She educated and dispelled myths that the West Broad Y is not a real Y and that West Broad is a part of the international YMCA. West Broad is one of 5 heritage YMCA locations that still exist within the USA. The clubs were created for African Americans during segregation. Some of the programs offered onsite are a library, Girl and Boy Scout troops, soccer teams, and academic enrichment programs. One of the events she discussed was a recent undertaking between West Broad and local restaurants in the community. The collaborative effort raises money for schools supplies for their after school program. Tuesday, August 11th, 6 PM- 8PM, Ms. Slay, and her team from West Broad, will be at Five Guys, 12 Oaks location in Savannah. The purpose is to be more accessible within the community as they raise those much needed funds. 20% of each receipt left at the counter of Five Guys that evening will be donated to West Broad.

NixProphet, of Savannah Youth City, was our guest. Savannah Youth City began out of a need to assist and offer young people in Savannah an alternative to incarceration, and other challenges they face. Nix came to work with Savannah Youth City when Charles Smith was fatally wounded last year in Savannah on Augusta Avenue. NixProphet is originally from Miami and faced the temptations of life in the street. That ultimately led to his incarceration. Upon his release, his generational Savannah heritage, led him to move to the city, and to begin working to change his life. Savannah Youth City works to free people from the cycles of poverty, and homelessness as well. Their contact information and web page were shared with listeners. The organization has assisted young people get free from prostitution, gang violence, and human trafficking. They also offer educational assistance as well as other resources by partnering with various agencies and organizations in the city. Savannah Youth City is hosting various events through the end of July in many inner city areas. NixProphet shared that they will continue to work to inform and assist young people to take responsibility for their actions, their communities, and their neighborhoods.

They discussed Food Day. It is of the biggest events the organization participates in and will be held at Daffin Park. The event is sponsored by Well Fed Magazine. Food Day 2015 will be held in October 24th from 11 AM-5 PM. The event is billed as the largest food day celebration in America. They shared contact and web address information. Volunteers are needed for this and other events.

Healthy Savannah also has an initiative to make walking, and biking to school, a more viably safely option for students. Suzanne Donovan, Executive Director of Step Up Savannah, was our guest. Step Up is a non profit, that was birthed out of a concern former Mayor Floyd Adams had about the rate of poverty in Savannah. The program seeks to do that in various ways. Program participants can enroll in the Chatham Apprenticeship Program. The program is four weeks and offers training and skills necessary to secure better jobs in Savannah. There have been successes with participants getting hired by some of the companies they previously apprenticed with. Our listeners were given contact information about Step Up Savannah as well.

Ms. Donovan also shared that Step Up assists in teaching financial literacy classes, credit rebuilding classes, and other ways for individuals in the community to begin the ascent out of poverty. She shared, that although statistically it is hard to achieve the American dream if generational poverty has existed, the program shows that attaining a better life is possible.

Our guest was Cheryl Rogers, Director of Chatham County Victim Witness Assistance Program (VWAP). She has worked with the office for 32 years and been the director of VWAP for 5 years. VWAP serves to help victims through the effects of crime. They attend court with victims. They offer crisis counseling. They offer crime prevention. The office has various ways to assist those who have been victim's of crimes. The crimes range from misdemeanor, to larger crimes although the office does not assist victim's effected by crimes considered felonies. We provided our listeners with contact information. We also shared success stories. The office also has a Youth Intercept program designed to deter young people who may be likely to get involved in crime due to certain criteria or statistics such as truancy, or bullying. VWAP was the first program of its kind in GA and has grown tremendously. The office began with two advocates, but has grown currently to approximately 14 advocates in Chatham County.

**Approximately 3,500 people were feed holiday dinners. Free hair cuts, free produce (vegetalbes), financial workshops, free clothes and toys were provided to participants. WEAS supported this through live on air mentions, pre-recorded promotional announcements and social media posting.**

**WTYB aired interview on our local morning show between the hours of 7 a.m. and 9 a.m. with Mayor-elect Eddie DeLoach on Tuesday, December 15<sup>th</sup>. The interview encompassed two hours with 5-10 minute segments twice per hour. The number one issue facing the city of Savannah is crime. He went into depth about his proposed changes to help alleviate this public safety issue crippling the city.**

**WTYB aired interviews on our local morning show between the hours of 7 a.m. and 9 a.m. with Savannah Chief of Police Joe Lumpkin and Savannah District Attorney Meg Heap on December 14<sup>th</sup>. The station aired four separate interviews during a two hour segment of the show. Public safety was the topic of conversation and the various new methods the police department are using to curb violence and also discussed why the city is facing this dangerous issue. District Attorney Meg Heap talked about the process her department goes through when handling criminal cases in Savannah.**

**WTYB sponsored a Voter Mobilization session, offering training for neighborhood associations, civic groups, faith based organizations community groups and community leaders on the process of voting and mobilizing their neighborhoods to participate in the voting process for the 2015 Municipal election Tuesday, November 3rd. The event occurred on Saturday, October 24<sup>th</sup> at New Covenant Church Savannah from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Complimentary breakfast was provided. Approximately 15 different groups/organizations showed up to learn tips to help inspire people in their areas to vote. The event was put on by the Trigon Group. WTYB conducted on-air interviews, live liners and pre-recorded promos to inform the community.**

**WTYB sponsored the final mayoral debate Sunday, November 1<sup>st</sup> at second African Baptist Church in Savannah, Ga. From 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. it was the final chance for the community to hear the candidates about issues that affect the community. Also sponsored by Savannah Tribune, Chatham Association of Educators and Savannah Herald. Approximately 100 citizens were in attendance. WTYB supported the event with live liners, pre-recorded promos and social media posting.**
