1/8/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

### **ARSON ARREST - VO**

A second person is arrested in the series of arson cases in Pike Road. 19 year old Justin Gorman was arrested over the weekend originally on burglary charges. Montgomery County Sheriff D-T Marshall says today Gorman was charged with arson in connection with fires in pike road over the past 18 months. Gorman is a volunteer firefighter for Rolling Hills. Last month, 21-year-old Jason Michael Green was charged with arson in the cases. Green is a Montgomery firefighter and a volunteer firefighter for Pike Road.

1/9/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

### **MURDER – VO**

Montgomery police are investigating their first homicide of the year. Around two this afternoon Police arrived at a home on Crescent Street to find 21 year old Willie Harris had been shot in the neck twice. Paramedics pronounced him dead a few minutes later. Around the same time police found a second man -- Fredricas Giles -- about a block over on Ridgecrest Street -- who had been shot in the foot. Giles has been arrested and charged with Harris's murder.

### **HYUNDAI TRIAL – VO**

Prosecutors in South Korea want Hyundai Motor Company Chairman Chung Mong-koo to go to prison if he's convicted of embezzlement and other charges. Those prosecutors demand that Chung serve six years behind bars. Chung has been on trial since June accused of spending 74 million dollars for private and other purposes, including payments to lobbyists for government favors. The verdict and sentencing are expected next month. Hyundai builds cars and SUVs at a massive plant in Montgomery.

### **ASU SHOOTING**

Some Alabama State University students say they're fed up with violence on campus. The latest case happened last night when someone shot a student at the entrance to the university's "Alabama Room." First at 9 - - CW News Reporter Trish Williford joins us with more on the search for the shooter and the reaction among students.

### **TROY RAPE UPDATE**

Troy campus police are still trying to come up with a composite sketch of the man who raped a Troy University student last weekend. Troy campus police are interviewing students who saw the suspect that night. The assault happened around 10-30 Saturday night at Hamil Hall. If you have any information about this case, you're asked to call Troy University Police at 670-1999.

**PIKE ROAD ARSON – VO**

A third person now faces charges in connection with a string of arsons in Pike Road. Montgomery County deputies say 22-year-old James Lawson Wilhite faces arson charges in a barn fire, and is being held at Henry County jail on separate charges. Jason Michael Green and Justin Gorman were arrested a few weeks ago on arson charges. There have been at least 15 suspicious fires in Pike Road in recent months.

1/24/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**MAN SHOT**

Montgomery Police are looking for the person who shot a man on the city's Westside. Police say Rodney Stovall was shot last night just outside Moseley Meat and Grocery Store on Rosa Parks Avenue. He is listed in guarded condition at a Montgomery hospital. Police say they think Stovall knows who shot him but will not give them the information.

1/25/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**ELMORE CO. MURDER – VO**

An argument between a landlord and tenant leaves one man dead. The shooting happened just off Alabama Highway 143 in Deatsville last night. Sheriff's deputies say 26-year-old Travis Smith died from a gunshot wound. Smith's landlord, Tommy Joe Swearingin, has been charged with murder. Police said there is apparently a history of landlord-tenant problems at the apartment complex.

1/29/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**SHOTS FIRED – VO**

Montgomery Police are trying to find out who fired shots at them at Cross Ridge Road and Hunters Branch, just off Narrow Lane Road, shortly after three this afternoon. Montgomery Police Captain Huey Thornton says when police arrived to the area more shots were fired. The entire area was sealed off, and the SWAT team was called to the scene. If you have any information, call Montgomery police at 241-2651.

1/31/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**ALEX CITY ARREST - VO**

Alexander City Police arrest two people in two attempted murder cases. Police say they've arrested Jeremy Bradford in one case. He's accused in a stabbing that put the victim in a hospital. Police say they've also charged Michael Joiner with attempted murder after he allegedly stabbed a person who was mud-riding on a friend's property.

