## Quarterly Public Report for WNRN Public File

A-- During the 2nd quarter (October 1, -December 31 2011), WNRN News reported on and followed the following stories which other local print, broadcast media and governmental agencies found of interest to the City of Charlottesville and surrounding counties:

### **Occupy Movement**

October 14, The occupy wall street movement is coming to central Virginia. A new group, calling itself occupy Charlottesville, has been organized, and plans to occupy space either at the University of Virginia or a downtown location such as the pedestrian mall. Organizers of the local movement include veterans of similar protests in New York and Washington, DC

Oct 19- Organizers of occupy charlottesville say they want to be a part of the movement that started in new york and has spread across the world. Protesters have been occupying lee park since last weekend and have just been granted a special events permit to camp out in the park through friday evening. The protesters range from students to the employed and unemployed residents that are fed up with the condition of the economy and corporate greed. It is not known how long the protest will last but charlottesville police say they will continue to monitor the protesters, but have no plans to force them to leave the park.

October 26- Downtown Charlottesville was the scene of a mass exodus earlier today as officials evacuated City Hall. A strange chemical odor in the building caused the alert to remove all persons. The smell came from a chemical used to seal the windows and the scent got into the HVAC ducts. The firefighters took over an hour to clear City Hall from the odor and to double check the building. At 1:30 this afternoon the building was given the all clear.

Oct 27- After being granted an extension, the Occupy Charlottesville group can now stay in Lee Park. The director of Charlottesville Parks and Recreation says the group had been reapplying for a permit extension every three days since last week. The group's permit will now be renewed automatically, but every thirty days, the permit will continue to be revisited by the group.

Nov 2- Occupy charlottesville in lee park was occupied by local police yesterday, three men were arrested and two girls taken to the hospital. Police do not believe the people involved in the incident had any ties with occupy charlottesville. The three men arrested are all believed to be homeless and face of number of charges involving trespassing, being drunk in public, possessing of marijuana, and providing alcohol to minors. The two young females were taken to uva medical center. People close to the occupy

movement say the publicity doesn't look good for their cause but they are glad police are nearby to ensure safety for all.

Nov 22- Members of the Occupy Charlottesville movement rallied last night before attending a city council meeting addressing their fate in Lee Park. More than one-hundred Occupiers wore red clothing and marched to show their solidarity. The city had granted Occupiers permission to camp in the park for thirty days, but that time runs out on Saturday. The council heard hours of public feedback last night, and talks will continue, with councilors seeming split on the balance between First Amendment rights and order in public parks.

Nov 22- The Occupy Charlottesville Movement has tapped into an electrical source in the middle of Lee Park. The City of Charlottesville is releasing details on how the electrical bill of \$8.23 in October and \$36.24 in November will be handled.

Nov 23- Occupy charlottesville participants are giving thanks today to city officials who granted the group an indefinite stay at lee park until a more suitable location is found. Mayor dave norris said officials have created a win-win situation for locals who want their park back while also allowing the occupy group the chance to assemble elsewhere. Some options for the group to move to include, larger areas such as mcintire park, darden towne park and other open areas. Norris said he's gotten positive feedback from several north downtown residents who are glad the park will be restored.

Nov 28- Occupy Charlottesville protestors are unsure of whether or not they are allowed to stay in Lee Park. Last Monday the protestors were given permits that would allow them to stay in the park until tomorrow but many protestors say they want to stay longer. The protestors are speaking with city officials in hopes of gaining permission to stay in the park or being allowed to move somewhere else. One protestor said quote " we are not going away." The group planned a meeting with the Charlottesville mayor on Sunday to discuss the length of their stay in the park.

Nov 30- The protestors in Charlottesville's Lee Park received a twenty-four hour extension for their permit. The Occupy Charlottesville group has until 11pm tonight to leave Lee Park. Charlottesville Mayor Dave Norris said he wants the protestors to dismiss from the park in a peaceful manner and this is not an open extension of the permit. There is an idea to move the protest to George Rogers Clark Park across from the Red Roof Inn at UVa. This park is owned by the University of Virginia who has yet to comment on the protestors move to their property. Mayor Norris believes the Free Speech Wall on the Downtown Mall might be a better fit for the group.

Dec 1- Occupy Charlottesville protesters are running out of options after the city refused to extend their permit in Lee Park. The group had planned to move across town to University owned George Rodgers Clark Park, but school officials posted notices saying that protesters would not be welcome. Applications to set up camp in McIntire Park were

denied as well. Group leaders said they would continue the movement with marches and political actions if no other site could be found. Those who refuse to leave will face arrest.

