Check Your Health is committed to bringing viewers the latest information to help keep families healthy. Both of these segments run in all of our newscasts.

Healthy Living - Airing every day in our weekday 5pm newscast, Healthy Living deals with health and medical issues. The emphasis is on health issues that affect a majority of people, such as healthy eating, exercise, common children's health issues etc. We occasionally do stories on rare medical conditions, or cutting edge medical procedures.

The stories outline new trends or problems and offer advice and solutions from professionals, such as doctors, dieticians, fitness trainers, etc. The stories are fronted by anchor Shauna Lake.

Get Gephardt - Investigative reporter Matt Gephardt takes on major corporations or government entities helping viewers who are caught in red tape. In addition, the Gephardt Unit investigations serve as a warning to consumers about potential fraud happening locally. The Gephardt unit takes many calls from the tip line each week and receives several e-mails weekly from viewers with consumer complaints. The Gephardt stories air during the 10:00pm newscast.

Family Matters - Family Matters is a pro-social campaign that emphasizes the most important information Utah parents need to know and is designed to strengthen and celebrate families. The campaign offers meaningful insight into the topics that frequently impact our families. Family Matters is a station wide initiative and yearlong campaign.

Pay It Forward - Every Wednesday, KUTV's Mark Koelbel/10P Anchor features a good samaritan in the community. Mark gives the good samaritan \$500 in cash via Mountain America Credit Union for this person to give to their cause. This franchise highlights people and organizations working in the community on a grassroots level to make life better for others. KUTV will also run the Pay It Forward story the following Thursday Morning in KUTV2 News This Morning and in the 2News at 7PM on KMYU.

Person 2 Person – A feature in our Sunday 10P News is Person 2 Person. Every Sunday Shauna Lake has a conversation with some of Utah's most influential people. From doctors to politicians to people with extraordinary life events, Person 2 Person lets the community know about extraordinary individuals whose work, personal endeavors or personal experiences may have an impact on Utah's society.

CRIME & PUBLIC SAFETY:

Roy Murder Charges (aired 07/01/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – The family of a Roy woman is speaking out after her husband is arrested and charged with her murder. The sister of the murder victim says she got strange letters from the suspect in which he talked about assisted suicide but at the time she didn't think anything of it because he often sent bizarre letters. This story also explains how police linked the man to his wife's death even months after she was buried. It also lets our viewers know what charges have been filed against the suspect.

Vandalism Charges (aired 07/01/2014 @10pm :30 seconds) – Two teenage boys have been charged in connection with the vandalism of a number of model homes in the community of Daybreak. The suspects were caught on camera in May causing thousands of dollars in damages. Police released the video to the media and got a number of tips, which lead them to the two 18-year-old boys. This story explains that investigators are no longer looking for the suspects who sprayed graffiti on multiple homes, signs and sheds. Our story also explains what criminal charges have been filed against them.

MacNeill Deliberation (aired 07/03/2014 @ 10pm, 2:15 minutes) – A former Utah County doctor has been found guilty for the second time in just eight months. Martin MacNeill was found guilty of sex abuse of his daughter. In November, he was found guilty of murder for killing his wife. This story continues to follow the high profile case of MacNeill and lets our viewers know that he has been convicted of another crime. The story also explains that MacNeill will be sentenced on the sex abuse case first and then be sentenced for murdering his wife.

Lindon Murder (aired 07/04/2014 @ 6:00am, 45 seconds) – A man is dead after being gunned down in his Lindon home and the man police say shot him is his wife's ex-husband. This story updates viewers to the suspect in the case, and what Lee is accused of doing before killing his ex-wife's husband.

Ogden Robberies (aired 7/4/2014 @ 4:30am 0:25 seconds) Police in Ogden arrested a man and women in connection to a pair of armed robberies. Police booked 24-year-old Tyler Miller, and 28-year-old Angelica Gomez-Corona into the Weber County jail. Our viewers benefitted by learning about progress police made in solving an armed robbery investigation.

Legacy Highway Ax (aired 7/7/2014 @ 4:30am 0:30 seconds) Two people were hospitalized after an accident near Legacy Parkway in Davis County. Police say speed and alcohol may have been factors in the accident. Our viewers benefitted by learning of an accident that affected traffic and the local community.

Lehi Dog Poisoning (aired 07/07/2014 @ 10pm, 2:30 minutes) – Police say they know who poisoned two dogs in a Lehi neighborhood. They say the man who lives next door to the dogs put poison in a can of tuna and gave it to the dogs. The dogs' owners claim the suspect did not like the dogs because they barked every once in a while. This story explains how investigators tracked him down and lets viewers know that the man will only face misdemeanor charges because he is cooperating with police.

Murray Warehouse Fire (aired 7/8/2014 @ 5:00am 0:30 seconds) Unified Fire Fighters extinguished flames at a warehouse in Murray. Fire crews were able to get the flames out within a half hour, but the building was a total loss. The cause of the fire was unclear. Our viewers benefitted by learning of a destructive fire that affected the local community.

Pleasant Grove Police on Huntsman Case (aired 07/08/2014 @ 10pm, 2:30 minutes) – Police are releasing more information in the disturbing case of a mother accused of killing six of her own babies. Investigators say Megan Huntsman told them her drug addiction was the reason she allegedly killed her children. In a police interview, Huntsman apparently said she could not afford a meth habit and the babies. Our story gives new details about test results and the shocking reaction the suspect had when police questioned her about the murders.

Child Porn Arrest (aired 07/09/2014 @5:00am 0:30 seconds) A Heber man was arrested on accusations he viewed and distributed child pornography. George Darnsteadt was booked into the Wasatch County jail following a lengthy investigation. Police say they found him sharing child pornography using a peer to peer file sharing service during an undercover investigation. Darnsteadt faces 20 counts of sexual exploitation of a child. Our viewers benefitted by learning of police activity intended to crack down on people who sexually exploited children.

West Jordan Shooting (aired 07/10/2014 @6:00am, 1:30 minutes) – One person is in the hospital after an officer-involved shooting that happened at Jordan Landing. Police say they got a call about suspicious activity at the shopping center. Shots were fired. The victim was taken to the hospital in serious but stable condition. This story lets viewers know about the shooting overnight, and what police are doing this morning to investigate.

Logan Murder Suicide (aired 07/14/2014 @6:00am, 1:30 minutes) – Police in Logan are on the scene of a possible double murder-suicide. Early this morning two people were found dead in an apartment and another person was found dead at a different apartment complex. This story updates viewers to what police think happened and how the two cases are connected.

