Marshall presided over one of the most famous cases before the court while Taney presided over one of the most infamous. In Marbury v. Madison (1803), Marshall found in an obscure case involving an unsigned judicial appointment the opportunity to assert the court's most important power: judicial review, which gave federal courts the right to strike down laws that clashed with the Constitution. In Dred Scott v. Sandford (1857), however, Taney, the next chief justice, exercised that same power against the national government - to protect slavery.

Harmonica virtuoso DeFord Bailey was one of the first stars of the Grand Ole Opry. Yet history knows almost nothing of this lost legend. In the 1930s, at the height of Jim Crow, rising country stars like Bill Monroe and Roy Acuff would take DeFord on the road because they knew that his name and talent would draw crowds. Because his medium was radio, listeners never knew that DeFord was black until they saw him live. He would often sacrifice comfort, dignity and safety to travel and perform. Considered one of the most unexplained events in Grand Ole Opry history, DeFord left the stage in the early 1940s and refused to perform professionally. This half-hour documentary tells the story of DeFord's career and early departure from the ~~stage~~ and reveals how black musicians have influenced many legends of country music.



Topics:	Gerald Rudolph Ford (born Leslie Lynch King) was the nation's first appointed Vice President, chosen under terms of the 25 th amendment. President Ford succeeded Richard M. Nixon taking the oath on Aug. 9, 1974 and in less than one year he transitioned from House minority leader in Michigan to securing the Presidency at the White House. According to Representative Charles Goodell of New York "It wasn't as though everybody was wildly enthusiastic about Ford, it was just that he didn't have any enemies; many had respected him."
2.1 Saddam Hussein Execution	Ford's political career "sting shot" from humble beginnings to commanding the presidency. Only months before the presidency Ford had high hopes of becoming Michigan's Speaker of The House. When President Nixon's surprise offer came, Ford responded "It would be a good way to round out my career." At the time Ford proudly had been planning for retirement because his career would not advance further. In his first televised statement forgoing a formal VP election process, Ford acknowledged his anomalous status after swearing-in: "I am acutely aware that you have not elected me as your President by your ballot. So I ask you to confirm me as your President with your prayers." The public unanimously supported his request and generated an overwhelming 71% approval rating.
State of State Tourist	The Watergate controversy disrupted the nation which Ford set out to "do what he felt was right." An American tragedy in which we all have played a part. It could go on and on and on, or someone must write the end to it. I have concluded that only I can do that, and if I can, I must." Ford had been accused of making a secret (quit pro quo), a "back scratching" deal that Nixon would resign if Ford had promised a presidential pardon following his resignation. Although there is little evidence to dispute the validity and truth of Ford's innocence the mystery during this turbulent time had cast him the presidency. His approval rating dropped from 71% to 49% and those who did not think of him favorably questioned his decisions following the controversial pardon.

include a "year-binding" resolution in Home Depot's proxy statement allowing shareholders to vote on whether "they are in favor of opposed to the board of directors of Home Depot terminating Nardelli's contract." Baker says, "You can't sit on your employees and deliver results." Others remain outraged, even with Nardelli gone. A group of unions whose pension funds own shares in Home Depot plans to challenge the \$710 million payout at an annual meeting in May. However, it is the CEO's that have too much control of board decisions according to the Associated Press. Nardelli pre-announced his own "firing."

To date, the SEC has not set clear guidelines or rules on the legality or ethics of "springloading" or "backloading," which critics argue is a form of insider trading. "Backloading" occurs when a company retroactively sets the exercise price for a stock option to an earlier date and "springloading" occurs when a company issues an option grant right before the release of news that would cause the company's shares to rise, or right after the announcement of news that led to a price decline.

A group of investors last month sued Apple Computer, alleging that the computer maker awarded four top executives options to purchase about one million shares exactly one day before Microsoft announced a \$150 million investment in the company in 1997. Private equity firms offer compensation on a previously unimaginable scale. A crucial difference lies in the chief executives positions that have run the once-palatial companies. The ownership positions they can secure lead them into particularly boemifou riches when private businesses are sold or go public again. Henry Silverman, who spent the last decade building Cendant into his \$1.8 billion conglomerate, says "There is no reason to be a public traded company anymore. You don't need access to the public market because of the enormous amount of money sloshing around private equity and hedge funds. Whenever I show up next, it will not be at a public company."

