U-H-S, the Southern Tier's distribution hospital, was on the list of lowest performing hospital systems, having only given out 25 percent of their allocated doses. A spokesperson for UHS says the Governor's numbers understated the amount of vaccine the hospital chain has administered. UHS says the discrepancy arose from a transition from a manual count to a new state reporting system. The spokesperson says UHS is on track to use 100 percent of its vaccine by the deadline this Thursday, if not sooner, and is looking forward to receiving and administering more. The State also plans to expedite the distribution process by potentially setting up drive-thru vaccination clinics as well as using public facilities for distribution.

The funding will be allocated based on population of each region, with increased amounts going to regions that have a poverty rate greater than 20 percent.

The Hospital Care at Home program allows doctors from U-H-S to connect with COVID patients, who also have another underlying condition, while they recover in their home. One of the patients that was a part of the program is John Lodge, who tested positive for COVID in early January. Lodge went to a walk-in clinic for a chest X-ray and EKG due to congestion he was having in conjunction with the virus. The x-ray showed that Lodge actually had developed atrial fibrillation from COVID, and was admitted into Wilson Medical Center. After 4 days at Wilson, Lodge was approached by doctors about the home care option, which Lodge accepted. He was sent home with a blood pressure machine and a pulse oximeter, and met virtually with his doctor and nurse each day for 10 days. Lodge says his experience with the program was terrific, and recommends anyone who has the opportunity to do it take advantage. Lodge says that while it's frustrating to now have a heart condition that didn't exist prior to COVID, he is thankful that he has something that can be treated so he can continue to live his life.

Conversely, concrete manufacturers have seen other sources of cement alternative dry up as coal-fired power plants and steel foundries in this country close. NewsChannel 34's Jackie Gillis shows us what happens when you never lose hope. Endicott resident, Bill Dalton, is getting ready to take off for the skies. Just when he thought it would be the end of the line for him because he had no way of getting to the Cleveland Clinic, his luck changed. Two non-profit organizations got together to make it possible to get Dalton the help he needs. Dalton suffers from lung conditions, one of those being emphysema. Getthere has been working with Dalton since June of 2019. It has gotten him to all of his local doctors appointments and even went as far as booking all of his plasma appointments 9 months in advance. Getthere helps people with transportation to their doctors appointments and it even helps fund transportation for people if they cannot afford it on their own. Stephanie Button, a Mobility and Transportation Advocate at Getthere, has been working tirelessly to get Dalton the help he needs.

Oliver has been using the service for about two years now, and says he doesn't know how else he'd get to the grocery store. The Finn Institute, the city's independent research provider, put together the report through collaboration with the city's steering committee, as well as members of the community, to gauge the level of reform that may be needed for the Binghamton Police Department. In a statement released by Mayor David's office, they said that while this report is not the final proposal, it will be included in the city's larger plan for change. The report analyzed data from the B-P-D to assess any racial or ethnic disparities in particular situations, as well as conducted surveys from community members and compiled public comments, and then put together a list of recommended best practices. Among the police data analyzed were instances of force used by B-P-D officers against citizens, which saw officers use force similarly between Black and White individuals between 2-17 and 2019. Force was used 342 times on Black individuals, compared to 305 White individuals in that same time span.