2/5/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**BANK ROBBERY – VO**

Montgomery Police arrest a man they think robbed a bank this morning. Police say the man went into the Wachovia Bank on East Boulevard, gave the impression he had a gun, and then made off with money. Officers arrested Jabree Williams a short time later at a house in the Carriage Hills neighborhood. The FBI will take over the case since bank robbery is a federal offense.

2/8/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**TEEN MURDERED**

One teenager is dead and another wounded after a shooting last night in Montgomery. Police say an 18-year-old man was sitting in a car on Hilldale Drive when someone came up to the car and shot him before shooting a 16-year-old nearby. The man was taken to Jackson Hospital and pronounced dead. Police are still looking for the shooter. If you have any information, call Montgomery Police at 241-2651.

2/14/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**JEFF DAVIS ARREST – VO**

A Montgomery High School student is arrested on the suspicion of bringing a weapon onto campus. Police say the Jeff Davis student, brought a 380-caliber handgun to the school yesterday. School officials say that students found with weapons on campus are recommended for expulsion. This comes one day after a 12-year-old student at E.D. Nixon Elementary School was arrested for bringing a B-B gun to school.

2/19/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**SELMA FATAL ROBBERY**

Selma Police say store owner Nathaniel Gary was closing his business for the day on Saturday night when two people approached him, apparently to rob him. Officers say that's when Gary shot and killed 18-year-old Michael Walker. Police say Walker had fired back hitting Gary in the leg. Walker was pronounced dead at the scene.

2/22/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**PRATTVILLE SUSPECT – VO**

There is new information on the Prattville man charged with soliciting a juvenile over the Internet. Investigators think he may have targeted victims across the United States. Matthew Abernathy is being held in the Jefferson County jail. Police in the Jefferson County town of Morris say they caught Abernathy in a sting operation. Authorities say Abernathy chatted on-line with someone he thought was a 14-year old girl and went to meet her, but the child was actually an undercover officer.

3/7/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**BODY FOUND UPDATE**

Montgomery Police say they still have no suspect in the murder of a man whose body was found last night. Police found 37-year-old Ronald Pompey in a parking lot on Adams Avenue last night. He had been shot twice, and right now police say they don't have a suspect. They believe the shooting could have happened in the nearby Tulane Court housing community. **MURDER ARREST – VO**

A Montgomery man, 38 year old Christopher Byrd is behind bars tonight charged with the murder of Robert Pompey. Pompey was found shot to death Tuesday night on Adams Street. Byrd is held in the Montgomery County Detention Facility under a 50 thousand dollar bond.

**COP SHOT AT ARREST- VO**

Police charge three people in connection to Shots fired in a Montgomery neighborhood. One shot nearly hit a police officer. 17 year old Cordarryl Foxhall has been charged with attempted murder, and is accused of shooting at the officer as he was investigating complaints of gunfire and drug use on Yougene curve. 22 year old John Todd and 22 year old Cornelius Shepherd were also taken into custody during the investigation.

**CLEANERS ROBBERY - VO**

Police say two men wearing masks walked into Dixie Cleaners on Norman Bridge Road with a gun and got away with cash. Authorities searched the neighborhood for most of the morning looking for the robbers. No word on how much money was stolen. If you have any information call Montgomery police at 241-2651.

**GUY TRIAL – VO**

A man accused of leaving his step daughter to die in a burning house will soon go before a Tallapoosa County judge. 52 year old Harold Guy was indicted on murder and child abuse charges in the death of his stepdaughter, Amanda Moler. Guy pled guilty to both charges. The teen died in her bedroom when their home in New Site caught fire last August. The case will go before the judge in April.

**CHILD PORN VO**

State lawmakers are taking a stand against child sex predators. State Representatives passed a bill that will cause a person to lose their property if that person is convicted of soliciting a child by computer. Several legislators expressed concern the measure might cause a wife to lose her home if her husband was soliciting children on the computer without her knowledge. But Lea Fite, the bill's sponsor says the home would not be taken if the woman didn't know about the crime.