The new war front proposed by President Bush to send 21,500 additional U.S. troops to Iraq was expected to rival Democrats. However, the most surprising reaction is from the Republican side.</p> <p>At least a dozen senate GOP republicans are opposing the president's plan. GOP Sen. John McCain of Arizona said "I hope the overwhelming majority of my Republican colleagues will come on board, but I can't predict that." In fact some of President Bush's most supportive candidates, his personally selected men, have been on the opposition describing the plan as a "Foreign policy blunder" and on the same table "I just don't believe this makes sense." However, many of the Republicans who oppose increasing troop levels will not go so far as to say they will support any Democratic effort to cut off or restrict more funding as the Democrats have considered. Republican Senator Norm Coleman of Minnesota who in the floor and on record describes his opposition "It will put more soldiers in the cross hairs of sectarian violence, create more targets. I just don't believe this makes sense. If Iraq is to fulfill its role as a sovereign and democratic state it must start acting like one. I oppose the proposal for a troop surge in Iraq because where the violence can only be defined as sectarian violence my answer is no." Some, however not all Republicans, have gone to "the dark side." Most notably there is support across the board for 2008 running mates Senator John McCain of Arizona (R), former Massachusetts governor Mitt Romney (R), and former New York City mayor Rudy Giuliani (R), Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger (R) and Congressman Wally Herger (R). With the potential to inherit the Iraq debacle the candidates expressed an overwhelming consensus to send additional troops now instead of after the 2008 elections.

Republican senator Chuck Hagel, of Nebraska however contends "This is a dangerously wrong-headed strategy that will drive America deeper into an unwinnable swamp and at a great cost." President Bush issued the cost of the war on March 25, 2003. "Today I'm sending to congress a wartime supplemental appropriations bill of 74.4 billion dollars to fund needs directly arising from the Iraqi conflict and our global war against terror."

Derided by today's cost of 357 billion dollars it is now a "running" figure, a quarter million dollars more every minute. According to the CNN report 357 billion dollars put in today's dollar would be more than enough to hire 6 million teachers, build 700 elementary schools in every state, Hire 14million police officers and DHS inspectors and provide a years supply of gasoline demand for every American man, woman and child. adequate support for developing alternative sources. I hope oil prices stay low, but I also hope that our nation stays committed to energy security through energy diversity. One of the things that government has to do is add incentives to consumers through tax credits, fuel subsidies, and so on to adopt these exciting new technologies in a big way."

The auto companies are hopeful Bush will create financial incentives for increasing alternative fuels, however to date the Bush administration has spent only \$1.1 billion to fund hydrogen fuel research and development for the next five years — a figure \$394,009 less than that spent for one week in Iraq.

Bush will also likely reverse his education law, "No Child Left Behind" which is set to expire this year. The last pushes schools that receive federal poverty aid to start early progress or face penalty sanctions. It will be set for later discussion if the plan has been effective. Bush will reveal his immigration strategy, which includes tougher border security and more "wall" to be built.

No matter what Bush policy he proposed all policy will be dependant on working effectively together in a -By-Partisan" congress. On issues such as Iraq even some Republicans are resisting his wishes. The policy in the coming months remains to be bonded out to congress and is not likely to stop any time soon. A day following the State of The Union speech, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee is likely to vote on a resolution condemning the move to send more troops to Iraq.

The president of Duke also has fired the lacrosse team coach, suspended the players from school and canceled the rest of the championship because season all before a trial was held.

2007 State of the State Address

Governor Granholm in her fifth State of the State address faces severe challenges as she tries to find common ground between a Republican-controlled state Senate and a Democratic House. Granholm's bipartisan panel appointed by Governor Granholm for the speech suggests Michigan is dealing with a projected \$800 million shortfall in the General Fund FY 2006-07 and a potential shortfall of \$2.6 billion in the FY 2007-08 budgets. The panel also contends there are no contingency plans to recoup 13 years of lost tax revenue. The cuts originally enacted by Proposal-A in 1994 raised the sales tax in Michigan from 4% to 6% while lowering income taxes and property taxes of Michigan's residents. According to the bipartisan panel Michigan has lost \$3.2 billion annually in tax revenue and \$5.4 billion in property taxes as a result of Proposal-A.

Today Legislators are under pressure to replace the \$1.9 billion raised by the Single Business Tax, which expires at year's end. Granholm has been adamant that any replacement tax for the SBT must also raise the same amount in funds. Proposed by the GOP two plans have emerged, including one backed by the state Chamber of Commerce that would raise taxes only about \$1.4 billion. The other would cut overall business taxes by at least \$290 million. Governor Granholm (D) has consistently argued that Michigan cannot simply cut services. "If you continue to slash, you're not going to be able to invest." In describing her plan to be released on Tuesday Granholm said her plan would

benefit manufacturers, construction and trucking companies, and generate about the same amount as the Single Business Tax. In addition Granholm is also considering broadening Proposal-A's 6% sales tax to include areas such as the arts, recreation and human services. The projected plan would raise an additional \$341 million in taxes to the general fund.