Stolen Car Chase (aired 07/15/2014 @5:00am 0:25 seconds) Unified Police say they have a suspect in custody and recovered a stolen car after a brief chase. Police say the stolen car also contained evidence from recent burglaries. Our viewers benefitted by learning of progress police are making on solving recent crimes.

Magna Shed Fire (aired 07/15/2014 @5:00am 0:25 seconds) A small fire kept firefighters in Magna busy. The fire started in the detached garage of a home. Our viewers benefitted by learning about a fire that affected a local family.

Bus Driver in Court (aired 07/15/2014 @6:00am, 1:30minutes) – A former bus driver accused of abusing a 5-year-old will be in court one day after charges were filed against him for abusing a second girl. This story updates viewers on the most recent charges, and tells them what is expected to happen in court today.

West Jordan Shooting Update (aired 07/16/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) A man shot by police in West Jordan is now out of the hospital and behind bars. An officer shot 31-year-old timothy James Peterson outside the Office Max in Jordan Landing. Police say Peterson was wanted on warrants and had previously threatened police. Our viewers benefitted by being kept up to date on a police case involving the use of force.

West Valley City Chase (aired 07/16/2014 @ 6:00am, 1:30 minutes) – Five people are hurt in a West Valley car chase, including the two people police were chasing. Police believe the driver is wanted for several crimes in the area. This story lets viewers know about the overnight chase and the case that police think the driver is connected to.

St. George Stabbing (aired 07/18/2014 @6:00 am 35 seconds) – Police have released the details surrounding an alleged stabbing in St. George. Alexander Riley Gatherum and Taylor Cole Hintz are accused of attacking a man who came over to their house. This story lets viewers know about the charges the men are facing and what allegedly led up to the stabbing.

SLC Homicide (aired 07/18/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – Salt Lake City police were searching for a suspect who killed a woman inside a downtown hotel room. The police asked for the public's help in finding out what happened. Police wouldn't say how she was killed, who found her at the hotel, or what may have happened. They would only release the victim's name to the public. In our story, we talked to the victim's family who gave some clues in the case. The victim's family said the woman took a train from Sandy to meet a friend. That was the last time anyone saw her. Her family did not know why she would go to a hotel, and said she was not involved in drugs and had no enemies. Police asked the public to contact them if they knew anything.

Grunwald Change (aired 07/21/2014 @6:00 am, 1:30 minutes) – The 17-year-old girl charged in the killing of Sgt. Cory Wride will be in court today to discuss the possibility for a change of venue. This story updates viewers to the court case and lets them know why Grunwald's attorney wants the change of venue.

Alleged Meth Mom Arrested (aired 07/21/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A mother accused of stealing her meth addicted baby from a Montana hospital was arrest in Box Elder County. Police say the woman and her baby had been on the run for more than a month. This story explains how technology and good timing helped local law enforcement catch the woman. It also lets our viewers know what criminal charges she will be facing and what happens to her little boy now that she is behind bars.

Murder Charges (aired 07/22/2014 @6:00am, 30 seconds) – Police have charged two Salt Lake County men with murder in connection to a deadly shooting last month. Irving Nunez and Ernesto Navarro are accused of firing shots at a car in an alley killing one man and hurting a teen. This story updates viewers to the case, and tells them who is facing charges in connection to it.

Window Jumper (aired 07/23/2014 @6:30am, 25 seconds) – A woman is in the hospital after jumping out a third story window to avoid getting served a felony warrant. She's now in the hospital and won't be served the warrants until she's released. This story updates viewers to a bizarre overnight case.

Paramedic Cops (aired 07/23/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – A group of sheriff's deputies are pulling double duty working as paramedics. Some members of the Davis County Sheriff's office can both track down lawbreakers and save a patient with a serious heart problem. It is one of only a handful of programs like it in the entire country. This story lets our viewers know how the dual-trained officer program works to keep people safe and explains why the deputy/paramedics program is so important to those living in Davis County.

Salt Lake Stabbing (aired 07/25/2014 @6:30am, 30 seconds) – Two people are recovering after a stabbing in Liberty Park last night. Police tell us a group of teens were talking and began to fight. This story lets viewers know about news happening overnight, and what police are doing to track down the stabber.

Hiker Rescue (aired 07/25/2014 @6:00 am, 1:30 minutes) – It was a long night for search and rescue crews in Provo Canyon. They spent the night trying to reach a stranded hiker trapped on a cliff. This story lets viewers know about the recent efforts of the rescue and reminds people to be more careful as they go hiking.

Deadly Accident (aired 07/30/2014 @6:00am, 1:30 minutes) – One person is dead after a car crashed into a Taylorsville home overnight. This story updates viewers to news happening overnight in their area.

West Valley City Burglary (aired 07/30/2014 @6:30am, 25 seconds) – Police caught two people they say broke into a West Valley City elementary school. Police got a call from the Granite School District around two in the morning indicating that an alarm was going off at Pioneer elementary. This story updates viewers to news happening overnight, and lets them know police did find two people inside the school.

Suspect Arrested (aired 07/31/2014 @6:30am, 30 seconds) – South Jordan police say they've caught the man wanted for robbing a Walmart earlier this week. 37-year-old Dennis Monard is facing charges of aggravated robbery and weapons violation by a restricted person. This story updates viewers on the robbery, and the charges Monard faces.

Decapitated Puppies (aired 08/08/2014 @10pm, 2:00 minutes) – A disturbing discovery was made in a pond at a Midvale apartment complex. Two dead puppies were found and both had been decapitated. Investigators say they have little evidence and they are asking the public for help. This story explains what happened and lets our viewers know that a five thousand dollar reward is being offered for information leading to an arrest in the case.

Salt Lake City Shooting (aired 08/12/2014 @6:00am, 1:30 minutes) – One man is dead following an officer involved shooting in Salt Lake last night. An investigation is now underway to determine what led to the shooting. This story lets people know about the overnight shooting and what police are doing next with the investigation.

West Valley City Chase (aired 08/14/2014 @5:30am, 1:30 minutes) – A suspect is still on the loose after a chase that started in West Valley City and ended in Murray. Police spotted 26-year-old Jason Stout, and when they tried to pull him over he took off. Stout drove into oncoming traffic and police called off the chase. The story lets viewers know about the overnight chase, the passenger who was taken into custody, what police are doing to track down Stout, and why they were looking for him in the first place.

Derby Accident (aired 08/14/2014 @5:30 am, 25 seconds) – An official with the Davis County Fair Demolition Derby is in critical condition after a truck fell on him last night. This story lets viewers know about the accident that happened late last night.

