Congressman Gibson discusses the effect the diseases have had on many of his constituents and points out that the medical testing is unreliable. He suggests a first step is to get more scientific data culled together, since he says much of it has not been given proper attention. The Congressman notes that in addition to the human cost caused by these diseases, the tourism industry could be negatively affected if the threat of tick-borne illnesses dissuades tourists from visiting New York.