As an initiative Granholm will call "No Worker Left Behind." Education is at the top of Granholm's list. Under "No Worker Left Behind" Granholm will call for two years of free training at a community college for unemployed or displaced workers. The program would be paid for with federal money and some state tax money which Granholm has yet to explain the source. The plan will require workers to get certification or an associate's degree in a high-demand field, such as health care. The three-year "No Worker Left Behind" program would launch this summer, with around 7,500 workers getting free tuition for 2007-08 in addition to 18,000 already being helped. Granholm said additional workers would be added in the 2008-09 and 2009-10 academic years.

According to Bob Swanson, director of the state Department of Labor & Economic Growth, "This is kind of a one-time window people can take advantage of." skills is going to be a tricky issue. Free or not, it's getting them back in the classroom that will be the tough assignment."

Michigan currently faces a \$224 per pupil loss or a \$377 million shortfall in school funding. If we look at where our tax money is going, the state pays out more incentive funds to house an incarcerated criminal than to educate students to be college graduates. This is an obvious recipe for disaster in Michigan. In fact Michigan's incarceration rate is 40 percent higher than other states resulting in \$500 million annually in higher costs. Granholm is expected to address this cost.

However, at the same time Granholm will offer incentives to cut school districts as well. Under her proposed consolidation plan school municipalities and their administrative staff face consolidation efforts to consolidate the states 553 school districts, 57 intermediate school districts, more than 200 charter schools, 83 counties, more than 1,200 townships, 259 villages and 274 cities with fewer than 10,000 residents.

The cost-saving measures are intended to help balance a state budget that is \$800 million out of whack this year and about \$3.5 billion in the red over the next 18 months. To put the next 18 months in perspective the projected budget short fall of \$3.5 billion divided would be the equivalent of 1.3 Cutting ALL funding for the state's universities and community colleges and eliminating ALL mental health services. 2.4 Eliminating ALL health care programs for seniors and children living in poverty and releasing ALL 51,000 prisoners. 3.3 Cutting \$2,000 in per pupil aid to public schools, a reduction of one-fourth or more in school support.

Michigan's prison population of more than 50,000 inmates carries a yearly cost of \$30,000 per inmate. The Department of Corrections' budget is currently at \$1.9 billion. However, what the state pays now for

corrections will grow by about \$80 million a year as more and more people are added and more prisons with staff added. Michigan is adding 1,000 new prisoners annually. According to the bi-partisan study Michigan's crime rate is no lower than any of our neighboring states. Michigan is one of only 12 states (plus the District of Columbia) that does not institute the death penalty, but is it something Michigan should really consider?

Cranholm is also expected to invest at least \$100 million over the next three years to pay for research, development and commercialization of alternative energy in Michigan. Of those affected by the funding is Compact Power Inc. of Troy which will receive a large portion of the grant. The company makes lithium ion batteries for the auto industry including GM's new Volt concept recently unveiled. Cranholm also is expected to recommend that the Legislature approve a renewable energy standard that would require Michigan utilities to generate at least 10% of the state's electricity from alternative sources, such as wind and biofuels. According to former Guest Dana Johnson, Chief Economist for Comerica Bank, "Some experts would like to see Cranholm's \$100-million plan go farther than it does. A lot of other parts of the country have identified the same opportunities, so it will be a highly competitive situation; It's not a gimmie that it will be a job creator." And according to Governor Cranholm's Policy Director, Dana Debel, "The investment we're choosing to make and the tools the governor is bringing to bear that will create the comprehensive economic plan for alternative energy the state will need to diversify."

