Governor Cuomo's common core task force has three months to get to work in reforming new york's education system. As newschannel 34's nick Perreault explains, some aren't wasting any time questioning who is and is not on this task force. New York school boards association Tim Kramer is one of 15 people that make up governor Cuomo's task force to overhaul the state's common core standards announced Monday. Assemblyman Steve McLaughlin and Assemblywoman Claudia tenner aren't happy to see some of the same people who had a hand in developing common core standards on this task force. Kremer says the experience will help. They'll have their work cut out for them; tackling the standards, curriculum guidance and resources, reducing the length of tests and parent involvement. All concerns raised to education commissioner Maryellen ilia this summer. What's missing, teacher evaluations. But New York's deputy director for council on school superintendents and Tim Kramer say standards are the starting point. McLaughlin says this is the time for the governor to respond to the anger around common core.

Hundreds of area students put on hard hats to get hands-on experience in a career in construction. The Broome County Highway department held a construction career day this morning. Over 500 students from nearly 20 local school districts came out to learn more about construction jobs and types of equipment including bulldozers, back hoes and dump trucks. With guidance from workers, students were able to get behind the controls and operate heavy machinery. Johnson City senior Desja Rucker says operating the equipment gave her a good idea of what to expect in the field. In addition to learning about equipment, students also gained insight on job-site safety. The event was organized by a number of groups including the New York State D-O-T, Broome-Tioga Workforce and B-T BOCES. IBM-Endicott and BOCES also provided donations that made the event free for all area schools.

A scholarship fund has been established at a Binghamton school to honor a former student who inspired others after suffering a tragic accident. The Sara Scholarship at Calvin Coolidge is named for Sara Norris who passed away earlier this year. Norris attended Coolidge and, during her junior year at Binghamton High School, was in a car accident that left her paralyzed from the neck down. After graduating from high school, Norris took a position as a volunteer teacher aide at Coolidge helping to instruct students on reading and math. The school's former principal, David Constantine, says Norris also taught the students to see beyond her disability. Each year, students in 5th grade will write essays about compassion, tolerance, perseverance, generosity and community spirit and one boy and one girl will be selected to receive a 200 dollar scholarship. The money comes from 62 hundred dollars raised this Summer at the Teddy Invitational charity golf tournament.

The Southern Tier Homeless Coalition allowed residents to experience first-hand what it's like to live paycheck to paycheck. The organization held a poverty simulation event last night at Davis College. People were split into families and given money which had to be budgeted to pay for rent, utilities, food and other services. Decisions included where to put children when they're off from school and where to find extra money for unexpected expenses. Some families even ended up resorting to committing crimes to make ends meet. Event Coordinator Rebecca Rathmell says people should be more compassionate toward the needy. Many people were surprised at how frustrating it can be to have to choose between buying food and paying utilities. Rathmell says this was the first event of its kind held in our area. Last year, about 12 hundred people experienced homelessness in Broome County.

For some time now, local leaders have looked for ways to convince students who come to Binghamton University to stay in the area after graduation. And, for the past few years, more and more students have chosen to stick around the Parlour City. Tonight, NewsChannel 34's Mike Tanzini introduces us to a young professional who left a job working for Disney Cruise Lines to return to her alma mater.

After graduating from Binghamton University in December 2014, Natalie Murphy was ready to pack her bags and head to the Sunshine state to begin her career working for Disney Cruise Lines. Little did she know, she'd soon find herself back in the Southern Tier. She was contacted about a job as a communications manager at BU. Murphy says she was faced with a tough decision, but she knew making an impact at one of SUNY's top institutions was the right move. Murphy works at the main campus in Vestal and here at the Downtown Center in Binghamton. She says walking around campus as an employee feels a little bit different than it did as a student. In addition to the growth on campus, Murphy says she loves exploring the vast variety of new eateries and shops around downtown Binghamton. When it's time to unwind, she's hiking, exploring and simply taking in the scenes of the Southern Tier. Murphy says it's hard to believe that she was in a hurry to leave. As BU pushes to increase its enrollment to 20 thousand by 20-20, students in the classroom today, could be one of Binghamton's emerging leaders of tomorrow. Natalie Murphy grew up in Buffalo and studied English and Rhetoric during her undergraduate years.