Dickey's Poisoning (aired 08/14/2014 @5:30am, 35 seconds) – A woman is in critical condition in the hospital after receiving chemical burns to her mouth and throat from a drink at Dickey's Barbeque. According to preliminary reports, a toxic cleaning chemical was accidentally mixed with the drink. This story lets viewers know about the bizarre incident and what police think happened.

Layton House Fire (aired 08/15/2014 @6:30 am, 25 seconds) – A man is in the hospital this morning after getting burned in a fire at his Layton home overnight. The man told firefighters he had been cooking with grease when he fell asleep and his home caught on fire. He burned his hands trying to put the fire out with water. This story lets viewers know about an overnight fire, the damage it did, and the dangers of trying to put out a grease fire with water.

Stolen Bees (aired 08/15/2014 @10pm, 2:00 minutes) – Police are looking for the person who stole honey bees from a Layton farm. The beekeepers are two brothers who started the business to pay for college and their LDS missions. The suspect or suspects drove into the field in the middle of the night and took out the center section, which was full of bees and replaced it with empty frames. The brothers say the bees are worth 12 to 13 thousand dollars. This story lets our viewers know that there is a burglary suspect on the loose and explains what they can do to help the boys try and cover their losses.

Dickey's Improper Labeling (aired 08/20/2014 @5:30am, :35 seconds) – A restaurant where a woman unknowingly drank iced tea mixed with chemicals was apparently cited seven months earlier for improper food labeling. Officials issued seven violations to the Dickey's Barbecue in South Jordan back in January. This story lets viewers know about other problems at the restaurant that could have possibly led up to the toxic tea problem.

Rape Kit Follow Up (aired 8/20/2014 @7:30am 2:00 minutes) - During a tour of the state crime lab, technicians discuss ways to more efficiently process rape kits. The public is informed of how taxpayer money might be used to address the problem.

Ferguson Taylor (aired 8/21/2014 @7:00am :45 seconds) - A group of Utah residents demand change in police conduct after a man was shot and killed by officers. The public is informed of concerns over police brutality.

FLDS Lawsuit Bond (aired 08/21/2014 @5:30am 0:30 seconds) A judge ordered a trust for the FLDS church to pay a \$5,000,000 bond. The money will be held in escrow while a court battle plays out. Former FLDS child bride Elissa Wall is suing the church, Warren Jeffs, and the United Effort Plan trust. The Utah Supreme Court has agreed to hear the case, but that could take several years. The judge Ordered UEP to pay the

bond so if the court rules in Wall's favor there will be money for the trust to pay the settlement. Our viewers benefitted by being kept up to date on developments following the arrest of FLDS President Warren Jeffs.

Child Porn Manufacturer (aired 08/21/2014 @10pm, 2:00 minutes) – A Logan man has been arrested for possessing hundreds of images of child pornography. Investigators believe William Larson downloaded all of the images but they also think he may have produced some of it. This story lets our viewers know that the man has been arrested, explains that investigators believe there could be more victims and lets our viewers know what to do if they feel like they've been victimized by Larson.

K9 Demonstration (aired 08/21/2014 @10pm, 2:00 minutes) – Several local law enforcement agencies gathered in Cottonwood Heights to show off one of their finest crime fighting tools. K-9 units were on display with hopes of showing the public that the dogs are not ferocious attack animals but rather a tool to help keep them safe. Our story highlights the dogs' different skills and explains the extensive amount of training the dogs and their handlers have to go through.

West Lake Threat Arrest (aired 08/22/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – Police arrested a teen boy after he allegedly threatened to blow up a Saratoga Springs school. Police say the boy lived near West Lake High School, but was not currently attending the school. He was taking online classes. Police say the 16-year-old called in the bomb threat through Skype—so he could hide his identity. The FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force eventually tracked the boy down, but didn't find any explosives or weapons in his home. The teen is now facing terrorist charges.

Heroin Bust (aired 08/25/2014 @7:00am :20 seconds) - Several people are arrested after a drug sting. Viewers are informed of how police worked with federal agencies to get the drugs off the streets.

Public Enemy Caught (aired 08/25/2014 @7:00am :25 seconds) - A man on Weber County's most wanted list was arrested. Viewers were informed how he was caught and where.

Drug Sentence (aired 08/25/2014 7:00am :35 seconds) - A Utah senator pushed for change to sentencing laws for non-violent drug crimes. The public is informed of concerns over mandatory minimum sentences and what is being proposed to change the law.

Truman Murder (aired 08/25/2014 @7:00am :25 seconds) - A man accused of killing his wife for insurance money appears in court. Viewers are informed of what the next step in the criminal proceedings is.

Suspect Chase and Robbery (aired 08/25/2014 @7:00am :35 seconds) - A man eludes police after a series of robberies and a chase. He is captured 18 hours later and booked into jail. Story informs public of how he was caught.

Salt Lake Attacks (aired 08/25/2014 @6:30am 1:00 minute) – Salt Lake Police say they are looking for two men after two different attacks and an attempted robbery overnight. Police say three different people were jumped by two men, and the pair tried to rob one of the victims. This story lets viewers know about news happening overnight, why police think the cases are connected, and who police are looking for this morning.

Kitten Tortured Arrest (aired 08/25/2014 @10pm, 2:15 minutes) – A Murray man is facing criminal charges after a litter of kittens were found dumped in a trash can. Police say the man used sticky rat traps to catch the kittens. The suspect says he was not targeting the kittens but trying to catch rats. His neighbors say he did it on purpose and police seem to agree. The man has been charged with five counts of torture of a companion animal. In this story we talk to the suspect, the neighbors and the police about the incident. We let our viewers know how the kittens are doing and explain that eventually they will be up for adoption.

Boehme in Court (aired 08/26/2014 @7:00am :25 seconds) - A man accused of shooting an individual after an argument appears in court. The story explains to viewers the next step in the legal process for the accused.

Driver Bailed Out (aired 08/26/2014 @7:00am :30 seconds) - A school bus driver accused of inappropriately touching special needs children is bailed out of jail. Our story informs the public of what is next for this man.

SWAT Gear Found (aired 08/26/2014 @7:00am :45 seconds) - Stolen guns and other equipment is back in police hands after it was taken from an unmarked police car. The public is informed of what was taken and where it was found.

Salt Lake City Shots Fired (aired 08/26/2014 @4:30am 0:35 seconds) Salt Lake City police are investigating after shots were fired in front of a home near Rose Park. Witnesses say some people were seen walking along 600 North when the shots were fired. A SUV in front of a home was hit. It was unclear where they were fired from. Our viewers benefitted by learning of an overnight incident involving gun fire.