821	Every 33 seconds someone dies from heart disease. Accounting for more than 40% of all deaths 950,000 Americans die of cardiovascular disease each year and Sixty one million Americans (almost one-fourth of the population) live with this disease lurking in their veins. The economic impact of cardiovascular disease on the U.S. health care system continues to grow yearly, estimated at \$298 billion. More women die from heart disease than six other leading causes of death combined. Breast cancer and ovarian cancer feared by many does not kill nearly as many people as heart disease. However, in a recent study only 13 percent of women consider it their own greatest health risk leaving 87 percent of American women susceptible to heart disease. Men are more likely to feel chest pain, an overheating weight on the chest where as in women it is a silent killer. Women are less likely to sense warning symptoms before a heart attack signaling trouble. Women often experience mild symptoms such as mild back pain, neck or jaw pain, persistent heartburn or indigestion, Nausea or vomiting, dizziness or lightheadedness, weakness and fatigue. A Woman's risk of heart attack is equal or greater to that of men at age 60 or following menopause. Add to this the fact that African American women age's 25-64 are twice as likely as white women to have a heart attack and 35 percent more likely to suffer from coronary artery disease. Crossing all borders the pandemic also affects Mexican Americans and Native Americans who are not spared from elevated heart disease death rates.
	Perhaps the most perplexing part of the disease is that heart attack symptoms can appear 4-6 months to 1 week before the actual attack. However the first symptom experienced by the majority of Americans (around 60 percent of men and around 50 percent of women) is either a large heart attack or sudden cardiac death with no warning sign. disease it can strike when we least expect it and in our most inopportune time. According to the experts, it is critical to be transported to the hospital and be on the operating table within the first 90 minutes of any heart attack. However, of those who have a sudden heart attack, only 35% get treatment within 90 minutes of their heart attack.

Administering CPR can "buy time" when it is critical but what happens if you are alone? Is it a hopeless case? Is all a loss? Not entirely according to a recent study from the Rochester General Hospital that successfully tested a self-induced Cough CPR method. The study, however, cautions that once you begin to feel faint you will have only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness. Self-induced victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep throated and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest. A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital or wait until others arrive with help. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm.

Heart care begins with prevention According to Dr. Michael Roizen Chair of the Cleveland Clinic. "The first step towards prevention starts at the grocery store. Don't buy unhealthy food during your fridge; keep unhealthy food out of your sight." According to Dr. Roizen fat stored in the location of the abdomen is particularly harmful to your health. It is this site in particular that releases more harmful effects than in any other area of the body. People who are "apple" shaped are more likely than a comparable person of a "pear shape" who stores more fat in their legs. Perhaps the most surprising factor that will affect us in the future is that today one in five American children are diagnosed as being obese and one in three is considered to be overweight.

Raizen even healthy people can have heart attacks. For those who possess what is called the "F-H" Genome the risk is increased. It is common for victims of "F-H" Genome to have their first heart attack when they are in their late teens or early twenties bringing the disease several decades earlier than in other cases of heart disease. The "F-H" Genome is an inherited disease and can be most troubling because it often involves many members, if not all members, of your immediate family. This can be tough on families and, in a literal sense, on our hearts. For families with the "F-H" gene the same emphasis, if not more emphasis, is put on younger siblings to monitor their progression of the disease. For most of us we would never consider their age group at risk, however, with the "F-H" Genome even children are at an equal risk.

New research is promising according to Dr. Steven Nissen Chairman Dept. of Cardiovascular Medicine Cleveland Clinic Foundation. Nissen says we are moving away from a "Plumbing" mentality of "clearing out our pipes" to understanding the inner workings of the disease on the cellular level. Nissen predicts a new medication is on the near horizon able to prevent plaque from wreaking havoc on our veins and is able to do so because we now have a better understanding of the disease on a cellular level. Nissen's research suggests our own human immune system, (our defender from infection and bacterial death) is turned against us when we have heart disease. When plaque deposits stick on to the artery walls the immune system senses the plaque as a foreign invader and releases chemicals which cause inflammation, further blocking blood flow in the artery. According to Nissen from the Cleveland Clinic "When plaque sticks to artery walls white blood cells come to try to heal the inflamed site within the artery wall. This is the body's natural reaction to bacteria and foreign invaders. Any where else in the body this would be a normal healing reaction, but in the heart once the white blood cells arrive they trigger even more massive inflammation. It is true that the same warriors that we use to fight off invaders are turned against us and become indeed the disease itself." It appears from the research that inflammation common to a bruise or an infection leads to our ultimate demise.

According to Nissen the actual protein that causes inflammation and leads to our death is called C-reactive protein or CRP. CRP is the culprit that causes inflammation in your blood, and the higher your CRP the more likely you are to have a heart attack or a stroke. Nissen says that there are cheap and reliable methods available to check for your level of CRP and ultimately your chance of death from heart attack. A simple blood test can check for the level of CRP in your blood stream. On the horizon, Nissen says, new emerging medications or "Statins" will capitalize on this new research lowering your cholesterol while lowering your CRP levels responsible for inflammation. According to Nissen, periodontal disease from your dentist can also cause a heart attack because the disease causes inflammation releasing elevated CRP levels into the blood stream. Fat around the abdomen in particular is also more susceptible than in other areas of the body to release the CRP protein. This is why "Apple" shaped people are treated differently than "Pear" shaped people mentioned previously.