Nearly 4 years and 3 months after their old school flooded, students from Binghamton's MacArthur Elementary are set to attend the new building. The move in will be done in 2 waves with grades 3 through 5 returning to the Southside on Monday. Pre-K through 2nd will arrive in the new year. The 129 thousand square foot building took 18 months to construct and is expected to come in about 3 million dollars under the 79 point 5 million that voters approved. FEMA is covering 75 percent of it, with the state picking up the rest with the exception of a small portion

of the cost of geothermal heating and solar panels. Principal Maria McIver is looking forward to an end to bussing the kids to 2 different schools across town. The school is set up with a large common area on higher ground near Vestal Avenue that houses the library, media center, cafeteria, music and art rooms and a combined gymnasium and auditorium. Then there are 3 separate classroom wings jutting out on pillars to protect the school from future flooding. Last night, students and their families got to tour the building. One significant difference with the new school is the large number of windows and natural light. Plus, architect Ashley McGraw incorporated a number of requests from students and teachers including a small stage for performances, a student cooking kitchen and lockers for 4th and 5th graders.

Members of the New York State Learning Community on Expanding Learning through School-Community Partnerships visited a Promise Zone location at Binghamton High School. It witnessed the school's Dream after-school program in which Binghamton University students assist the students with homework and review for exams. On the day the educators visited, the kids were played a version of Jeopardy, with prizes, that focused on their Global Studies curriculum. New York State Promise Zones create environments that engage and support schoolchildren so they are prepared to learn. Broome County Promise Zone locations are a joint effort of B-U, Broome-Tioga BOCES, the Broome County Mental Health Department and various local school districts.

A star baseball, football and hockey player in high school, Connolly went to Notre Dame on a baseball scholarship. However, despite all of his athletic success, Connolly was dealt a significant blow at age 15 when his father and mentor, Michael Connolly, died of lung cancer even though he had never smoked. Ryan says his passion for sports helped him through the loss of his father. He encourages the kids who are going through their own hard times to find a passion in their lives. Connolly is now assistant baseball coach at Virginia Tech. He and his mother Penny founded the Michael E Connolly Endowment for Lung Cancer Research which has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Hanna, a Republican, announced last week that he would retire after 3 terms in office. Brindisi, like several others, is weighing the decision over the holidays. He says he'll speak with his family before deciding in the next few weeks. Brindisi believes that gridlock in Washington would be solved by electing more representatives who are willing to work together to achieve a common goal. Another Utica-area Democrat, Michael Arcuri, held the seat from 2007 through 2010 when he was defeated by Hanna.

Across town, the Binghamton Noon Rotary was holding a forum of its own, this one between the candidates for Broome County Court Judge. Republican Kevin Dooley and Democrat Christian Root are vying for an open seat, one of 2 that oversee felony criminal cases in the county. Dooley stressed his 35 years of experience in the Broome County District Attorney's Office, the U-S Attorney's Office and as a special prosecutor of Saddam Hussein and other Iraqi leaders following the Iraq War. Dooley says he holds the record for prosecuting the most felony trials in Broome County history. He says that makes him especially qualified to work through the heavy case load in a fair and efficient manner. Root says he has a broad base of experience working as an attorney for the Department of Social Services, Tioga County and practicing in Family Court. He supports more diversionary forms of criminal justice such as Drug Court, Domestic Violence Court and Mental Health Treatment Court. Root says more needs to be done to rehabilitate criminals and put an end to the revolving door. The seat is currently held by Judge Martin Smith who is retiring at the end of the year.