Dec 1- This morning, cleanup crews started working in Lee Park after the Occupy Charlottesville Protesters were forced out and eighteen people were arrested for refusing to leave. Starting around seven AM, the crews cleaned up trash and signs left behind. The clean up, which only took about an hour, involved taking some of the items left behind to the public works yard and splitting the people into three different task-oriented groups. Aside from some dead grass, the park is back to its pre-occupy state.

Dec 5- Organizers of the Occupy Richmond movement plan to march through the city on Saturday. Members of the group state they will march from Monroe Park to Kanawha Plaza, at which a solidarity rally will be held. The movement had camped at Kanawha Plaza before they were evicted from the site. There are supporters who currently camp in the yard of Raymond H. Boone. Boone is the publisher of the Richmond Free Press and next-door-neighbor of Richmond Mayor Dwight C. Jones.

Dec 12- Charlottesville police are investigating the vandalism recently reported in Lee Park. Sunday afternoon around three pm police received a call reporting that someone had spray painted quote "occupy will rise again" on the Robert E. Lee statue. Occupy protestors were removed from Lee Park in early December. While police were notified yesterday about the vandalism, they are not sure when it happened. Police have asked that anyone with information on the incident to call crime stoppers at 434-977-4000.

Dec 20- Media outlets say Occupy Richmond is ending its protest on Richmond Free Press Publisher Raymond Boone's front lawn. Boone's house is next door to the mayor of Richmond's house – Boone invited the protest to camp on his yard after the movement was cleared from downtown Oct 31st. Occupy Richmond says it plans to concentrate its activities toward urban neighborhoods – these will include service projects, community outreach and educational forums.

### **Earthquake/ Hurricane Irene**

On October 4<sup>th</sup>, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) has officially commended Dominion Power's response to the five-point-eight magnitude earthquake in August. The NRC says Dominion acted appropriately when it shut down its two nuclear reactors at the North Anna Power Station. A team of NRC officials have been surveying the station for the past three weeks, and they have concluded that it suffered no significant damage, though some non-safety equipment issues did arise. The station has been offline since the quake.

On October 12, Virginia's governor bob mcdonnell is asking president barack obama to visit the area around the epicenter of august's earthquake so he can see the damage for

himself. Obama's administration turned down virginia's application for federal assistance for individuals whose homes or businesses were damaged in the august 23rd 5.8-magnitude earthquake centered in mineral. In a letter to the democratic president, mcdonnell urged obama to visit mineral to see the damage firsthand when he's in virginia promoting his jobs package next week.

On October 13, yet another aftershock was felt yesterday in Louisa County as residents are still repairing buildings damaged in the region's August twenty third earthquake. Schools were briefly evacuated, but no damage was reported. The Louisa county high school was damaged in the August quake, so students alternate having class in portable trailers and sharing the Louisa County Middle School.

October 19- The earthquake that rocked louisa county on august 23<sup>rd</sup> wrecked some 900 homes and has so far amassed about 18-million dollars in damages. Without federal relief assistance, louisa county's board of supervisors voted to pass tax relief for homeowners whose homes suffered in the quake. A meals tax to help pay for extensive damage to the county's schools will be up for referendum on nov. 8.

Oct 21- Some concerned citizens are filing an emergency enforcement petition against the reboot of the North Anna nuclear reactors. Local and regional members of the People's Alliance for Clean Energy and Not on Our Fault Line believe the Nuclear Regulatory Commission has not thoroughly investigated the station after the five-point-eight magnitude earthquake in August. The groups will hold a press conference this afternoon at one at the Mineral Post Office, the quake's epicenter. The NRC is still collecting information about the reactors, but the regulatory body is expected to approve a restart.

October 27- Work has begun on Louisa County High School and Thomas Jefferson Elementary to return them to working order after the earthquake on August 23<sup>rd</sup>. In addition, the first stages of the new temporary modular high school are already in place, so that students will be able to attend class on a normal schedule in the converted trailers. Currently, middle and high school students are sharing classroom space, but to meet Virginia accreditation Standards high school students need to move into the modular facility by February.

Nov 1- Financial aid may yet come to victims of the August earthquake. Governor Bob McDonnell appealed FEMA's denial of relief last week, and now, State Senator Ed Houck is proposing a new bill to help homeowners pay for repairs. Under Houck's bill, homeowners paying for such repairs out of their own pockets would be eligible for new tax credits. FEMA has not decided upon McDonnell's appeal yet, and as resident David Clark noted, immediate assistance would be more helpful.