The foods that we eat can also reduce the CRP reactive protein. Dr. Michael Roizen, Chair of the Cleveland Clinic, suggests foods such as Nuts, although they are loaded with fat (good fat) can actually be beneficial to your heart. Recommended daily allowances are 6 Walnuts or 12 Almonds or 20 Pennuts. Simply walking a 30 Minute regiment every day will decrease your risk of heart disease by 40%. Don't forget to floss as mentioned previously. It will be twice as beneficial for your teeth and for your heart. Experts still caution there is not a cure for heart disease. Dr. Nissen says "nothing could be farther from the truth." However this new research is exciting and these strange remedies of preventing heart disease could become step closer to stumbling on to a cure for the disease.

Vice President Dick Cheney today is in Japan, one of our key allies. Japan has voiced increasing concern about the White House's approach on North Korea and Iraq. A poll carried today by a Japanese newspaper "Asahi Shinbun" showed that 57 percent of Japanese view it was wrong of president Bush to increase troop levels of 21,500 invading Iraq. Decoding the Debate Over the Blackness of Barack

According to Ruediger Frank, a scholar on North Korea at the East Asian Institute of the University of Vienna in Austria: "If you read CIA reports, they say Iran possesses six to eight large intercontinental nuclear weapons but which is it? Six, seven or eight? You don't really know for sure." U.S. officials say they think that Iran's neighbor North Korea has reprocessed about 110 pounds of plutonium for use as material in nuclear bombs.

According to the Defense department it doesn't take much Tissue (nuclear) material to make a large scale nuclear bomb. Plutonium on the order of 10 kilograms or 22 pounds is all that is needed to make a devastating mega bomb such as Hiroshima. Plutonium is very dense: 23 pounds or roughly the size of a grapefruit sphere. "A grapefruit sphere is all that is needed for a massive retaliation attack from Iran, North Korea or Terrorists. North Korea has agreed to freeze its nuclear program in return for aid. However, the country's record of broken promises has left the international community skeptical that it will disarm completely. According to Daniel A. Pinkston, a Korea expert at the Center for Nonproliferation Studies in Monterey, Calif. "There's going to be some naturally occurring inefficiencies in the reprocessing of nuclear material, so they could fudge the numbers a little bit. I don't see how the North Koreans would be willing to give up the weapons they've already produced."

Doctors, Pharmacists withhold treatment

A New England Journal Of medicine (NEJM) survey reports that 14 percent of doctors feel no obligation to tell patients about medical options available when they morally oppose treatment options such as abortion and teen birth control. Twenty nine percent of physicians believe they have no duty to refer people elsewhere for such treatments. Ally Charn, a NEJM study co-author and bioethicist at the University of Wisconsin Madison said, "Failure to inform completely disables a patient. It makes it impossible for them to even know what to ask or whom to ask or where to go to ask." However, Al Weir, director of Campus and Community Ministries for the Christian Medical and Dental Associations says, "Doctors have the right to follow their own moral compass and their own moral integrity." An American Medical Association policy statement says doctors can decline to give a treatment sought by an individual that is "incompatible with the physician's personal, religious, or moral beliefs." But the physician should try to ensure the patient has "access to adequate healthcare." 83% of American physicians do not object to terminal sedation, 48% do not object to abortion due to failed contraception and 58% approve prescription of birth control to adolescents without prior parental consent. Should your doctor's moral beliefs influence your personal inalienable rights?

The two branches of legislature have not yet agreed on a final bill. Neither plan completely removes troops. A small amount will stay for training of Iraqi troops and conducting anti-terrorism operations. Senate democrats have a plan of starting troop withdrawals 120 days after their resolution is passed, expectedly later this month. All troops would be out by the end of March 2008. The House plan calls for withdrawals to start at the end of this year if the Iraqi government fails to meet certain expectations. A major example being the disarmament of sectarian militias. It puts pressure on Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki to do something in his own country in order to receive the help of the United States. The Prime Minister has recently held a conference with thirteen neighboring countries to ask for help combating terrorism in the middle east.

Faced with internal conflict, the democrats do not have a guaranteed win. Some of the more liberal democrats oppose any bill that does not immediately end the war. While moderates are happy to compromise with republicans. In the House, they can only afford to lose 25 votes from their own party. With few republicans expected to vote in favor, the majority is desperate for support.