Bus Driver Out on Bail (aired 08/26/2014 @6:00am, :30 seconds) – A former school bus driver accused of sexually molesting two five-year-old special needs girls is out of jail. According to court documents, John Carrell posted bail on the 19th. This story lets viewers know about what he'll have to do while out on bail, how much he paid, and when he'll have to be back in court.

Officer Assault (aired 08/27/2014 @6:30am, :35 seconds) – A man is behind bars this morning after west Jordan Police say he drove under the influence, tried to break into a home, and attacked officers. This story was new in the morning, and let viewers know about the overnight chase, and the charges the man is now facing.

Child Abuse Homicide (aired 08/27/2014 @7:30am :45 seconds) - A child is killed while her mother is at work. The man responsible for the killing admits his role to police. This story informs the viewer of what happens next in the case.

Baby in Dumpster (aired 08/27/2014 @7:00am 1:05 minutes) - A 24-year-old woman is charged with attempted murder after neighbors find a newborn baby in a dumpster. The story informed viewers of the crime and what is being done to hold the woman accountable.

International Drugs (aired 08/27/2014 @7:00am :45 seconds) - A Utah man is arrested and charged with drug possession after a package full of drugs from Amsterdam is delivered to him. Viewers are informed of how federal and local law enforcement agencies are fighting drugs.

Red Butte Rescue (aired 08/28/2014 5:00am 0:20 seconds) A woman is safe after she had to be rescued from Red Butte Canyon. The woman was hiking and broke her ankle. She was taken to the hospital to be treated. Our viewers benefitted by learning of a rescue response to save a stranded hiker.

West Valley Chase (aired 08/28/2014 @6:30am, 1:30 minutes) – Police in West Valley are investigating after a chase with a U-Haul early this morning. The chase began around 4:30, before police could stop the driver by spiking his tires. This story was breaking in the morning, and let viewers know what police planned to do with the stolen material found in the truck.

U-Haul Chase (aired 08/28/2014 @7:00am 1:30 minutes) - A man driving a U-Haul Truck lead police on a chase. The van was full of stolen goods. Our story informed viewers of what efforts the police took to safely take the driver into custody.

Trash Baby (aired 08/28/2014 @7:00am :45 seconds) - The father of a woman accused of throwing her baby in the trash says she should not face charges because she has special needs. Viewers were brought up to speed on the court case against her.

Bar Mom (aired 08/28/2014 @7:00am :25 seconds) - A woman left her child in the car while she entered a bar to drink. She was arrested for endangerment. Our viewers were reminded of the dangers of leaving a child in the car and the legal implications.

Deceased Child's Father Talks (aired 08/29/2014 @7:00am 1:10 minutes) – A man is accused of killing his girlfriend's child. The woman and her family recently moved to Utah. In our story, the child's biological father comes to Utah from Washington and talks about the tragic loss of his daughter.

Chamberlain Murder (aired 08/29/2014 @7:00am :25 seconds) - A man is accused of first degree murder for the killing of his wife. There are reports he had an assisted suicide manual. Our story previewed the man's preliminary hearing scheduled that day.

BYU Gropers (aired 8/29/2014 7:00am :25 seconds) - A man was accused of groping several women on BYU campus in Provo. Witnesses say the man would sexually assault women as he jogged by on campus. More than 16 incidents were originally reported but there was only enough evidence to charge him on two counts. Our story covered his preliminary hearing.

West Jordan Voyeurism (aired 08/29/2014 7:00am :30 seconds) - Women at a shopping center reported a man peeking into their dressing room stalls. When the man was confronted, he fled the store. Our story had a copy his description along with information to contact police.

Man in Capitol (aired 08/29/2014 7:30am 2:20 minutes) - A man was found unconscious inside an office building near the State Capitol. The man appeared to be intoxicated and was found by a janitor. Our story talked about who he was and how he got into the building.

23-Year-Old Murder Solved (aired 08/29/2014 @7:30am 25 seconds) - A 23-year-old cold case murder has been solved. Police were able to identify a suspect using DNA technology on an old piece of evidence. Our story explained how that worked and who the suspect is.

Magna Stabbers (aired 08/29/2014 @7:30am :25 seconds) - Three people were charged in a stabbing incident in Magna. An argument between people in a passing car and people outside a home turned violent. Our story talked about the ensuing fight and stabbing.

Stolen Car (aired 09/08/2014 @6:30am, 1:30 minutes) – One man is in custody and police are looking for a second after they found a stolen truck last night. U.H.P. tells us they put an “attempt to locate” on a truck and a trooper recognized it outside a gas station. Two people inside the car then tried to run when the officer approached. This story lets viewers know about the overnight search, and what police are now working on after being unable to find the second suspect.

Ogden Officer Involved Shooting (aired 09/09/2014 @10pm, 2:15 minutes) – An officer involved shooting in an Ogden neighborhood has left one person dead. Police say that person was wanted in connection with a shooting last week in a Rite Aid parking lot. Officers say they were attempting to make contact with the suspect and tracked him to the Ogden neighborhood. Shortly thereafter shots were fired and the suspect was killed. This gives our viewers an explanation to a heightened police presence in the area of a school and explains that the suspect in the original shooting is no longer on the run.

Millcreek Stabbing (aired 9/10/2014 @4:30am 0:40 seconds) A man was hospitalized after being stabbed during an argument. Another person tried to take a victim to the hospital only to get into a car crash on the way. Emergency crews then transported the

victim to the hospital in serious condition. Police had not located a suspect. Our viewers benefitted by learning that they should call an ambulance rather than driving someone to the hospital themselves.

I-80 Crash (aired 09/11/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) Three people were hospitalized after a rollover accident on Interstate 80. Utah Highway Patrol reports that a teenage driver swerved to miss some debris on the road causing the accident. Our viewers benefited by receiving a reminder to not swerve to avoid obstacles.

Angilau Courtroom Video (aired 09/11/2014 @4:30am 0:25 seconds) The family of a man shot and killed during a federal court trial earlier this year wants the court to release video of the incident. Siale Angilau was shot and killed by a U.S. marshal in April after he allegedly rushed to attack the witness. Angilau's family says the video would help them know if excessive force was used. Our viewers benefitted by learning of an effort to hold law enforcement accountable.

Santa Shack Vandalized (aired 09/11/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A long time Christmas staple in Sugar House has been vandalized. Someone broke into the “Santa Shack” and left a big mess behind. Officers say someone broke windows and spray painted the “shack.” This story explains that police have little information about who might have committed the crime and lets our viewers know if they saw anything suspicious in the area to let police know so they can catch the vandals.

