers were without power, with most of those outages occurring in Crozet. The utility had dispatched two-thousand crews to address outages throughout the state, but Sandy's predicted duration of several days may have prevented workers from restoring power until the gusts had passed. Dominion spokeswoman Alison Kaufman says Sandy could have become one of the worst hurricanes on record.

On October 30th we reported Hurricane Sandy made landfall on the East Coast on October 29th. Fierce winds and heavy rainfall had forced evacuations and public school and transportation closures in the densely populated North Atlantic part of the country. An estimated six-point-five million people were without power. For the first time since nine-eleven, US stock markets were closed October 29th, and they will remain closed October 30th. The federal government was suspending work for today as well, as Washington, D.C., was expected to suffer extensive damage. In the US, Sandy's reported death toll had reached sixteen.

On October 30th we reported Virginia had established an Emergency Operations Center in Chesterfield, in the basement of the state police headquarters. The Center gathered different resources, services, and equipment for deployment throughout the state. Six-hundred fifty military troops were stationed in the state to aid with rescue, repair, and recovery. Spokesman Bob Spieldenner expected Hurricane Sandy to gather momentum that night, and while the Center would maintain close contact with local officials, he advised residents to quote "hunker down" and "stay where you are."

On October 30th we reported Sandy had inundated New York City with record levels of floodwater. Downtown Manhattan had seen a record surge of about fourteen feet, surpassing the previous nineteen-sixty record of ten feet. According to Brookhaven meteorologist Jeffrey Tongue, the storm hit at quote "the worst possible time," bringing its strongest winds and rain at high tide. Water had poured into the city's subway and tunnel systems, and the world's financial capital was at a standstill. The Metropolitan Transportation Authority says Sandy's damage was geographically widespread, and repair could take anywhere from fourteen hours to four days.

On October 30th we reported To help facilitate rescue and repair efforts during Hurricane Sandy, first responders in Albemarle County had established a level-one emergency operations center. As of noon October 29th, the county's police, fire, and rescue crews had relocated their bases to the Regional Emergency Command Center. With all these services under one roof, authorities could approach storm response in a more coordinated,

efficient way. The convergence also ensured that all shifts will be adequately covered. The state's department of transportation and some utility crews joined the effort to clear downed trees and power lines.

On October 30th we reported The Nuclear Regulatory Commission warned that a New Jersey nuclear plant may have needed to resort to emergency measures if the Hurricane Sandy continued to dump water on the area. The Oyster Creek plant is the oldest working nuclear plant in the country, and owner Exelon Corp had declared the facility on 'alert,' the second-lowest of the NRC's four action levels. The plant had been offline since the prior week, but rising water levels could have submerged the service motor that pumps water in to cool spent uranium rods. Overheated rods could have released radiation, but the company could use emergency water sources, such as the plant's fire suppression system, as alternative coolants. NRC alerts were serious events in the nuclear industry, but Exelon said the situation posed no threat to public health and safety.

On October 30th we reported For the second day in a row, for the fourth time in ten years, UVA had cancelled classes. Although conditions remained mild up until the night of October 29th, President Teresa Sullivan called for the cancellation in anticipation of Sandy's more severe effects. In Richmond, the Red Cross had opened two emergency shelters for the city's homeless, who would otherwise have had to endure the storm and its freezing temperatures on the street. More broadly, the governor had closed all executive branch offices, and most school systems in central Virginia were closed October 30th. The National Weather Service had high wind and blizzard warnings in place for most of the listening area.

On October 30th we reported NYU's Langone Medical Center fell into a worst-case scenario under the burden of Hurricane Sandy. Stormy conditions cut the Center's power, and when its backup generators failed to operate, the Center began a so-called 'total evacuation.' Some patients were discharged, but two hundred others, including twenty babies from the neonatal intensive care unit, were relocated to other facilities by private ambulance. The lack of electricity made evacuation difficult, as staff had to carefully carry patients, sometimes with battery-operated respirators, down stairs, rather than use elevators. The New York Fire Department reports that back-up generators have also failed at the city's Bellevue Hospital, and an evacuation is taking place there as well.

On October 31st we reported Albemarle County schools came under fire for school closures during Hurricane Sandy. Although the storm wasn't as bad as it could have been, the system says it had to think about such issues as losing power at schools and potential road closures. And decided taking the chance to open schools just wasn't worth the potential cost.