**8TH MURDER FOLO – VO**

25 year old Eugene, Shawty Smith started the group Deuce Komradz seven years ago with several high school friend including Dorothy Anderson's two sons. She had just given the young men a party during a week long celebration that ended abruptly. Witnesses say two females got into an altercation with two males. Smith became involved and that's when the shooting happened. Police say they have good leads and could soon make an arrest. The other person shot, 27-year-old Ryshaun London is in the hospital in serious condition.

**RED LEVEL MAP – ANIM MAP**

A man is being held on a one-million dollar bond in Covington County on rape and sodomy charges. From the CW News at 9's South Alabama Newsroom, Billy Wayne Grace of Red Level is behind bars after an alleged female victim told police she was raped and sodomized. Deputies told the Andalusia Star News the reported attack happened off a dirt road south of Andalusia about a week ago.

### **INAUGURATION SET-UP - VO**

Dexter Avenue in downtown Montgomery is slowly being transformed for inauguration day next Monday. Governor Bob Riley and other state leaders will be sworn into office. For Riley, it will mark the start of his second term. Bleachers have been put in place for those who will attend next week. The swearing in will be held at noon, with a parade following at 1:30 along Dexter Avenue.

1/8/07 – 10-10:30 P.M.

### **ARTUR DAVIS NO SENATE - VO**

Alabama Congressman Artur Davis says he will not run against Senator Jeff Sessions in 2008. However, Davis says he will likely seek statewide office in 2010 possibly in a bid for governor or for the Senate seat held by Republican Richard Shelby. He says he decided not to seek the Senate seat in 2008 after being named to the House Ways and Means Committee. Davis is a three-term Democrat from Birmingham.

1/9/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

### **LEGISLATURE - PACKAGE**

The table is set for democrat senators Jim Pruiett and Hinton Mitchum to fight for the pro tem position. At the last minute, Pruiett removed his name from the ballot, messing up the republican strategy to help seven democrats to elect a more moderate leader. Mitchum won, and that is because one of the seven democrats changed his mind.

1/16/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

### **SENATE SQUABBLE**

The Alabama House and Senate wrapped up another organizational session today. In the end, the senate left on a sour note fighting over committee assignments and the procedural rules. In a close 18 to 17 vote -- Senators voted to enact their rules and dismiss, but not to the approval of Republicans and a few moderate Democrat senators who say the rules are unfair -- and that it's a set up by the majority of Democrats to give all legislators a pay raise. Governor Riley has said he will veto that bill if it comes across his desk.

1/18/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**TALKBACK – VO**

Alabama's new secretary of state Beth Chapman is getting to work after being sworn into office Monday. Chapman was our guest on Talkback today on CBS 8 News at 5:00. She talked about what she plans to do to get Alabama into compliance with the federally-required "Help America Vote" act, which requires the set up of a computerized voter registration database. Chapman says she's learned a lot so far.

1/19/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**NATIONAL NEWS**

White House officials say that President Bush will address the violence in Iraq in his state of the union speech tomorrow night. The president's speech will come nearly two weeks after he said he is sending more than 21-thousand additional U-S troops there in an effort to end violence.

1/23/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**STATE OF THE UNION – VO**

President Bush recently finished his state of the union address. As expected the nation's leader urged bipartisan cooperation to achieve big things for America. He spoke about energy conservation, calling for a 20 percent consumption cut over 10 years. He also proposed a tax deduction on health insurance premiums over 15 thousand dollars to improve the country's health care. He also addressed the situation in Iraq saying that we can not afford to lose.

2/13/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**PRIMARY VOTE – VO**

Next year's Alabama presidential primary which has already been moved earlier in the year could be moved yet again. Both Democrats and Republicans are working on a bill to move the primary from February fifth to February second. That would mean voters would go to the polls on a Saturday. The idea is to get Alabama away from the group of states also deciding to hold primaries on February fifth, and to avoid any problems with Fat Tuesday celebrations.

