ISSUE: Asthma research study for 12-17 year olds

COLORADO CONVERSATION AIRED: OCT 2 2016 Segment: Bo Jaxon 30 minutes

WHY: The purpose of this asthma study is to see if we can determine what medication works best for each individual with asthma.

Study details:

- 10 visits to National Jewish Health (working around school and work schedules!)
- Asthma education
- Medical evaluations (including breathing tests) at no cost
- Asthma medications at no cost
- Financial compensation

ISSUE: Fetal Health Foundation

WHY: No parent should ever have to accept that there is no hope to save their child's life. Having battled TTTS, we experienced firsthand the power of hope. Twin to Twin Transfusion Syndrome (TTTS) should have taken our daughters' lives, but after our frantic search for information and resources, fetal surgery saved them. Today, as grateful parents of healthy identical twin girls, we are proud as founders to continue to lead the Fetal Health Foundation, a nonprofit

dedicated to hope for expectant parents who've received a fetal syndrome diagnosis.

Like us, families diagnosed with a fetal syndrome have only a few emotional days to find a life-changing medical treatment. Sadly, and far too often, they've been told there is no hope for their baby or babies to survive. In this terrifying moment, Fetal Health is there to provide emotional support and direct connection to leading fetal treatment centers and doctors around the world.

Tim started making sandwiches and handing them out to those less fortunate in our city. When my friends found out what I was doing, they themselves wanted to help, and it has continued to grow until we got to where we are today. Today we meet at Li'l Devil's Ultra Lounge, 255 South Broadway, on the 2nd Thursday of Every Month, @ 10am and all are welcome to join us. We put together, as a group of people wishing to pay forward their blessings to those less fortunate, a sack lunch with a sandwich containing, 1 slice of white bread and one slice of wheat bread with both American and Swiss cheeses, and 1 slice of ham and 1 slice of turkey.

Along with this sandwich is a napkin, mustard packet, mayo packet, A fresh piece of fruit (apple, orange, or banana), a bag of chips, a breakfast bar, a protein bar, cheese crackers, and a cookie or equivalent, and a bottle of water, to be added soon a cup of pudding or yogurt and a spoon. In the winter months we have been including hats and gloves as well as handing out slightly used coats, blankets/survival gear.

WHY: Our goal is to significantly improve the lives of people with Down syndrome through Research, Medical Care, Education and Advocacy. We work to educate governments, educational organizations and society in order to affect legislative and social changes so that every person with Down syndrome has an equitable chance at a satisfying life.

The Global Down Syndrome Foundation is a public non-profit 501(c)(3) dedicated to significantly improving the lives of people with Down syndrome through Research, Medical Care, Education and Advocacy. Formally established in 2009, Global's primary focus is to support the <u>Linda Crnic</u> <u>Institute for Down Syndrome</u>, the first academic home in the United States committed solely to research and medical care for people with Down syndrome. Since Down syndrome is the least-

funded genetic condition in the United States, fundraising and government advocacy to correct the alarming disparity of national funding for people with Down syndrome is a major goal. The Global Down Syndrome Foundation created and organizes the <u>Be Beautiful Be Yourself</u> <u>Fashion Show</u> – the single-largest annual fundraiser benefiting people with Down syndrome. Global organizes and funds many programs, conferences and grants, including <u>Dare to Play Football Camp</u> with Ed McCaffrey, <u>Denver Broncos Cheerleaders Dare to Cheer Camp</u>, <u>Junior Denver Broncos</u> <u>Cheerleaders Dare to Cheer Program</u>, <u>Be Beautiful Be Yourself Hollywood Ball</u> and the <u>Global Down</u> Syndrome Foundation Educational Grants

We work closely with other transgender organizations to provide the most current and accurate information and resources available to those who are questioning or who identify as transgender. The Center's Legal & Advocacy Program also works with transgender individuals who feel they have been discriminated against.

WHY: The Denver Gay Men's Chorus was established in 1982 with a commitment to build a diverse community and foster acceptance thorough music. The auditioned, 125 strong community chorus has been doing just that for three decades and more than 140 concerts. As they approach their 35th season, they remain true to their mission of educating, inspiring and empowering, all while entertaining audiences.

DGMC has enjoyed collaborating with other artists such as Margaret Cho, Ann Hampton Callaway, and the Colorado Symphony in recent years. The chorus has also worked with the Denver Theatre District, the Matthew Shepard Foundation and the Lamont School of Music at the University of Denver.

These singers produce three concert series per season, and together with their a cappella group, Off Kilter, perform at countless community outreach events each year. DGMC is a member of GALA Choruses, an LGBT choral organization made up of over 180 choruses and 10,000 singers worldwide dedicated to continued support of LGBT choral music programs.

DGMC is devoted in its commitment to commissioning new works. "I Am Harvey Milk" by Broadway composer, Andrew Lippa, and "Still I Rise" by Carolyn Montgomery-Forant and Jeff Cubeta are particular highlights of the chorus. DGMC has "I Am Harvey Milk" and other CD's available.

Recent chorus highlights include DGMC's participation in the 2015 Film on the Rocks Prince Tribute, taking the stage at Red Rocks to perform to an audience of 9000 people. Denver Mayor Michael B. Hancock proclaimed June 12, 2014 as Denver Gay Men's Chorus Day, and honored the chorus for being a respected leader in the arts community that significantly enriches the cultural life of the city while serving as a messenger of social justice and change.

In order to better communicate with the leadership of our beautiful state of Colorado, Moms Fight Back has polled Colorado moms on a number of issues and asked for their input and insight into what matters most.

Moms Fight Back is now releasing the report to the Governor of Colorado, leaders in the state legislature, the community-at-large as well as the media in the hope that the information will be taken for what it is – the beginning of a very important conversation with those who are truly the heart and soul of Colorado's families – and who are the first line of defense when it comes to our kids.

Moms Fight Back, committed to maintaining a constant pulse on the most important issues facing Colorado's families, will utilize the information gained through the survey in 2017 to focus on several vital issues that we know are keeping moms up at night – school safety, child abuse, teen substance abuse, and teen sexual assault. Moms Fight Back aims to address each critical issue in the context of how it impacts a child's life at home and at school, as well as how these issues can and should be addressed through the legislative and judicial systems.

WHY: One of the most important things we try to do at Denver Rescue Mission is develop trust and relationships with those who come to us for help. Often, it begins with a meal because many people know we serve three meals a day, 365 days a year. But it also begins with the people who come to our courtyard at the Lawrence Street Community Center. When we opened the LSCC, we hoped we would serve about 300 people a day. But since our doors opened a little over a year ago, we have been averaging 1,000 people visiting us every day! Our staff and volunteers reach out to this group of folks, developing relationships and building trust, in order to learn how we can help them. Letting them know that we care, that we believe God cares about them, and that their life can be different—better—is the first step to self-sufficiency and productive citizenship, our ultimate goal at the Mission.

As we are in full swing during this joyous and busy Christmas season, I am reminded that trust is what you, our wonderful donors and friends in this Colorado community, have given the Mission for the last 125 years. It is amazing to me that next year we are going to celebrate our 125th anniversary! Thank you for coming alongside us for a century and a quarter, as we come alongside people who are experiencing homelessness. We cannot do this work without you. It reminds me of all those who have gone before us, who trusted God and were faithful to his calling to help the Mission reach out to the poor, often at great personal sacrifice. I like to say we stand on the shoulders of the saints who served before us and on the shoulders of people like you who continue to help us give hope to people in need.

When we help someone at the Mission, they are thankful. And when we receive your help, we are thankful too. My prayer is that we continue being worthy of your trust every day we come to work