Nov 1- Crews in Louisa County are laying the groundwork and rebuilding after the August 23rd earthquake. In lieu of classrooms pods are being erected. Today the water,

sewer and electrical are being completed – by Friday all pods should be in place. The school district is hoping to have all students moved in by February 2012.

Nov 9- The federal emergency management agency will open a disaster relief station today in Louisa County to help those residents whose homes or businesses were damaged in the August earthquake. FEMA's center will be located at 502 E. Main Street in the Triangle Plaza. The center will operate from 9:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 1 to 6 p.m. on Sundays. Only residents and businesses who have registered with FEMA will be eligible for aid. Residents can register by calling 1-800-621-F.E.M.A or by going to [www.disasterassistance.gov](http://www.disasterassistance.gov).

Nov 10- The Federal Emergency Management Agency has approved Federal Disaster Aid for Louisa County Schools. The approved request by Governor McDonnell came after schools in the county were damaged by the earthquake on August twenty-third. Although Governor McDonnell believes that there is still work ahead for schools, he says, quote, "This is great news for Louisa County Schools and Virginia. I want to thank county and school officials for working with us and FEMA to pull together the necessary information to make this happen. I also want to thank the President and FEMA for their quick approval of our request." Currently, the Louisa County high school and the Thomas Jefferson Elementary School are closed because of the damage.

Nov 10- If people are out of work because of the August twenty-third earthquake or because of the aftershocks, the Virginia Employment Commission says disaster unemployment assistance is available. Until people are able to return to work, if they are not already covered by state unemployment insurance programs, they may be able to get up to three-hundred-and-seventy-eight dollars a week. Reasons that will be considered appropriate to receive benefits include having a workplace that is no longer in business because of the earthquake, being unable to work because of injury or damage, or no longer being able to travel to your place of employment.

Nov 14- Dominion VA Power's North Anna Power station has been given the OK to restart today. The reactor has been offline since the five point eight magnitude earthquake in August. Since then, both reactors have undergone over 100 thousand hours of inspection. The inspection and evaluation cost about 21 million dollars. The August quake also shifted 25 nuclear storage containers but they were not damaged. As the reactors are restarted today they will be closely monitored according to the NRC's Office of Nuclear Reactor Regulation. It is expected to be about 10 days before the plant is fully operational again.

Nov 15- Earlier today the switch was turned back on at the North Anna nuclear power plant. Dominion Virginia Power reactivated the plant at ten am following several months of down time. The plant was taken off line following the August 23<sup>rd</sup> earthquake that was centered eleven miles from the plant. Last Friday the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission granted Dominion the authority to restart the plant following a thorough inspection that found no damage to the nuclear facility.

Nov 29- The National Education Association has donated ten thousand dollars to Louisa County Public Schools to help rebuilding after the earthquake on August twenty-third. The quake damaged two of the division's schools severely, and LCPS officials were grateful for the funds, which were presented in a check at the November School board meeting. The donation comes from the NEA's non-profit health and safety branch, the NEA health network.

Dec 6- The Federal Emergency Management Agency has greenlit more than five million dollars in aid grants to earthquake victims in Louisa County. The majority of the money is allotted for housing expenses, and nearly thirty-thousand dollars is available for other disaster-related needs, such as medical expenses. In addition, the U.S. Small Business Administration offers over seven-hundred thousand dollars in low-interest disaster loans to help homeowners, renters, and business owners.

Dec 20- The Federal Emergency Management Agency as extended its deadline to apply for disaster aid in Louisa County. Renters, homeowners, and business owners now have until March fifth of twenty-twelve to apply for assistance to pay for temporary housing, essential home repairs, and other costs not covered by insurance. Louisa County residents and quake victims may inquire and register at one-eight-hundred, six-two-one-FEMA or at disaster-assistance-dot-gov.

Dec 22- Virginia's governor is asking FEMA to dish out more money to residents affected by the August earthquake. Governor Bob McDonnell wants the Federal Emergency Management Association to supply individual aid for the counties of Albemarle, Culpepper, Fluvanna, Goochland, King, George, Orange and Spotsylvania and the city of Fredericksburg. FEMA has already approved aid for Louisa and Spotsylvania counties and Fredericksburg for the damage they suffered from the quake.

### **Route 29 Western By-Pass**

October 27- The Southern Environmental Law Center released a report this week that argues the proposed Charlottesville bypass will not alleviate the city's traffic woes. The SELC hopes to block the extensive construction project on environmental grounds, and says any traffic benefits from the bypass will be offset by new residential construction north of town. As an alternative, they propose cheaper infrastructure improvements along the route to increase its capacity.

