He went home, bought \$600 groceries for hungry neighbors and in the years since 1994, the international ministry he founded has given away \$2-Billion relief supplies worldwide. Utah CASA serves the greater Salt Lake City area, providing advocacy for children who are involved with the court system. Hovey says CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocate. They're community volunteers who stand up and speak out for abused and neglected kids. Hovey talks about how advocates gather information about the child's school, family, caregivers and more, in order to help a judge make the best decisions for the child.