With the election only 3 weeks away, there are more accusations in the 52nd District New York State Senate Race. Democrat Barbara Fiala has obtained dozens of State Police documents that reference Republican Fred Akshar assisting in an alleged domestic violence incident, while off-duty. In 2009, Akshar's girlfriend, and Broome County

Sheriff's Lieutenant, Kate Newcomb, assisted her nephew, Jeff Taylor, after he crashed his car into a telephone pole in Johnson City after he had allegedly been drinking.

According to the victim's testimony, Newcomb along with a man she knew as "Freddie," picked up Taylor and brought him to Newcomb's home where he was later interviewed by State Police. The victim also claims she was threatened by Newcomb to keep quiet. Fiala says this is yet another example of Akshar's unethical behavior. NewsChannel 34 spoke to Fred Akshar this afternoon. He says his focus remains on the important issues facing taxpayers including creating jobs and combating heroin. He says he won't engage in a back and forth conversation over issues that aren't relevant. The Republican says he's done nothing wrong. Fiala's campaign supplied NewsChannel 34 with the documents. Campaign members say it is unclear how the matter ended but don't believe Taylor was ever charged with a crime. Congressman Richard Hanna and State Senate Candidate Fred Akshar are shedding light on the importance of STEM classroom initiatives. The 2 Republicans held a news conference this afternoon at a portion of the proposed site of the Binghamton University Pharmacy School on Corliss Street in Johnson City. Hanna discussed his STEM Education Opportunity bill which is a monetary incentive plan to help relieve student debt. Hanna says the pharmacy school will give local students an opportunity to find a great career here at home. One of Fred Akshar's campaign platforms is pushing for high-paying jobs in our area. Akshar says businesses should be partnering with B-U and SUNY Broome to help retain graduates. Akshar says those partnerships would give students a head start on their careers. Akshar also believes the Pharmacy school will be a catalyst for economic development in our area. The project is part of a proposal for the state's Regional Economic Development 500 million dollar prize.

A forum featuring the candidates for the open 52nd District State Senate seat turned prickly today. Endwell Rotary hosted Democrat Barbara Fiala and Republican Fred Akshar during its weekly luncheon meeting at Brothers 2. During introductory remarks, Fiala stressed her more than 30 years of public service as well as accomplishments she made as Broome County Executive, including the renovation of the George Harvey Justice Building and the creation of the downtown Binghamton bus hub and Charles Street Business Park. Akshar says his 13 years fighting crime as a member of the Broome County Sheriff's Office gave him a first-hand view of the challenges facing our community. Fiala took exception to Akshar's assertions regarding a 33 percent property tax increase and 4 thousand job losses during her time as Executive. Fiala also accused Akshar of making an issue of her age by asserting that he would be a strong and energetic advocate for the district. Meanwhile, Akshar defended questions about how a self-proclaimed non-politician could so quickly amass an enormous campaign war chest. And he made a point to correct Fiala when she stated that Broome County lacks a detox program for heroin addicts. Akshar spoke of heroin and opioid abuse and the correlating increase in property crimes as a major issue facing the district. Fiala focused on poverty and the need for more jobs. Broome County Legislature Chairman Jerry Marinich will be stepping down to take a new position. BC Executive Debbie Preston says Marinich will take over the position of Emergency Services Director. Marinich worked for the Binghamton Fire Department for 30 years and was one of the first people trained as an EMT in 1978. He's been

serving on the Legislature since 2002 and was named Chairman in 2011. The Emergency services director works with EMS, fire, communications and disaster response. Marnich says he's missed working in the field since he retired. Ray Serowick has been filling in since June, after former director Brett Chellis took a communications job with the Department of Homeland Security. The Legislature still needs to vote on the approval of the appointment. Once the vote is complete, Marinich can begin the new position on January 1st.