2/26/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**CLINTON OBAMA – VO**

Illinois senator Barack Obama won't be the only presidential candidate in Selma Sunday. Fellow candidate Senator Hillary Clinton of New York says she will also attend the Bridge Crossing Jubilee. The event commemorates the Selma-to-Montgomery voting rights march. Each of the candidates will speak to separate church congregations at the same time. Afterward, both Clinton and Obama are expected to join civil rights veterans in walking across the Edmund Pettus Bridge.

2/27/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**BRIDGE BOYCOTT – AMIN VO**

The Elmore county commission has voted unanimously to sponsor a boycott of the Emerald Mountain toll bridge near Wetumpka. Commissioners are upset that the Michigan company that owns the bridge is hiking the toll from a dollar to a dollar and-a-half. The commission wants the Alabama Public Service Commission to have authority over the bridge so that toll increases would have to be voted on. The new toll is set to take effect Thursday.

3/9/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**IRS TAX RELIEF - VO**

Those affected by the deadly storms that swept through the area last week have been given an extension on their taxes by the IRS. Residents who live in Coffee, Dale, Henry, Montgomery and Wilcox counties now have until April 30th to file their returns. An IRS spokesman says if the Federal Emergency Management Agency declares more counties disaster areas, they will be added to the list. He also said taxpayers can claim the tornado or storm damage as a loss on their 2006 return, even though the storm hit in 2007.

3/14/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**WORLEY INDICTED – VO TAG**

Former Secretary of State Nancy Worley is now under indictment facing felony and misdemeanor charges connected to her unsuccessful re-election campaign last year. She's accused of soliciting campaign funds from employees in the secretary of state's office. Worley tells us a campaign letter was sent to some of her employees but she says it was clear there would be no retaliation if they didn't donate. She is expected to turn herself into the Montgomery County Sheriff's office tomorrow morning.

3/15/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**WORLEY TURNS HERSELF IN – PKG**

Shortly before nine the former secretary of state accompanied by her attorney turned herself in at the Montgomery County Jail. During her 50 minutes inside the booking center Nancy Worley was processed and her mug shot taken by jail personnel. She had few comments from reporters as she was driven away, free, with one restriction that she report into the county community corrections program.

3/19/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**MONTGOMERY COUNTY SHERIFF DISPUTE – VO**

A battle could be brewing between Montgomery County Sheriff D.T. Marshall and county magistrates. We have obtained a letter from Sheriff Marshall to Court Administrator Patrick Murphy. In it Marshall asks the Administrative Office of Courts to intervene because of past problems getting warrants. He says it seems magistrates keep officers from doing their jobs and that Murphy allows them to do so. The county commission is working on a solution to make the process more efficient.

3/20/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**RILEY'S VETO – PKG.**

State legislators override Governor Bob Riley's veto and give themselves a 62-percent pay raise. hundreds protested on the state house steps showing they're upset that lawmakers want more money, but that and Governor Riley's veto of the 61% pay raise didn't stop lawmakers. John Knight said state employees, teachers, and everyone is getting a pay raise except members of the legislature. 57 members voted yes, 41 said no.

3/22/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**TALKBACK – VO**

This week's vote by Legislators to give themselves a 62-percent pay raise is still the talk of the state. Senator Larry Dixon of Montgomery voted against the pay raise. He says he didn't like the way the situation was handled and that it was a selfish act to consider their own pay over other concerns.

**SENATE RULES – VO**

Some Alabama senators want to make the entire senate more accountable for its actions. They want to keep changes from being made without the rest of the senate knowing about them. Senator Jabo Waggoner of Birmingham says one example of the problem was the first vote on raising legislators' pay. He says the bill was brought up out of order and passed quickly through a voice vote. Proposed changes include requiring at least four senators to raise their hands to get the attention of the chair for a roll call vote.