WVC Shots Fired (aired 09/12/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) Police are looking for someone who shot at a truck after a rap concert at USANA amphitheater in West Valley City. Officers say a truck came to a stop at an intersection when a car pulled up beside it and the driver fired a shot at the truck. Our viewers benefitted by learning what police knew about the shooting so they could help identify the shooter.

Missing Man Dead (aired 09/12/2014 @4:30am 0:25 seconds) A man who went missing in Summit County is dead. The Summit County Sheriff's Office says they found the body of 44-year-old Allen Dale Broberg in a field. He had been reported missing the day before. Officers say the death did not appear to be suspicious.

West Valley Fire (aired 09/12/2014 @6:00am, 45 seconds) – Two homes are a total loss after an early morning fire burned an apartment complex in West Valley. Police officers nearby noticed smoke coming from the building, and quickly evacuated neighbors. Two apartments were fully engulfed. This story lets viewers know about the overnight fire and how a quick thinking officer probably saved lives.

Ogden Swat (aired 09/12/2014 @10pm, 1:00 minutes) – Two people are dead in what appears to be a murder suicide. Police say a man and woman are dead and a third person was sent to the hospital with a gunshot wound to the hand. Neighbors say a husband and wife are the two people dead and their daughter is the one shot in the hand. This story lets our viewers in that area know why there was a large police

presence in the neighborhood and explains what police know about what happened inside the crime scene.

Bountiful Abduction (aired 09/12/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – Two teenage girls say they escaped a kidnapping after being held in a car for more than 19 hours. Police say the girls were taken from a Bountiful neighborhood in the early morning hours and managed to escape in Santaquin later that night. We talked to the person who let the girls use her phone to call 911 after escaping their kidnappers. This story lets our viewers know that police are searching for the kidnapping suspects and gives a description so they can be on the lookout.

SLC Armed Robbery (aired 09/16/2014 @4:30am 0:25 seconds) Salt Lake City police are investigating an armed robbery at a local business. Police say a man dressed entirely in black with a bandana over his face walked into Bob's Magazine and Video in Salt Lake City, showed a gun and demanded money. After getting money from the clerk the man ran off. Our viewers benefitted by learning of an overnight crime, and to be alert for suspicious activity.

Flaming Gorge Search (aired 09/16/2014 @4:30am 0:25 seconds) - Search and Rescue crews resumed the search for a fisherman who disappeared when his boat capsized on Flaming Gorge Reservoir. The fisherman disappeared on September 1, after his boat capsized. The search was temporarily suspended due to bad weather. Our viewers benefitted by learning that rescue crews were doing all they could to recover the body of a missing man who likely drowned.

Salt Lake Car Arson Fire (aired 09/17/2014 @6:30am, 20 seconds) – Police are investigating after they say a stolen car was intentionally set on fire overnight. Police determined the car was stolen and had been stripped of its parts. This story lets viewers know about the overnight fire, and what investigators are now looking into.

Provo Hazmat (aired 09/18/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) - Dozens of workers were forced to evacuate a factory building in Provo due to a chemical odor. Some of the employees reported minor skin and eye irritation. Provo firefighters investigated but were unable to determine the source of the smell. The workers were eventually allowed to return to work. Our viewers benefitted by learning that there was no apparent danger from a hazardous material.

Missing Man (aired 09/18/2014 @4:30am 0:25 seconds) - Idaho police asked for help finding a missing man who was last reported in Utah. The man was on a photography trip in the Bear Lake area. Cell phone records last placed him in the Laketown area. Our viewers benefitted by learning of how they could help authorities find a missing person, and who to look for.

UHP Chase (aired 09/18/2014 @6:00am, 45 seconds) – A man is in custody after leading Highway Patrol on a chase overnight. Troopers tell us the car took off after a

traffic stop, and grazed an officer, not injuring him. This story lets viewers know about the overnight chase, and the charges the driver will likely be facing after he was caught.

Provo Hazmat (aired 09/18/2014 @6:30am, 25 seconds) – A chemical odor forced nearly a dozen workers to leave their job overnight in Provo. Several people complained of skin and eye irritation. This story lets viewers know about the overnight chemical concern at Smith Mega-diamond building.

School Bus Knife Concerns (aired 09/18/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – A bus driver is asking for school officials to act, after she claims a student brought a weapon on her bus. She takes students home from Parkside Elementary, and says a sixth grade girl held a pocketknife up to another student on the bus. The driver says she took the knife, turned it into the school, and wrote up a citation. But the next day, the student was back on her bus—when she should have been expelled according to school policy. The driver says she requested action, but the girl was only taken off her bus for a couple of days. The bus driver says the school administration is sweeping the incident under the rug, and not taking proper action to keep students safe. But school officials say the principal tried to talk to the driver, but there was miscommunication. They also claim the driver filled out the citation form incorrectly. School district officials say the kids should feel safe taking the bus.

Digital Crime Scanner (aired 09/18/2014 @10pm, 3:00 minutes) – The Unified Police Department has a new crime fighting tool that makes easy to capture the exact details of a crime scene. It is a simple high tech scanner that can take exact measurements of a crime scene and turn it into a 3D image that can last forever. Our story explains how the new technology works, how it has already been used to help solve crime and how the technology can be used in the future.

Brighton Lewd Conduct Arrest (aired 09/22/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – Police have arrested a man they say was exposing himself to high school students as they walked home from school. Benjamin Lee Nielson is facing several misdemeanor charges. One of his alleged victims says Nielson was naked standing in front of his apartment window pleasuring himself. This story lets our viewers know where the man lives and explains that police think there could be more students who saw the man expose himself. Officers are asking parents to talk to their kids and call the police department if they saw anything.

Driver Charged (aired 09/24/2014 @6:00am, 30 seconds) – A West Valley man has been charged with automobile homicide in connection to a deadly crash near the airport back in May. Unified Police say Jonathan Cruz' blood contained marijuana and more than twice the legal limit of alcohol when he sped more than 100 miles per hour on I-80 before crashing into a pond killing his three passengers. This story updates viewers to what happened to the driver since the crash happened back in May.

EDUCATION:

Jordan Split (aired 07/9/2014 @ 5pm, 2:00 minutes) – West Jordan city is considering pulling out of the Jordan School District and creating its own district. Students in the city make up the majority of the school district—so pulling out would be a huge blow to the Jordan district. South Jordan is also considering leaving the Jordan district, and West Jordan city is basing its decision on what South Jordan does. The cities believe the Jordan School District is not giving the schools what they need and is wasting money on property. But district officials say if the cities in the district stay together, it will be better for the students. The district is meeting with one of the cities later this month to talk about its demands. The issue also may end up on the November ballot.