Now that fracking is banned for the time being in New York State, anti-fracking activists have turned their attention to the build-up in natural gas infrastructure in New York State. In particular, pipelines and the requisite compressor stations. A group calling itself Stop the New York Fracked Gas Pipeline gathered in Albany today to urge Governor Cuomo to prohibit the expansion of natural gas infrastructure. Fractivists claim that the systems leak large amounts of gas which in turn is a public health threat. They say the leaked gas can cause asthma, C-O-P-D, congestive heart failure and, in some cases, permanent cognitive delays. They want the Department of Health to conduct a health impact assessment of existing natural gas pipelines and compressor stations before approving any more permits. A spokesman for the New York Oil Producers Association says because renewable energy can't compete with natural gas and oil prices, its supporters are making phony health and safety claims about the gas and oil industry.

Assemblywoman Donna Lupardo is calling on Governor Cuomo to provide more funding for programs aimed at keeping kids off drugs. Lupardo has sent a letter to the Governor to beef up funding for the Student Assistance Program. It offers counseling and student-initiated goal setting programs for at-risk youth. As many as 10 area schools took part in the program, but a cut in funding in 2009 forced 6 districts to drop out. Increased funding would be used to hire a program counselor for each school. Student Assistance Program Manager Jill Alford-Hamitt says the initiative has paved the way for student success. Lupardo also called on the Governor to fund a treatment program at Fairview Recovery Services. The Addictions Case Management program yielded results including increased functioning, longer periods of abstinence, less frequent relapses as well as increased sobriety in pregnant women. Funding was cut for that program in 2009 as well.

In his 25 years on the bench, Broome County Court Judge Martin Smith has seen a lot of changes. Smith says he's seen an explosion in the number of felony criminal cases handled in his courtroom. Now, as he faces forced retirement at the age of 70, he reflects on a quarter century of jurisprudence.

There's compelling reasons for me to continue to go along with this. But, boy does it bother me. You, sir, are about as cold-blooded a killer as I've run into in 40 years. Over the years, Judge Smith has been known not to mince words. Born and raised in Binghamton, Smith got his law degree from Syracuse University in 1970 and began his career as a prosecutor with the Westchester and Broome County District Attorney's Offices. Then, after more than a decade in private practice, he was elected judge in 1990 and started hearing cases the following year. He says he's seen the number of serious crimes double since his time as an assistant DA. Currently, Broome County has 4 murder cases on its calendar. Smith attributes much of the rise to drugs with heroin being the latest scourge leading to property crimes, violence and the destruction of families. For court watchers, Smith is particularly known for

insisting that defendants receiving plea deals admit fully to their guilt. Smith presided over his last set of appearances last Thursday. He says he wouldn't be retiring if he didn't have to but he is looking forward to traveling and spending more time with his family. Smith says he'll miss the people he's worked with the most. Also retiring, Smith's secretary Kathy Bender who has been with him for 30 years, going back to his days in private practice. Smith says he may return to a local law firm, perhaps serving again as a trial lawyer. Longtime local prosecutor Kevin Dooley won the November election to replace Smith on January 1st.

