Section I. Issues

The station has identified the following topics as significant issues facing our community in this quarter:

A. **Highway Safety During Harvest Season:** The Missouri State Highway Patrol reminds drivers that this is the time of year when crops are harvested. Drivers should expect more farm machinery traffic--especially on rural highways. Sgt. Eric Brown promotes highway safety and what drivers & farmers need to be aware of.

B. **Missouri residents Can Apply for Winter Home Energy Assistance:** As the summer program ends for the North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) now is the time for Missouri residents to apply for winter home energy assistance. NECAC representative Angela Kattenbraker discusses what residents need to do in order to receive assistance for the winter.

C. **Blood Shortage in the Tri-States** – The need for blood is in high demand now more than ever. With COVID-19 and the upcoming holiday season, there is a massive blood shortage and the need is great. Jim Whitfield of the American Red Cross explained the importance of giving blood in this season of COVID-19 and the safety measures being taken to make sure that the blood supply is safe.

D. **Holiday Shopping Scams:** The holiday shopping season is upon us. With the pandemic, many local in-person events, such as popup holiday markets or craft fairs, have moved online. Scammers are creating phony copycat events that charge for admission and steal your credit card information. Whitney Quick from the Better Business Bureau gave out helpful tips on holiday shopping scams and how to avoid them at all cost.

E. **Salvation Army Bell Ringing Campaign:** Missouri residents will start seeing the red kettles and hearing bells ringing as the Salvation Army kicks off their Christmas Campaign. Linda Fritz from North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) talks about partnering up with the Salvation Army and how your donation will help many in the Tri-State Area.

F. **Volunteers Needed to Serve Holiday Meals:** Several people in the Tri-States will be needed a hot meal this holiday season. Amy Vaughn from the Loaves and Fishes program reaches out for volunteers to help serve meals for many of the community members who are in need of a meal this holiday season.

Section II. Responsive Programs

A. Highway Safety During Harvest Season

For the Record - Aired on October 13, 2020 at 5:20 AM; Duration 10 Minutes. This is a public-affairs program, hosted by News Director, Harold Smith. Sgt. Eric Brown, from the Missouri Highway State Patrol, promoted highway safety during harvest season. Motorist will start seeing more farm equipment vehicles on the roads and need to take extra precautions when driving on Missouri roads. The MO State Patrol encourages everyone traveling in Missouri's farming communities to stay alert and drive cautiously. Both farmers and motorists can share the road. Driving tips were given for both farmers and motorists to be aware of during harvest season.

B. Missouri Residents Can Apply for Winter Home Energy Assistance

For the Record - Aired on October 26, 2020 at 5:20 AM; Duration 10 Minutes. This is a public-affairs program, hosted by News Director, Harold Smith. As one program ends for the North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC), another starts. Angela Kattenbraker, a representative for NECAC talked about what Missouri residents needed to do when applying for winter home energy assistance. She talked about who qualified, what are the qualifications, and the process on how to apply for assistance. She provided websites, phone numbers, and other information for residents who are in need to assistance in paying for energy bills this winter.

C. Blood Shortage in the Tri-States

For the Record - Aired on November 4, 2020 at 5:20 AM; Duration 10 Minutes. This is a public-affairs program, hosted by News Director, Harold Smith. Jim Whitfield, of the American Red Cross, discussed one of the biggest casualties of the COVID-19 pandemic has been the scheduling of blood drives. Whitfield said the need for blood is greater than ever before, especially now with the holidays coming up. He wanted to let everyone know that all blood that has been collected through blood donation centers has all been tested to make sure that the blood supply is safe. For those who want to give blood, you are asked to make an appointment through the American Red Cross app so that all safety measure can take place when blood is being donated.

D. Holiday Shopping Scams

For the Record - Aired on November 23, 2020 at 5:20 AM; Duration 10 Minutes. This is a public-affairs program, hosted by News Director, Harold Smith. Whitney Quick from the Better Business Bureau gave out helpful tips on holiday shopping online and how to avoid them this holiday season. Research the vendors and the host of any event, use a credit card, always keep your receipts, and most importantly know the return policy.

E. Salvation Army Bell Ringing Campaign

For the Record - Aired on December 2, 2020 at 5:20 AM; Duration 10 Minutes. This is a public-affairs program, hosted by News Director, Harold Smith. To help families during the holidays, North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) has teamed up with the Salvation Army to provide for those who are in need this holiday season. The annual campaign kicked off on November 23 and will run until December 24, there is a goal of \$10,000 up from \$8,000 in 2019. Volunteers are needed to ring bells and the Walmart in Bowling Green, Missouri to help both organizations reach their goal for the year.