BYU Jerusalem Center (aired 07/11/2014 @5:00am 0:15 seconds) Unrest between Israel and Palestine caused tense moments for BYU students studying in Jerusalem. Students spent about ten minutes inside a bomb shelter on July 10th after several missiles were fired toward Jerusalem. The LDS church says they are closely monitoring the situation, and will evacuate students if necessary. Our viewers benefitted by learning how tensions in the Middle East are affecting BYU students abroad.

School District Split (aired 07/14/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – Talks of the Jordan School District splitting prompted a meeting of the minds. Mayors, school district officials and elected representatives sat down to talk about the pros and cons of breaking the school district apart. Our story explains what options are being looked at and explains the demands being made by the cities who want the school district to split. This story lets parents know the battle over school district lines is heating up and it may be an issue that will have to be decided at the polls.

Raft & Run (aired 07/15/2014 @5:00am 2:00 minutes) A Utah woman is working to help other women get their college degree. Her ‘Live Your Dream Foundation’ provides scholarships to single mothers. She raises money for the scholarships through her Pioneer Day raft and run event. Our viewers benefitted by learning how they could help single mothers get college scholarships.

School Starting (aired 07/28/2014 @6:30am, 30 seconds) – Students attending year round school in the Jordan School District are headed back to school on 7/28. This story lets drivers know to be aware of children headed back to class in school zones in that area.

School for Teen Moms (aired 08/12/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A new charter school dedicated exclusively to teen mothers is opening in Salt Lake City. Officials say it’s the first of its kind in the state allowing teen moms to bring their babies to school as they work towards graduation. This story explains why this school was established, lets our viewers know how they can learn more about the school if they are interested and explains that donations are needed to help get the school up and running.

Schools for Teen Moms (aired 08/13/2014 @7:00am 2:05 minutes) - A new school is opening in Utah to help teen moms and their children. We explain to viewers where the school is and what inspired its creation.

School Bus Mix-Up (aired 08/15/2014 @10pm, 2:00 minutes) – A South Jordan family is outraged after their 5-year-old granddaughter was dropped off at the wrong bus stop. The family says the kindergarten student had no idea where she was and was found wandering a neighborhood miles away from her home. Our story explain what changes the family would like to see implemented and gives the school district explanation as to why it happened in the first place.

Education & Money (aired 08/26/2014 @5pm, 1:30 minutes) – Legislative leaders are discussing a tax increase for Utah schools. Some lawmakers want to raise the income tax and create an education fund. But many Republican legislators believe higher income taxes might hurt the economy, and maybe would end income tax deductions—like deductions for charitable giving, or mortgage interest. For the past twenty-five years, Utah has been last among all the states in the amount spent on each student. So lawmakers are now realizing the state should spend more on education.

Girls Who Code (aired 08/27/2014 @7:00am 2:10 minutes) - This is a story about a group of computer coders who are teaching young girls how to become coders themselves. The story informs viewers of training available for girls in Utah.

Title 1 Preschool (aired 09/10/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – A preschool program in Southern Utah is helping kids stay ahead in school. The program is part of the Washington County School District's "Title 1" curriculum, which mixes technology and traditional teaching. Kids who participate in the preschool program are usually those who need a little more help than others. The program is designed to help them learn the skills they need before they enter kindergarten. The director of the program says helping the kids now saves money later on—so they don't have to send the kids to extra classes for help later in life. The preschool program is federally funded, and for those who qualify for the program, the schooling is free that year.

"U" in Korea (aired 09/15/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – The University of Utah's new campus in South Korea is open but only 20 students are currently enrolled. University officials admit they were expecting more students to sign up but the overall goal of two thousand students in 5 years is still achievable. The campus was built by the Korean government and offers four different degrees. This story explains who is eligible to enroll at the South Korea campus and lets viewers know that students from Utah will pay in state tuition rate if they are interested in attending college at the Asia campus.

CONSUMER AFFAIRS:

Chicken Recall (aired 07/4/2014 @4:30am 0:25 seconds) Foster Farms announced a recall of chicken sold in Utah. The recall was for boneless/skinless chicken breasts with a "use or freeze by" date from March 21st to March 29th. The chicken is linked to an

outbreak of salmonella that has made more than 500 people sick in 27 states. Our viewers benefitted by learning of a recall of food that could affect them.

Salt Lake's Economy (aired 07/09/2014, @6:00am, 30 seconds) – Utah has the 7th fastest growing state economy in the country. But Utah is unique because every other state in the top ten can point to either energy or agriculture for that growth, but the Bureau of Labor Statistics says the growth here is due to Utah's friendly business climate. This story shows viewers how our economy is growing and some reasons experts thinks it looks good.

Farmers Market Food Stamps (aired 07/11/2014 @5:00am 0:25 seconds) Nineteen farmers markets in Utah accepted food stamps this summer. Several participated in the food stamp program for the first time. The program is possible thanks to a grant from the departments of Agriculture and Workforce Services. Our viewers benefitted by learning of an effort to provide low income people with a chance to have fresh, healthy food.

Downtown Salt Lake City (aired 07/11/2014, @6:00am, 25 seconds) – Retailers amassed a record 800 million in sales last year as younger residents, suburban dwellers and tourists sought out downtown restaurants, bars, and stores. This story lets viewers know about the economy boom down town, and how the uptick in sales is affecting the economy.

UTA vs. Business Owners (aired 07/11/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A Salt Lake City business owner is fighting the state of Utah to keep his custom furniture shop open. UTA and UDOT are trying to use eminent domain to take the man's property to build a new bus barn. Our story gives both the business owner's and the state official's positions and explains that a judge has ruled the case should move forward to trial where a jury will decide the outcome.

BMW Recall (aired 07/16/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – BMW recalled more than one million of its popular car series. There was concern about the airbag safety. Viewers were educated on a major issue with a popular car and now know if they need to take their car into be checked.

Microsoft Layoffs (aired 07/17/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Microsoft announced the largest layoff in its history. The business is cutting 18,000 jobs in within the next year. That's about 14% of the business' 125,000 employees. A lot of families are affected by the job layoffs, so it's good information for the viewer to know.

Fed-Ex Drug Deliveries (aired 07/18/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Fed-Ex is in trouble for allegedly shipping prescription drugs from illegal online pharmacies to addicts and to drug dealers. The business claims they are innocent of any wrong doing. The viewer learns about the accusations about a big mail delivery company.