Mercy House of the Southern Tier will eventually offer a facility for the terminally ill inside what once was Saint Casimir's Church in Endicott. The former sanctuary is being converted into 10 bedrooms with 5 shared baths, a home-style kitchen and dining room, great room and small chapel. Mercy House President Anthony Paniccia says the construction is on schedule to be finished by the end of January with the first 2 residents moving in in February and full occupancy by April. Paniccia says distributors have donated flooring, carpeting and even pipes for the plumbing. Mercy House continues to raise money to fund the construction and operation of the facility. This Thursday, it will hold its second annual Gala of Taste. The evening brings together food from several local restaurants, tastings from regional wineries and local craft breweries and entertainment by a jazz trio. Plus, a silent auction, raffle board and 50-50. The Gala of Taste takes place from 5 to 8 P-M Thursday at the Our Lady of Good Counsel Parish Center in Endicott. Now, on to our series Preparing for the Elements. People are preparing to pay for heating costs as it gets colder in Greater Binghamton. NewsChannel 34's Mike Tanzini shows us one way to keep the heat inside of your home. If it seems like you just can't get the temperature up in your home, it may be time to consider adding insulation. Insulation Man Vice President David Currie says one tell-tale sign is if you get a lot of icicles on your roof. He says icicles are the product of warm air escaping the roof and melting snow which causes the water to freeze. Currie says if this continues, it can lead to tens of thousands of dollars in damage. Charity Bensley moved into her Airport Road home about 3 years ago. She found some unexpected surprises that convinced her to get some work done. Just a few weeks ago, Insulation Man installed both a cellulose form of insulation, which is mainly made up of ground up newspaper, and a spray foam version. Bensley says she's already felt a difference. The Bensley's are ready for their first Winter with the new insulation. In addition to relief from the cold, Currie says she will soon be finding relief in her checkbook. Bensley says her family has become closer than ever, now that they can spend time together in a nice warm living room, compared to having family members scamper to their respective rooms to seek warmth. The Bensleys can enjoy the heat that makes their house a home. Bensley says the insulation installation took only 2 days. Currie says the best time to start thinking about insulation is during the summer months.

In recognition of the success of Binghamton's drug court, as well as the serious heroin epidemic occurring in our area, the adult treatment specialty court has received nearly 700 thousand dollars in federal grants. The grants from the Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Justice were announced during a news conference at State Supreme Court yesterday. The Adult Drug Treatment Court works to divert eligible non-violent offenders from serving jail time to a program dubbed "Stop, Think, Change." Robert Mulvey is the Administrative Judge for the 6th Judicial District and William Pelella has been the drug court's presiding judge for the past 11 years. Mulvey says 85 percent of the cases currently handled in Binghamton's drug court are related to opioid abuse, especially heroin. Binghamton is one of only 10 such courts in the country to receive the grants. The money will be used primarily for training and some additional staff.

One of 5 companies licensed to grow medical marijuana in New York State is preparing to make the drug available to patients out of a storefront in Johnson City. Patients must have a valid prescription from a physician to treat one of 10 qualifying conditions in order to even enter the facility. Vireo Chief Medical Officer Stephen Dahmer says the dispensary will have 24 hour surveillance and nobody will be hanging out on the stoop. Vireo already operates 2 dispensaries in Minnesota. By law, it can open as early as January 5th, but Dahmer says it will be later than that before the J-C site is built out and the staff is hired and trained.

Opponents of hydrofracking are warning the public about numerous accidents, spills and disasters that have taken place across the State. Walter Hang of Toxics Targeting held a news conference at the Broome County Library to present what he calls disturbing findings. He says there have been a number of fires, explosions, and ruptures as a result of natural gas, crude oil and petroleum pipeline infrastructure in New York. Hang also says toxic discharges have not been cleaned to state standards. As a result, Hang says hundreds of homes have been evacuated and eventually demolished. Toxics Targeting, an environmental database firm, released a 358-page summary for 114 incidents that have taken place. Hang says even the most reliable equipment used in the industry isn't foolproof. In addition to releasing the findings, Hang has also sent a letter to Governor Cuomo. It would request that all pending Water Quality Certification applications for new natural gas, petroleum and crude oil infrastructure projects be denied, including the proposed Constitution Pipeline.

Binghamton Mayor Rich David says the Icehouse Bar, located at 16 Charlotte Street, has already acquired about 40 lockdown points as a result of fights and assaults. Last month, a 20-year old Binghamton University student was struck in the head with an unknown object and robbed. The attack left him in critical condition. The victim's family, Binghamton Police and an anonymous donor are pitching in 1 thousand dollars each for any information leading to an arrest. Rather than operating daily, the Ice House rents its venue for parties and events. Police Chief Joe Zikuski says it's concerning when a place that's only open periodically gets so much negative attention. Other Icehouse incidents include a robbery in 2005 and a stabbing in 2001. 2 other locations, the Antler Lodge on Chenango Street and the former Days Inn on Front Street have also received lockdown letters this year. Zikuski says both establishments have been working with the city to rectify the issues in hopes of avoiding a lockdown.