Democrats have included an additional \$1.2 billion for operations in Afghanistan and another \$3.5 billion for veterans care. tragedy of 9/11 President Bush has supported the wire tapping of United States Citizens. He gave the National Security Agency license to eavesdrop on phone calls to people overseas. The NSA eavesdrops on billions of communications worldwide. Although the NSA is barred from domestic spying, it can get warrants issued with the permission of a special court called the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act Court. This Court will allow wire tapping on domestic soil. This order began in 2002 and it has continued ever since. President Bush has reauthorized this program more than 30 times. President Bush stated that the authorization is fully consistent with his constitutional responsibilities and authorities and he deemed it to be necessary. He said, "I intend to do so for as long as our nation faces a continuing threat from al Qaeda and related groups."

Another issue of late involves Attorney General Alberto Gonzales, who was appointed by President Bush himself. Some have questioned if there were ulterior motives when he appointed him. He has served under Bush in several other key positions in the past. There has been a complete uproar over the firing of 8 U.S. Attorneys that has been linked to Gonzales. At the beginning of a change in office it is quite normal for prosecutors to be dismissed. Backers of Bush have made it known that when former President Clinton entered office he dismissed all 93 of the attorneys. It is however, very abnormal to remove these attorneys during an administration. It is highly rumored that Bush had questioned the loyalty of these attorneys.

Global Warming
Where does the truth lie?

After winning two Oscar awards for his film "An inconvenient Truth" Former vice president Al Gore has yet to win an equal footing on his greenhouse policy proposed last Wednesday. What Gore called a "true planetary emergency" others such as Republican Sen. James Inhofe of Oklahoma labeled a global warning "hoax."

Studio Guests:

Although Gore claimed the issue of Global Warming should not be partisan or political, the response to Gore's testimony was at times cut-throat. Texas Rep. Joe Barton, the leading Republican on the House Energy and Commerce Committee, has challenged Gore's conclusion that carbon dioxide emissions cause rising global temperatures claiming Gore is off his rocker "You've not just off a little, you're totally wrong." There are however, those who support Gore's views, some of them are even Republicans. Representatives Roscoe Bartlett, R-Md. and Vernon Ehlers, R-Mich., and Wayne Gilchrest R-Me, all research scientists, were denied seats on the Select Committee on Energy Independence and Global Warming.

According to a CBS report House Republican leader John Boehner of Ohio refused to allow it unless they compromised their science to support other views.

Science has been profoundly impacted even at NASA according to James Hansen, NASA's chief climate scientist and director of The Goddard Institute for Space Studies. Hansen, in a Time report, alleges that White House appointees of NASA had "muzzled him" and limited his access to the press, ordering him to remove postings that contradicted the President's positions. Rick Piltz, a senior associate from the government office that coordinates federal climate change programs (now known as the Climate Change Science Program) had also resigned because he did not want "to sacrifice the ability to speak freely." Piltz declared that

political appointees were working "to impede forthright communication of the state of climate science" and tried to "undermine the credibility and integrity of the program." In today's scientific community the interpretability of science is more important than ever. Maintaining scientific integrity despite inevitable political and monetary pressures has become a key concern of many scientists. More than 10,000 scientists of all backgrounds from all 50 states—including 52 Nobel Laureates had met on December 9, 2006 to lay down an informal protocol to denounce scientific influence of outside powers.

Former Vice President Gore hearing the recommendations of some of today's top scientists advised lawmakers to cut carbon dioxide and other warming gases 90 percent by 2050 to avoid a crisis. According to Gore one of the biggest ways we can make a dent in the emission of CO₂ is to require a ban on any new coal-burning power plants. To carry out his plan Gore envisions replacing our centralized coal production with a vast network of small-scale electricity producers. There are alternative energies such as biomass, wind, geothermal and refined solar power however these systems work most efficiently when their source raw materials is near the end user. Gore plans to use the same theory that has made our information superhighway so successful. "The planet has a fever," Gore said. "If your baby has a fever, you go to the doctor. If the doctor says you need to intervene here, you don't say, 'Well, here's a science fiction novel that took me it's not a problem.' If the crib's on fire, you don't speculate that the baby is Pamine retardard. You take action." Gore said he remains disappointed how the Global Warming issue has become influenced by politics however he hopes that in 2008 a president will be elected to use his or her "political chits" to renew the 1997 Kyoto Protocol. "There is a sense of hope in this country that this United States Congress will rise to the occasion and present meaningful solutions to this crisis."

but more needs to be done. The agreement does not include industrial and commercial waste, which accounts for more than half of the Canadian trash entering Michigan each year. According to Stupak "The unregulated flow of trash from Canada into Michigan and other states creates significant environmental and public health concerns." Industrial waste is often the most dangerous, the most toxic and environmentally harmful. Michigan currently receives about 350 truckloads of Canadian trash every day.