On November 1st we reported that Madison County's Graves Mountain Lodge has suffered thousands of dollars of damage under the winds and rain of Hurricane Sandy. Winds of up to eighty miles per hour felled some of the resort's trees and tore holes in the barn that sits near the original homestead. Damages are estimated between two-hundred fifty and five-hundred thousand dollars. However, no one was hurt, and the Lodge has

endured the slings and arrows for more than one-hundred thirty years. Owner James Grave says quote "everything will be back to normal" soon at the rural Syria, Virginia site.

On November 1st we reported that a Nelson County man is among the surviving crew members of the sunken HMS Bounty. Originally built for a titular role in the Marlon Brando movie Mutiny on the Bounty, the ship had been destined for St. Petersburg, Florida, when it sailed tragically into the path of Hurricane Sandy. Chris Barksdale, known to many as the "Honey-Do Handyman," joined the expedition to help with repairs and anticipated the trip of a lifetime. He was one of the fourteen rescued by the Coast Guard on Monday, October 29th, and friends, including Richard Boyd and Charles McMurry, are relieved to hear of his safety. The ship's captain, Robin Walbridge, is still missing, and a relief fund for the crew and their families has been established—available through the Boutny's facebook page.

On November 1st we reported that the Albemarle County school system explained the appearance of being overly cautious in response to Hurricane Sandy. Josh Davis, the Chief Operating Officer, said "If power had gone out at several schools and roads became closed due to trees crashing down, we would not be able to take buses to get children home. That would have been the type of situation we wanted to avoid."

Public Education

On October 11th we reported Judge Patrick Yeatts sentenced Allyson Lowrey, a former bookkeeper for a Lynchburg preschool, to pay seventeen thousand dollars in restitution for embezzling from the school. Eleven thousand will cover the thefts, and the remainder will cover the cost of the school correcting its records. The sentence also included two years in prison but the term is suspended.

On November 8th, we reported that the Fluvanna County School Board decided on cuts to help bridge a 300 thousand dollar budget gap. Staff members voted to fur-low staff for four days during the school year. The board itself will also take a two percent pay cut. Teachers expressed frustration over the cuts with one saying, "We have gotten to the point where it is starting to become less about the kids in our classrooms, and more about the kids in our homes."

On November 16th, we reported that the Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors met to address the 300,000 dollar budget deficit for the school division. Parents and teachers were joining forces through a group called the Focus on Fluvanna Future to petition and demand the board fund the deficit. The county took four furlough staff days the week prior. Over 1000 signatures were on the petition.

Virginia Lacrosse Murder Trial

On October 24th we reported George Huguely's appeal for his second-degree murder conviction has been delayed. Huguely was convicted in murdering his ex-girlfriend Yardley Love earlier this year. He was sentenced to twenty-six years in prison. His appeal will be transferred to Richmond in December.

Morgan Harrington

On October 1st, we reported that October 17 will mark three years since the night Virginia Tech student Morgan Harrington disappeared after attending a concert at the John Paul Jones Arena. Her remains were found in January 2010 on an Albemarle County farm, but her killer remains at large. The "Help Save the Next Girl" campaign founded in her memory held an event Sunday at the North Garden trading post as part of a new effort to reveal clues to the murderer's identity. The campaign is now focusing on tips about the necklace Harrington was wearing on the night she disappeared from the Metallica concert at the John Paul Jones Arena. The campaign is encouraging people who know anything about the necklace or the suspect to call the state police tip line at 434-352-3467.

On October 10th, we reported after nearly three years of being a cold case, the family of Morgan Harrington hoped to bring the murderer to justice, with the help of America's Most Wanted. The television program will feature the Harrington case on the following Friday. Harrington was last seen alive on October 17th, 2009, after she left a Metallica concert unattended, and her body wasn't found until January of 2010. Jill Harrington, the mother of Morgan Harrington, said quote "Someone knows [the murderer]. He has bragged about it. He has made their intuition and the hair on the back of their neck stand up more than once. Call. We just need one little nugget of information."

On October 16th we reported three years had passed since the disappearance of Virginia Tech student Morgan Dana Harrington, and while the search for her killer had been long, a recently aired episode of "America's Most Wanted" may have netted some promising tips. Virginia State Police are now investigating six new pieces of information they received after AMW profiled the case. The Harringtons believe the suspect knew a resident of the Anchorage Farm area in Albemarle County, where Morgan's remains were found, and a reward of one-hundred fifty-thousand dollars still stands for any information that leads to the arrest of Morgan's killer. Anyone with information should call state police at four-three-four, three-five-two, thirty-four, sixty-seven.