### **Virginia Lacrosse Murder**

October 25, 2011- A hearing is scheduled for tomorrow in the case of George Huguely. Huguely is suspected of killing his college girlfriend and fellow lacrosse player Yeardeley Love. His defense team will argue in court on Wednesday for access to Love's entire medical record as a UVA student: they say they need complete access so that their

physician can assess her case as a whole. The defense team is attempting to discredit the cause of a death as blunt force trauma, arguing instead that she died of a medication-induced heartbeat irregularity. His attorneys have also filed a request that tomorrow's hearing take place in private.

Nov 4- A hearing to prepare for George Hugueley's court case has been set for Monday November seventh. Hugueley is accused of the first degree murder of UVA lacrosse player Yeardeley Love on May third twenty-ten. Among the motions to be heard are whether the court will allow cameras inside the courtroom during the February trial and to disallow quote "prejudicial photographs" taken of Yeardeley Love's body after the attempted resuscitation by paramedics. Another motion is a request for selected jurors to be sequestered in a hotel instead of returning to their homes at the end of each day in court. Rulings on these motions can be made up until the time of the February hearing.

Nov 7- Today attorneys for University of Virginia Lacrosse player George Hugueley plant to argue that it will be extremely difficult to find an impartial jury in the local area. Hugueley is charged with the death of former girlfriend and fellow UVA lacrosse player, Yeardeley Love. According to one UVA Law professor, it is not unusual for the attorneys to request special jury selection, Hugueley's lawyers are concerned that the amount of local and national attention will make jury selection that much harder. The lawyers are also concerned about the role that social media plays for the jury members.

Nov 7- A pre-trial motions hearing was held today in Charlottesville Circuit Court for George Hugueley. Judge Edward Hogshire issued several rulings. There will be a behind closed doors review of Yeardeley Love's medical records while she was a student at UVA. A jury questionnaire is under review and camera in court requests by In Session television and NBC29 were denied. If Hugueley's family are witnesses to be used during sentencing, they cannot be in the courtroom during the trial. A hearing has been set for November eighteenth twenty eleven at four PM to discuss the jury questionnaires as well as administrative issues dealing with security and media access during the trial.

Nov 8- In a closed hearing yesterday, the defense team for former UVA lacrosse player George Hugueley was granted access to the complete medical records of Yeardeley Love, Hugueley's ex-girlfriend and fellow lacrosse player. Hugueley faces first-degree murder charges in Love's beating death of last year, and his lawyers will try to prove that alcohol and adderall—not physical blows—killed Love. The judge also granted the defense's request that jurors complete an impartiality questionnaire, which will be drawn up by next Friday.

Nov 22- A hearing was held today in the first degree murder case against George Hugueley, The Charlottesville Circuit Court has asked for input in the jury selection process. Both the defense and the prosecution finalized the jury questionnaire and will submit their thoughts on the jury selection process on Monday.

Nov 29- Jury selection will begin soon in the trial of George Huguely. Yesterday, lawyers from both the prosecution and defense provided input on how the selection will happen. While that information is confidential, other details are available. A jury questionnaire has been completed, and it is possible that three hundred jurors will be called. Normally, jurors will receive duty notices about three weeks before the trial, but Huguely jurors will receive their notices in the next few days. Jurors must be available from December nineteenth through February seventeenth, with the trial scheduled to start on February sixth.

Dec 13- Over three-hundred Charlottesville residents received jury summons for the pending Hugely trial. The two-week trial is scheduled to begin on February sixth, and potential jurors will be in the Charlottesville Circuit Courthouse next Monday for orientation. Huguely is accused of murdering UVA lacrosse player Yeardeley Love in May of twenty-ten. Also, earlier this month, Judge Edward Hogshire ruled that members of Huguely's family are not permitted to attend the trial if they are going to testify at sentencing.

Dec 19- Charlottesville residents have been advised to avoid the downtown area today. Over three hundred potential jurors have been summoned downtown to be interviewed for the George Huguely murder case. The jurors will fill out lengthy questionnaires of over forty questions from the defense and the commonwealth. The large group has been split in half to attempt to avoid parking problems. Huguely's two week trial will start on February sixth.

### **Meadow Creek Parkway**

Nov 3- Albemarle County Officials have delayed their resolution to ask the Virginia Department of Transportation to open the Meadow Creek Parkway, pending further traffic studies. County Supervisor Kenneth Boyd had demanded that the road be opened as soon as it was safe to drive on, but he said he is willing to wait a few weeks for traffic light timings to be established. The Board of Supervisors is scheduled to hear the VDOT reports on November fifteenth, and said they plan to open the road shortly after that.

