They claim the city has told them they want to beautify Fort Stockton. But some of the houses that have been torn down have been there for years. Some of those homes are abandoned, but others have meaning to the people who live in fort Stockton. Most of the homes and buildings in Fort Stockton are made of adobe. A resident of the area, Abel Quintela, says at least 10 houses were demolished by the city. And that residents are not only left homeless, but also with a bill to pay for the costs of demolition. "You have the right and the city has the right to give you money for destroying your property. Or inculcate in giving yourself (to) put a property in your house if they're going to beautify the city as they say." Quintela says the bills left to pay residents can be as high as \$3,000. Telemundo 20 has reached out to the city, and they are still waiting for a response.

Story Summary: The Texas commission on environmental quality has notified the public water supply system at the city of midland water purification plant that the drinking water supplied to customers had exceeded the maximum level of arsenic contaminants. The epa has established that the maximum allowable amount of arsenic is 0.010 milligrams per liter. However, analysis of arsenic in her community's drinking water indicates a compliance value in the fourth quarter of 2023 of 0.01. This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water with an arsenic content higher than the mcl for many years may suffer from skin damage or circulatory system problems and may have an increased risk of cancer. There is no need to use an alternative water supply. If you have health problems, you may want to talk to your doctor to learn more about how this may affect you. The city of midland says it will now mix water sources better and test a new treatment technique to remove arsenic.

Since upgrading the facility through a \$25 million certificate of obligation, they've been trying to keep up with the jail's expansion. One of the problems the county faces is that when there aren't enough jailers to take care of inmates, they must send them to other county jails. Which can cost them \$60 to \$85 a day, but with this new pay increase, they believe it's a solution to that problem. The commissioners hired a recruitment firm to be more ambitious with the message of how much jailers make. County leaders say this long-term solution will benefit west Texans for years to come.

And this isn't the first time we've seen complaints about this migrant shelter in Brooklyn. Congressmen and other local leaders have already spoken out and said that it was a concern that they would take refuge in this land that was an old military base that was flooding. However, city officials say that if they have to evacuate families from Floyd Bennett field again, they will consider using movie theaters or college campuses as emergency shelter.