On November 14th, we reported that Virginia State Police Lieutenant Joe Rader, the former lead investigator in the Morgan Harrington abduction and murder case, released a passionate letter concerning the case. Rader, who retired earlier in 2012, urges the individual with information on the case to come forward. He said "So there is no confusion for you, I will be very blunt- YOU are not the same person you were in October 2009, because you hold the TRUTH of what happened to Morgan that October night and it has consumed your conscience every day...It is time for YOU to DO THE RIGHT THING..."

2012 Election

On October third we reported that Republican vice presidential candidate Paul Ryan arrived at the Charlottesville-Albemarle Regional Airport on October 2nd. He arrived at about 8:15 PM on the Romney for America plane, and quickly left to a house in Nelson County. He is staying at the Wintergreen Resort, while he prepares for the vice presidential debate, which takes place on October 11th.

On October fourth we reported Republican Presidential candidate Mitt Romney was to speak about foreign policy at the Virginia Military Institute. His campaign officials said he will QUOTE offer a stark contrast between his vision for a strong foreign policy and the failed record of President Obama END QUOTE. The speech was scheduled for Eleven Twenty AM on Monday, October Eighth.

On October fifth we reported Mitt Romney and Paul Ryan stopped in Fishersville on October fourth for a campaign rally. The Republican presidential candidate and his running mate appeared before a crowd estimated at 10,000 at the Augusta County Fairgrounds for the free event. At the rally Romney and Ryan built upon the excitement coming out of Wednesday's Presidential debate between President Obama and Romney that many say was won by Republican challenger. Both the Republican and Democratic candidates are expected to visit Virginia frequently between now and the November election, with Mr. Romney returned on Monday to deliver a Foreign Policy speech at the Virginia Military Academy in Lexington.

On October ninth we reported Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney criticized the White House's foreign policy in a speech at the Virginia Military Institute on October eighth Saying QUOTE I know the president hopes for a safer, freer, and a more prosperous Middle East allied with the United States. I share this hope, but hope is not a strategy. We cannot support our friends and defeat our enemies in the Middle East when our words are not backed up by deeds END QUOTE. Former U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright responded QUOTE I think it is really full of platitudes. You know... peace through strength, clarity, resolve - those aren't really foreign policy. END QUOTE

On October 12th we reported Tagg Romney, son of Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney, stopped in Lynchburg on October 11th to campaign for his father. The 42-year old spoke to volunteers at manning a phone bank for the Republicans at Candler's Station Mall, highlighting the nation's deficit. This is the second time in recent days that one of Romney's sons has stopped in Lynchburg, Craig was in town last month and also appeared at Candler's Station Mall.

On October 24th we reported Mitt Romney, Paul Ryan, Joe Biden and Barack Obama would all make campaign stops in Virginia over the last thirteen days of the Presidential Campaign. Paul Ryan will campaign the following Thursday in Bristol and Charlottesville; Joe Biden will campaign the following Saturday in Virginia Beach and Lynchburg; Mitt Romney will hold a rally at the University of Richmond's Robins Center the following Sunday, along with campaigns in Prince William County and

Virginia Beach. President Obama will hold a rally on October 25th at the Carillon in Byrd Park.

On October 16th we reported Paul Ryan appeared that day at Automated Conveyor Systems in Lynchburg to speak to a crowd of enthusiastic supporters. Ryan reminded his audience that they live in a battleground state, and stressed the responsibility and opportunity GOP supporters in the commonwealth have in the November 6th election to choose—quote—“a dynamic economy that creates jobs” over “economic stagnation that promotes government dependency”—end quote. Ryan spoke about the importance of self-made American businesses like Automated Conveyor Systems, which was built by CEO Mike Shenigo and his partners. Paul Ryan said—quote—“these guys built their business... The government didn’t do this for them.”—end quote.

On October 23rd we reported Republican vice presidential candidate Paul Ryan would be making a campaign stop in Albemarle County on Thursday. Tickets for the event, which would be held at Crutchfield Corporation headquarters off Dickerson Road, were free and could be picked up online or at the Charlottesville Victory Office in Albemarle Square. Doors opened at 4:30 for the rally, which started at 6:30. All attendees would go through airport-like security. Cameras are permitted.

On October 24th we reported Republican vice presidential candidate Paul Ryan was set to make a campaign stop in Albemarle County that day at a victory rally at the Crutchfield Corporation. Between 2,000 and 3,000 people were expected to attend the rally. Bill Crutchfield would be opening the rally and discussing why he is voting for Romney in the upcoming election.