To help fight obesity in the state a new program called "Scale Back Alabama" is underway. Its goal is for Alabamians to lose 10 million pounds by March. At Baptist South in Montgomery, different teams were taking part in their first weigh in. The team that loses the most weight statewide on a percentage basis will win a cash prize. But the ultimate goal of everyone involved is to lead healthier lives. So far almost 900 teams have pre-registered for Scale Back Alabama.

### **FAMILY FIRST – PKG.**

This year's flu season hit Alabama early, with cases reported as early as August. According officials with the U-A-B of Medicine flu outbreaks are now being reported more in state to the west and north. During this year's flu outbreak at least ten Alabama children had to be treated in intensive care units. This year's flu season has been considered moderately severe with several types of the flu being reported.

### **PEANUT BUTTER RECALL – VO TAG GFX**

Nearly 300 cases of salmonella have been traced to two national brands of peanut butter. Jars of Peter Pan and Great Value peanut butter are being recalled after the outbreak of salmonella poisoning. The jars are marked with a product code beginning with the numbers 2-1-1-1 on the lid. Alabama is among the 39 states where the salmonella cases have been reported.

### **BLOOD DRIVE – VO**

Workers at LifeSouth Blood Community Blood Centers are asking all Alabamians to donate blood during the next several days to keep hospitals stocked. They say people with blood type O are especially needed because they are the universal donors. **TALKBACK – SOT TAG**

The past year has been a busy one for the agriculture department because of numerous food scares. State Agriculture Commissioner Ron Sparks talked about recent consumer alerts including contaminated spinach last year to the pet food recall that happened about two weeks ago. He says the main thing is to make sure foreign products sold in American food markets meet the same qualifications as U-S grown foods. That's an example of why we've been so aggressive in making sure that the food products we get from other countries are produced at the same standards that we ask our farmers to produce it. The most recent food recalls in 2007 were Peter Pan and Wal Mart peanut butter as well as several brands of pet foods.

Students at Vaughn Road Elementary in Montgomery will soon be able to buy much-needed library books thanks in part to airmen from Maxwell Air Force Base. As we showed you last May, Vaughn Road Elementary lost half of its 10-thousand library books to mildew leaving the school with only nine books per student. A student at the Squadron Officer School at Maxwell saw our report and decided to raise money. The 470-member class presented a check for more than 22-hundred dollars to the school to buy new books. The school's principal says money will definitely help the library and the students' accelerated reading program.

2/20/07 – 9-9:30 P.M.

**WRWOS – PKG.**

These students have gathered at Faulkner University for the Freedom Forums which are designed to help them make the right choices as they go through life. The program was brought to the capital city 12 years ago by the Montgomery county commission. "What we want them to appreciate is that there are consequences to their actions. They make good choices; they're going to have good actions. They make bad choices; they are going to have bad actions." Students also heard from special speakers about citizenship, drug-free lifestyles, and the importance of good choices.

**Gov. Riley Releases \$ - VO**

Alabama's public schools are getting an extra 17 million dollars. That's because tax collections are higher than expected. The money will be used to help pay for items such as utilities and toiletries at schools across the state.

**SCHOOL BOND ISSUE – VO**

A 30 million dollar bond issue for Montgomery schools will go before the legislature in the session that starts tomorrow. The money when combined with the city's bond issue will total 74 million dollars. Montgomery County Commission Chairman Todd Strange said he's pleased with that amount. Several school projects are planned, including the building of a new elementary school and a new junior high school off Ray Thorington Road.

**ALAGASCO DECREASE – VO**

One month after raising rates, Alabama Gas customers will pay about 98-dollars less annually than they would have for the same usage 12 months ago. Last month the company announced a December first rate boost of just over two percent. The company said that change will increase the average residential bill by about 25 dollars a year. Alagasco said the new rates went into effect January fifth and customers will begin seeing changes in their next billing cycle.