According to the bills sponsor Rep. John Dingel (D) Dearborn "Year after year, our neighbors to the north continue to bring trash through Detroit and Port Huron into Michigan's 56,000 square miles. It is my opinion that the Canadians would do well to dispose of it in their own 4 million square miles rather than causing detriment to our roads and subjecting our citizens to further environmental and security risks."

However, opponents of recent proposals to limit new landfills construction and expansion argue the restrictions could end up hurting Michigan's economy. According to Mike Johnson, director of regulatory affairs for the Michigan Manufacturers Association. "Who said 'Shrinking the space in land' is would increase the cost of waste disposal, which in turn would increase the cost of doing business in Michigan and deter new businesses from coming here."

Russ Harding, senior environmental policy analyst with the Mackinac Center for Public Policy in Midland said among businesses that would be most affected by this proposal are manufacturers, including the auto industry, and builders, which both generate a lot of industrial waste. However, Rep. Kaye Ehl, (D) Monroe, said the main objective is to decrease the amount of out-of-state and Canadian garbage imported into Michigan's landfills. "One out of every three bags of waste dumped into Michigan's landfills arrives from outside of the state we should not be dumping ground for other people's trash. This is a beautiful state, and we need to be the magnet for 21st century jobs and not garbage."

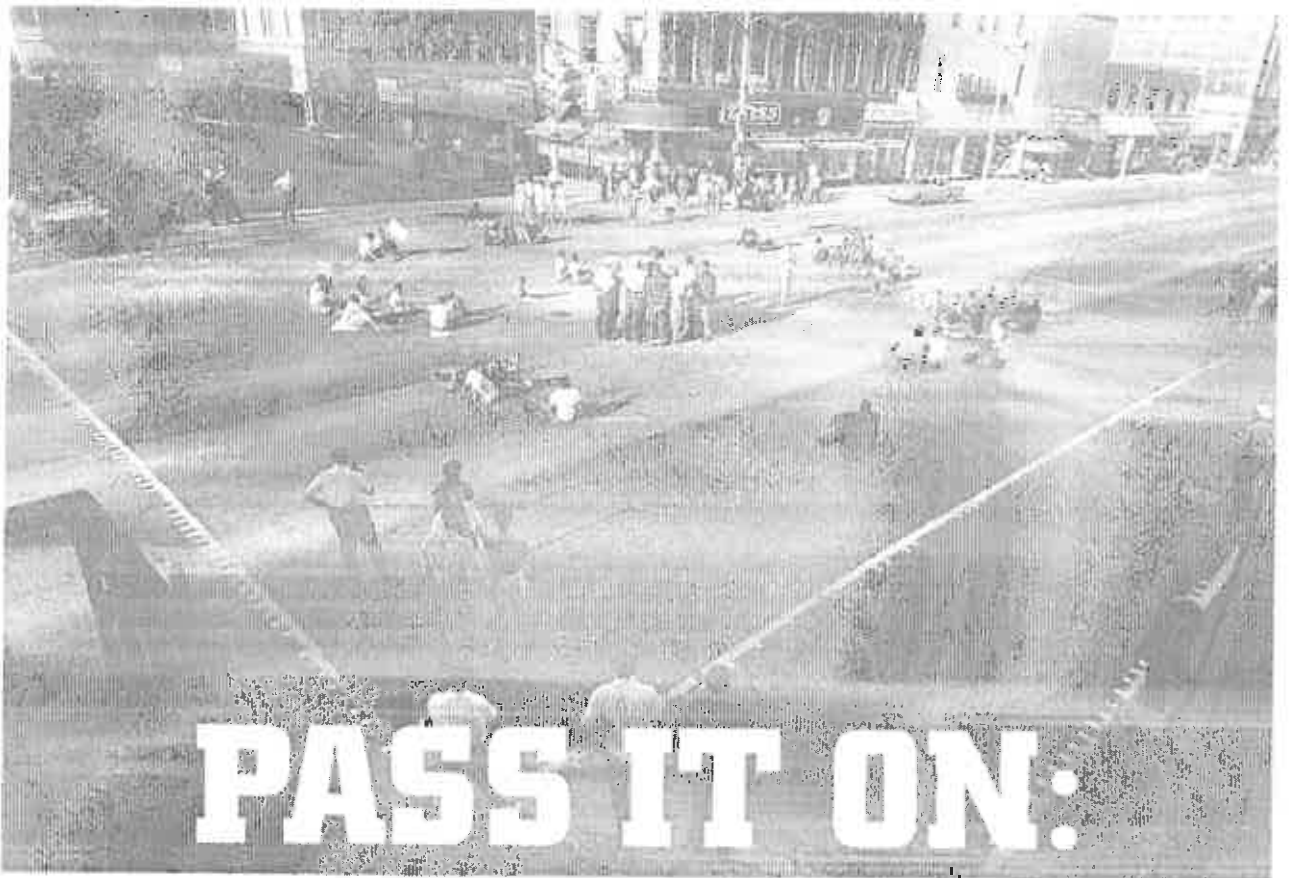

Delta College's public television station, WDCQ (Q-TV) has been awarded a \$5,000 grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) to create and implement local outreach efforts surrounding an upcoming fall documentary. This prestigious funding was awarded to just 25 of the 350 PBS stations nationwide.

PBS and Delta College Q-TV will be airing "Eyes on the Prize," an award-winning landmark series documenting the history of the civil rights movement. Segments will be scheduled on the regular PBS series "American Experience" and will feature three, two-hour programs broadcast on Mondays, October 2, 8 and 16, 2006, as part of its 19th season on the air.

Delta College Q-TV's project will document the oral histories of local African Americans who participated in the civil rights movement. Through interviews with Michigan residents in Bay City, Saginaw and Midland, race relations then and now will be explored. The production of a documentary will allow greater access for sharing histories between the three communities. It is hoped that the overall impact of the project will raise intergenerational awareness of race and diversity and the associative values.

Following are elements of the grant funded outreach project as proposed by Delta College:

- Gather the oral histories of the three communities of Bay City, Saginaw and Midland;
- Produce a 60 minute documentary titled *Pass It On: Telling Our Stories- Sharing Our Truths*, to use as a community resource;
- Incorporate the 60 minute documentary as segments of the monthly broadcast of *Soul Issue, The African American Perspective* during the months of September through December;