On October 25th we reported President Obama showed his sense of humor in his appearance on Leno that night. Leno asked what Donald Trump has against him. Obama replied QUOTE This all dates back to when we were growing up together in Kenya END QUOTE. On a more serious note, he responded to Senate Candidate Richard Mourdock's claim that a pregnancy from rape is QUOTE something that God intended to happen END QUOTE, the President said QUOTE this underscores is this is why you don't want a bunch of politicians, mostly male, making decisions about women's healthcare END QUOTE.

On October 26th we reported President Obama stopped in Richmond’s Byrd Park on October 25th as part of his campaign for reelection. Speaking for over an hour before a crowd estimated at 15,000 at the Carillon, the President asked for votes saying he wanted to keep America moving forward. The stop is part of a whirlwind coast-to-coast tour of all-important swing states, including Colorado, Virginia, Florida and Nevada, over two days. After the rally, the President flew to Chicago to cast his lot in early voting.

On October 26th we reported Joe Biden was coming to Lynchburg. The Vice President, along with his wife and son would appear on Saturday at the City Armory as part of the final push for votes for the Presidential election set to take place in less than two weeks. Doors were set to open at 2:30 and as many as 2,000 people were expected to attend the rally. Lynchburg had been a popular spot for campaigning—there had already been visits by two of Mitt Romney's sons over the past few weeks.

On October 31st we reported that First Lady Michelle Obama announced that she would make several campaign stops in Virginia. The visits were at Hampton University, and Virginia State University in Petersburg. Both events took place on Friday November 2nd, and tickets were required.

On November 5th, we reported that a woman in Fluvanna County claimed she was sent a pamphlet that exposed the voting record of her and her neighbors. The resident said the Americans for Limited Government letter disclosed whether or not she and her six closest neighbors had voted recently to shame them into getting to the polls. The state board of elections offers a voter self defense guide on their website. Among the main points, know where you are supposed to vote, bring the correct identification, and don't believe anyone who tells you the election is being postponed.

On November 6th, we reported that election polls will be open today from six AM to seven PM, and local officials expect a large turnout. Charlottesville's general registrar Sheri Iachetta predicted that poll traffic will be highest in the morning, at lunch, and near closing time. She also advised patience: although schools are closed for the day, traffic and parking may be issues in some areas. Local transit systems were a good option: in Charlottesville, all CAT fares were waived for the day.

On November 6th, we reported that, as a key swing state, Virginia has received harried attention from both presidential campaigns in the days leading up to the election. Vice President Joe Biden and his wife Jill appeared yesterday in Sterling and Richmond on behalf of incumbent Democratic President Barack Obama, and Republican contender Mitt Romney followed a Sunday visit to Newport News with Monday appearances in Lynchburg and Fairfax. Florida congresswoman and Democratic National Committee chair person Debbie Wasserman Schultz rallied with Charlottesville volunteers on November 5th, and Republican state delegate Rob Bell cheered and held signs alongside GOP supporters. Poll workers were sworn in, and election officials expected a busy day.

On November 6th, we reported that the Albemarle County Department of Voter Registration & Elections reported their voter turnout. As of 1:00 p.m., forty-three point four seven percent of eligible voters had cast their ballots. Last presidential election in

November of 2008 forty-nine percent of voters had voted, a difference of about twelve-hundred people. As of 4 o'clock PM, Greene County turnout was at forty six percent, Madison County was at forty-five percent, and Waynesboro was at forty-nine point five percent.

On November 7th, we reported that the presidential race in Virginia was tight down to the wire. President Obama won Virginia's thirteen electoral votes, but he received fewer votes in key localities than in two thousand eight. He came out of Northern Virginia with a large margin, but his results in Henrico County and Richmond were smaller than four years ago. Libertarian Party nominee Gary Johnson, Constitution Party nominee Virgil Good and Jull Stein of the Green Party all received thousands of votes in Virginia.

On November 7th, we reported that, after predicting a narrow Romney win in Virginia, Governor Bob McDonnell expressed his disappointment to CNN this morning saying quote, "it was a tough night." McDonnell said he had not yet spoken to GOP nominee Mitt Romney in accordance to his loss last night, but had spoken to former governor George Allen who had lost his bid for seat in US Senate to Democrat, Tim Kaine. McDonnell expressed his concern in a CBS interview about the Republican Party's small window for communication throughout the nation, vying for new tactics to broaden GOP candidate support and spread the party's political message.