Back-to-School Prices (aired 07/18/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Summer is over and kids are heading back to school. Good news for parents and bad news for their wallets. A survey found out that Americans will spend about \$26.5 billion on school items. The average family spends close to \$700 for school supplies, clothes and electronics. This is a big story for 2News viewers. A lot of them are parents who are affected by this story.

Airport Groundbreaking (aired 07/18/2014 @6:00 am 1:30 minutes) – The Salt Lake International Airport is about to get a major makeover. Crews plan to build a brand new terminal and get rid of the old ones. This story lets viewers know what to expect as construction gets underway.

Flight Prices (aired 07/21/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) - If you're going to fly, expect to pay a little more. New security rates went into effect. Your plane ticket will be about ten dollars more with the new rates in effect. Viewers are informed about how their next plane ride will cost them more.

Google Speeds (aired 07/21/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) - Google is working to make your pages load faster. They developed a new picture format that will make your search speed faster. A lot of people use Google so viewers who do are informed about what the business is doing to speed up the search.

GM Recall (aired 07/23/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – General Motors is recalling 700,000 cars and trucks. This is a continuous story that keeps the viewer informed about problems in the car industry so they know if their car is one that needs to be checked out or fixed.

Orange Juice Low (aired 07/23/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) People aren't drinking orange juice like they used to. Sales for the breakfast beverage hit the lowest point in 12 years. Some say the high prices and variety of other juice choices is to blame. A 2News viewer learns about the drinking habits of fellow Americans and why people aren't choosing an old favorite.

Mail Delivery (aired 07/24/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – A new survey says 38% of mail was delivered late last year. That is up 13% from 2011. The Post Office Inspector General said the error is due to a smaller work force at the post office. The viewer is informed that if their mail has been delivered late, it will possibly continue to be.

ComiCon Lawsuit (aired 08/11/2014 @7:00am :25 seconds) - The organizers of the San Diego ComiCon event filed a lawsuit against Salt Lake Comic Con for copyright infringement. We tell viewers what this means for Salt Lake Com Con and how it could affect local businesses.

Ford Explorer Issues (aired 08/16/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is looking into possible issues with Ford

Explorer's brake hoses. A police department reported the possible issue. A viewer is informed about possible issues with their cars that they may want to have checked.

Sprint Data Plans (aired 08/16/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Sprint is offering new shared data plan. The company says it is doubling the family data sharing plan. People who watched Channel 2 News learned about new options for a cell phone plan.

Provo Poverty (aired 08/18/2014 @6:00am, 25 seconds) – A new study says Provo has one of the fastest growing poverty rates in the nation. The Brookings Institute says the city's poor population has nearly doubled in the last 12 years. This story lets viewers know about the growing poverty rate, and what some experts are attributing it to.

SNIAGRAB (aired 08/25/2014 @7:00am 2:00 minutes) - A guest segment that informed viewers how they can get significant discounts on winter gear. This annual events is a clearing house for skiers looking to save big bucks. With so many Utahns involved in winter sports, the impact can be huge.

Burger King (aired 08/26/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Burger King is bringing back the Chicken Fries. The restaurant says people on social media were begging to bring them back, so they did. The viewer learns about a new option next time they drive-thru Burger King.

Tivo (aired 08/26/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Tivo is targeting “cord cutters” or people who don't have cable or satellite TV. The company is offering a \$50 “over the air” TV signal that records shows. That's a cheaper option than the \$200 normal model. Viewers who have the over the air channels now know a way they can record their favorite shows without having cable.

Park City Lawsuit (aired 08/27/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) A judge considered to keep lifts at Park City Mountain Resort open while a property dispute is settled. Park City Mountain Resort and its landlord, Talisker Land Holdings, were at odds over the property after PCMR failed to renew its long term lease. Our viewers benefitted by learning the latest developments of a lawsuit that would affect the economy of the Park City area.

Alcohol Permit Ruling (aired 08/27/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) Utah's liquor board is revising the way it grants permits after a nearly dry Oktoberfest celebration. The Utah department of alcoholic beverage control heard from cities, festivals, and others as the department works to clarify the rules for special events. Our viewers benefitted by being kept up to date on changes to Utah's liquor policies.

Suzuki Recall (aired 08/27/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) - Suzuki is recalling more than 19,000 cars and spiders are to blame. The company says spider webs can clog the fuel vapor vent in some models, cutting off the air flow and possibly causing fuel leaks and

fires. At this point no accidents or injuries have been reported by the issue. Viewers learn about a bizarre issue that they need to watch out for with their Suzuki car.

HP Laptop Charger (aired 08/27/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Some HP Laptop charging chords are fire hazards. The business recalled more than six million cords because they could overheat and catch fire. Viewers learned what laptop chords are affected and what they can do to switch their problem chord out.

Corvette Sales (aired 09/12/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – General Motors is stopping sales of the 2015 Corvettes. The company says they have to fix the driver's side airbags. The viewer learns about yet another car recall and how they can get their car fixed, if it's affected.

CamperWorld Lawsuit (aired 09/12/2014 @10pm, 2:15 minutes) – A class-action lawsuit against Utah based business, “CamperWorld” is growing. A group of customers are accusing “CamperWorld” of breach of contract after the company started requiring an \$880 assessment fee to help keep the business open during a time of “financial distress.” This story explains how others can join the class action lawsuit and give “CamperWorld” officials an opportunity to defend their actions. The company says they are working to regain customer confidence and say they would be happy to discuss their financial records with any member who would like to know more.

Home Depot Breach (aired 09/18/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – Home Depot says a massive data breach has affected 56 million payment cards which were used at their stores. The card information was stolen by hackers as far back as April of this year and some customers are just now finding out their money has been stolen. This story explains who could be at risk, what to watch out for on your financial statement and what to do if you spot fraudulent activity on your card.

Cereal Sales (aired 09/19/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Cereal is no longer the popular choice for a quick breakfast. Cereal sales have dropped. More Americans are having breakfast, but they're going with other options like yogurt and breakfast sandwiches. Viewers learn about breakfast trends and how that's affecting the sales of cereal.

Beer Latte (aired 09/23/2014 @6:00pm 30 seconds) – Starbucks is offering a new latte that tastes like beer. It's called the dark barrel, but there is no beer in the drink. It's made with espresso and topped with whipped cream, dark caramel drizzle and blended with a chocolaty stout-flavored sauce. Viewers learn about a new drink option they have the next time they make a trip for their caffeine fix.

YOUTH AND FAMILY:

“Let It Go” Movie (aired 07/02/2014 @10pm, 2:45 minutes) –The inspirational story of a Utah man who lost half of his family in a drunk driving crash is now being made into a movie. Chris Williams forgave the young driver who was behind the wheel of the car that killed Chris' pregnant wife and two of his four children. This story lets our viewers

know that the story of forgiveness is headed to the big screen and that filming is taking place right here in Utah. It also explains why the film makers wanted to make the movie and when it will be released.