**Detailed Description:** 

NewsChannel 34's Mike Tanzini has been keeping busy as he's just completed his second season as a Southern Tier Football Official. Tonight, we bring you part one of our series Making the Call, as Mike talks about his role as a referee and shows us some of the tools of the trade.

You usually don't notice them until they make a big call. It takes thick skin to be a football referee and that's something I've learned as I work my way up the ranks as a Southern Tier Football Official. There's a lot to learn when it comes to rules, mechanics and unexpected situations. To help you understand a little more about what we do, I've decided to take to the field to teach you some basic techniques. We're down here at Ty Cobb Stadium, here at Union-Endicott high school, where I graduated in 2009. I'm going to show you some of the ins and outs of what a referee would carry during a football game. Here's the bean bag; we'll throw this on the field when there's a fumble to mark where the spot was, just to make sure we know where it was spotted when the ball came out. Here's the down indicator that I carry on my right hand. You just slide it down your fingers indicating which down. A whistle is a pretty standard feature that you see and hear a lot during a football game. The whistle doesn't really kill the play, the actions of the players kill the play. Another important part is the score card. We can keep track of who won the toss. The teams that are playing and when we flip the chains in between quarters, we write the down and distance. When you throw the flag, the job isn't done yet. You have to signal and correctly enforce the penalty. Whether you watch football in the stands on Friday or Saturday nights, here's a few signals you may see on a regular basis. If the offense moves first, before the ball is snapped, you'll have a false start.

If the defense jumps offsides, you'll see the hands on the hips for the encroachment signal.

Some more offensive and defensive penalties you'll see are holding and the block in the back.

The next time you're watching the football game from the stands, or in the comfort of your own home, pay attention to the guys and gals in black and white, and you might learn a thing or 2 about the game.

Gerace was humbled and thankful for all of the work that we had completed. Despite the astounding number of lives already changed by the Impact Project, Willard says the group is just getting started. 10 years, 77 projects and over 2100 volunteers.... Those numbers are impressive. What's even more impressive is the amount of love, compassion and caring the impact project brings to the people that need it most. A World War 2 pilot, who was shot down over Europe, received his Prisoner of War Medal today. 93 year-old Ed Knowlden of Vestal was presented with the honor by Congressman Richard Hanna during a Veteran's Day assembly at Johnson City Middle School. Knowlden was a member of the Army Air Corps. His B-17 was shot down while returning from a bombing run to Berlin. The plane crashed just off the coast of Holland. Knowlden lost consciousness in the water and was fished out by German soldiers. He was the only member of the crew to survive. He then spent exactly one year in a German P.O.W. camp, from April 29th 1944 until he was liberated on April 29th, 1945. Knowlden says he wanted the medal so that his descendants would know of what he went through during the war.

Lockheed Martin and the U-S Navy celebrated today the delivery of the first of 9 helicopters that have been sold to Denmark. The Royal Danish Air Force is purchasing the MH-60 Romeo helicopters to replace its current aging fleet. The hull of the Romeo is produced by partner Sikorsky while Lockheed workers in Owego install the high-tech systems and sensors within the cockpit. Lockheed officials say the MH-60 Romeo is the most advanced multimission maritime helicopter in the world. The Romeo is equipped with infrared radar and electromagnetic surveillance sensors that are integrated together to give the flight crew the most accurate information about the waters it's flying over. The Danish air force will use the choppers in the Baltic and North Seas around Denmark as

well as to patrol the waters around Greenland which is a Danish territory .All 9 Romeos should be delivered to Denmark by 2018. Previously, the Royal Australian Navy agreed to purchase 24 of the maritime helicopters.