- Display the local piece of the "We Shall Overcome" exhibit prominently at the Castle Museum in Saginaw from September through December;
- Provide opportunities for young people to participate in dialogue and become involved in various roles throughout the project;
- Host an intergenerational panel event that will discuss what can be learned from the past and how to apply that knowledge to the present and future.

Delta College's partners in this outreach effort include: the Saginaw branch of the NAACP; the Bay City branch of the NAACP; the Tri-City Links, Inc.; Willie McKoher, PhD; Sociologist Betty Jones, PhD; the Public Libraries of Saginaw - downtown Hoyt branch; Midland Black Coalition (MBC); the Saginaw Castle Museum; the Midland County Historical Museum; Delta College's faculty, and youth members from several area high schools.

Through contemporary interviews and historical footage "Eyes on the Prize" traces the civil rights movement from the Montgomery bus boycott in 1954 to the Voting Rights Act in 1965;

from early acts of individual courage through the flowering of a mass movement and its eventual split into factions. Julius Bond narrates.

"Eyes on the Prize" tells human stories of the movement for social change in the words of both famous and less-known participants. Since the documentary was completed, a number of key figures who appear in the films (including George Wallace, Ralph Abernathy, and Kwame Ture, also known as Stokely Carmichael) have died, making this record of their testimony all the more valuable.

More than 30 years ago, Blackside (the production company founded by documentary pioneer Henry Hampton), began a 12-year journey to produce a chronicle of America's Civil Rights Movement. Shortly after its release, "Eyes on the Prize: America's Civil Rights Years, 1954 to 1968" won the prestigious DuPont-Columbia Gold Baton; "Eyes on the Prize: America at the Crossroads, 1965 to 1983" followed with a Silver Baton in January 1990. The series won over 23 awards including Peabody awards for excellence in broadcast journalism, as well as six Emmys and an Academy Award® nomination.

Delta College has recognized the need to expand and improve its diversity efforts with the belief that externally the College must remain aware of the needs and concerns of the communities. Keeping in touch with area residents through the use of its public broadcasting stations has allowed Delta College to reach the public in their homes.

In February 2002, Q-TV premiered a monthly program produced by an extensive panel of community members serving in an advisory capacity. *Soul Issue: The African American Perspective* provides a forum and spotlight for African American culture and the community. The upbeat view of local issues and topics is produced and hosted by Linda Holoman.

Delta College Q-TV (WDCQ-DT/TV) and Q-90.1 (WUCX-FM) serve 28 counties as PBS and NPR stations, and are part of the fabric of the community. The stations have a reach of almost 1.2 million potential viewers and listeners - 24 hours a day. Within the 28 county area, Q-TV is the major PBS service in Bay, Midland and Saginaw counties, and remains unduplicated in Arenac, Gladwin, Ogemaw and Tuscola counties.