Dec 8- The Virginia Department of Transportation is nearly finished preparing the Meadow Creek Parkway after the Albemarle County Board of Supervisors passed a resolution to open it to traffic. The project was completed in October, but signage and traffic signals are still being installed. The Board of Supervisors was critical of the delay, but were optimistic that VDOT will finish their work in the next few weeks.

### **Virginia Tech Shooting**

Dec 8 [3pm]- Virginia Tech and Montgomery County schools are currently in lock down following a shooting today. Montgomery County Schools state that all of their students are safe and will remain at school for the time being.

According to the Virginia Tech Web site a campus police officer stopped a vehicle in a

routine traffic stop near the Coliseum parking lot close to McComas Hall. During this traffic stop, at around noon, the Virginia Tech police officer was shot and killed. Witnesses then saw the shooter flee on foot towards the Cage parking lot adjacent to Duck Pond Drive. At the Cage lot a second shooting victim was found who is also deceased. The second shooting occurred a fair distance from the first fatality. The area of the Cage parking lot is close to the 460 bypass.

The Virginia State Police are assisting the campus police at the scene. At this time the whereabouts and status of the shooter are unknown. All persons at the Virginia Tech campus are urged to stay where they are and the campus remains on lockdown. There were reports after 2pm of additional gun shots. Virginia Tech is stating that those reports are false.

The school says it will hold a briefing with the media at 4:20 this afternoon.

Dec 8 [5pm]- Virginia Tech and Montgomery County schools have lifted their lock down statuses following a shooting today. According to the Virginia Tech Web site a campus police officer stopped a vehicle in a routine traffic stop near the Coliseum parking lot close to McComas Hall. During this traffic stop, at around noon, the Virginia Tech police officer was shot and killed. Witnesses then saw the shooter flee on foot towards the Cage parking lot adjacent to Duck Pond Drive. At the Cage lot a second shooting victim was found who is also deceased. The second shooting occurred a fair distance from the first fatality. The authorities have recovered a weapon at the scene of the second fatality. The area of the Cage parking lot is close to the 460 bypass.

There are reports from law enforcement officials that the second victim is the suspect. This second person is an unknown male according to Virginia State Police. The suspect described as white male, gray sweat pants, gray hat w/neon green brim, maroon hoodie and backpack.

The Virginia State Police are assisting the campus police at the scene. At this time the whereabouts and status of the shooter are unknown. All persons at the Virginia Tech campus are urged to stay where they are and the campus remains on lockdown. There were reports after 2pm of additional gun shots. Virginia Tech is stating that those reports are false.

Virginia Tech Police, in conjunction with other law enforcement agencies, have determined that there is no longer an active threat or a need to secure in place. Resume normal activities.

Dec 9- Officials at Virginia Tech have released more details about yesterday's shooting. They say that the campus police officer who was killed was 39-year old army veteran Deriek Crouse, a father and step father to five. An as-yet unidentified man shot and killed Crouse at the site of a routine traffic stop on campus yesterday afternoon before fleeing the scene and apparently taking his own life. The incident comes more than four years after 33 were killed by a shooter on campus in 2007; those affected have reported that the Blacksburg school quickly warned the community of the threat.

Dec 12- We are learning more details about the events that led to the Tech shooting last week. In a later interview the gunman's neighbor said that twenty two year old Ross Ashley had a dark side. Before Ashley arrived on the Tech campus he robbed his Radford

University rental agent for a new SUV. The car was later found out of gas just outside of the Tech campus. Police are still unsure if the gunman had a permit for his gun. A graduate student who was injured in the April 2007 shooting turned his experience into activism and said quote "guns on campus aren't the solution; they are the problem."

Dec-12 Investigators say the family of a man who gunned down a Virginia Tech policeman has offered its condolences and prayers to the family of the slain officer. The unsigned statement was sent to the Associated Press yesterday, in which the family also requested their privacy be respected. Investigators are still trying to determine a motive for last Thursday's unprovoked attack, in which 22-year-old Ross Truitt Ashley fatally shot Officer Deriek Crouse on Tech's Blacksburg campus. A funeral service is held today.

Dec 13- Memorial services were held yesterday for the Virginia Tech police officer who was shot and killed last week. Thirty-nine year old Deriek Crouse was a father of five and army veteran. He was shot last Thursday, allegedly by twenty-two year old Ross Truett Ashley. Police have found no links between Ashley and Crouse, and they are still looking for a motive. According to state police, Ashley may also be responsible for hijacking an SUV at gunpoint the day before the shooting.