Safety on the 4th of July (aired 07/04/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Every year, many Utah children will have to go to the emergency room on the 4th of July because of injuries from fireworks. Doctors see devastating injuries such as head injuries and even blindness. Sparklers can even be dangerous to children. Doctors say the best way to enjoy the 4th of July is to take your family to a fireworks show instead of attempting to do a show at home.

Teagan Story Update (aired 07/04/2014 @10pm runs 2 minutes) – Last year, we introduced you to a little “superhero” who was born with a congenital heart defect. Despite several surgeries, little Teagan Pettit needs a new heart. After his last surgery, Teagan developed a condition called plastic bronchitis. Fluid in his lungs builds and hardens causing Teagan to struggle to breath. As he waits for a heart transplant, Teagan is on oxygen and has a feeding tube and medicine to help him breath.

Fire Captain Funeral (7/10/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) Funeral services for a Murray fire captain who died while on vacation in Hawaii are now scheduled. Investigators say the captain suffered a heart attack while snorkeling with his wife. Our viewers benefitted by learning the time and location of the services so they could attend and honor an emergency responder.

Equestrian Program (aired 07/17/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 30 seconds) - There are a number of studies that show the emotional and physical benefits of animal assisted therapy. In Summit County, horses are used to help kids with disabilities. The equestrian program at the National Ability Center offers three different forms of therapy to children: adaptive horseback riding, hippo therapy and equine facilitated learning. Experts tell us the programs help children with cognitive, behavioral, or physical disabilities.

Summer Safety (aired 07/24/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 25 seconds) – Summer season is trauma season for physicians at Primary Children’s Hospital and this holiday weekend will be no exception. Doctors say this time of year they see everything from broken bones, to concussions, to even nasty sunburns. And many of the injuries could have likely been prevented. Sunscreen, for example, could prevent a serious sunburn. Helmets can help prevent serious injuries from riding a bicycle, ATV or scooter. Doctors are urging parents to use common sense and keep a close eye on their children.

Back to School Shopping (aired 7/29/2014 @ 5pm, 1:30 minutes) – The time for back to school shopping has arrived in July. A recent survey by the National Retail Federation shows families are shopping for school earlier than ever before. The survey found 24% of parents are now shopping for school items at least two months before school begins—up from 15% in 2007. Some experts in the story said stores were promoting back-to-school items earlier as well. The National Retail Federation also

expects parents to spend more money on their kids this year—especially as technology becomes more prevalent in schools.

Substance Abuse (aired 07/31/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 30 seconds) – It's a topic that many people don't want to discuss. The fact is substance abuse is a problem not here in Utah, but across the nation. Experts say one way to help someone fight an addiction is to simply listen. They say helping someone with an addiction can be tough but it can also be crucial to their recovery.

Healthy Snacks for Kids (aired 07/31/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – For families on the go, snacks are great ways to bridge the gaps between meals. But is there such a thing as the perfect snack? Experts say there are two types of snacks – one that gives you energy and one that gives you proper nutrition. The trick is finding the right balance. One way to find a good balance with snacks is to prepare them ahead of time. You can pack a bag of crackers with some apple slices or baby carrots. Parents can also spice up fruits and vegetables with a little low fat ranch or salsa.

Heber Breastfeeding Booth (aired 08/08/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A breastfeeding booth at a local farmers market got the attention of the Heber City police. The organizer of the market complained about the booth and demanded that some of the breast feeding pictures be taken down. The police were called; an officer checked it out and found nothing illegal or inappropriate. The owner of the booth says she feels targeted for something she says is a natural thing. Our story explains that the booth owner has complained to city officials about being targeted and gives the city's response to the controversy.

HPV Vaccines for Teens (aired 08/14/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – As kids head back to school, doctors are reminding parents about vaccinations for young teenagers. There are 4 vaccines recommended for young teens between the ages of 11-to-13. Those vaccinations include influenza, DTaP, Meningococcal, and the HPV Vaccine. Now doctors know there are a lot of parents who are wary of the HPV vaccine. However, they say the vaccine could protect young teens from getting cancer in the future.

Annual Exams for Kids (aired 08/14/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Part of the back to school checklist is scheduling an appointment for your child's physical exam with his or her physician. Even if your child is the picture of perfect health, doctors say they should still be seen by their pediatrician at least once a year. The annual exam can help doctors track your child's development, learning, and mental well being.

Post-Partum Doulas (aired 08/15/2014 @5pm Runs 1 minute 25 seconds) - They say it takes a village to raise a child, but for many new moms there is no village. Instead, they are left alone to care for their newborn. There are a growing number of women who are offering emotional support to new moms. They are certified as mother roasters – women who support new moms after the initial care phase. Mother roasters work with new moms during the post-partum stage, or the weeks and months following birth.

Acupuncture for Kids (aired 08/15/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 20 seconds) – Traditional Chinese medicine is being integrated into the care of young patients at Primary Children's Hospital. Acupuncture is used to treat everything from stress to sleep problems. There are many techniques for acupuncture, especially if the patients are a little scared of needles. Acupuncture is used both in the hospital as well as in the outpatient clinic.

Sleep & School (aired 8/25/2014 @5pm, 1:30 minutes) – The American Academy of Pediatrics is recommending some big changes to the school day—in order to help teens get more sleep. Doctors say teens aren't getting the 8.5 to 9.5 hours of sleep they need. So they are recommending that middle and high schools start their day at 8:30am or later. Experts discussed the negative effects of kids not getting enough sleep, including poor grades, obesity, depression and car accidents. Our story also had some tips for teens to get a better night's sleep, especially by turning off their electronic devices before bed.

Safe Haven Law (aired 08/27/2014 @7:30am 2:25 minutes) - After a mother dumped her baby in the garbage, this story shows mothers of unwanted children an alternative to help find new homes for babies. It showed viewers what steps can be taken to avoid tragedy and/or legal problems.

Mom Not Charged (aired 8/28/2014 @7:00am :30 seconds) - A Washington County mother will not face charges after she accidentally left her child in a hot car. The baby girl died from the heat. This story reminded viewers of the dangers of leaving a child in a hot car unattended.

Teens and Concussions (aired 08/28/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 30 seconds) – The high school football season is underway across the state. And that means coaches and athletic trainers will be on the lookout for injuries, especially concussions. Athletes in the Canyons School District were educated about concussions before they even hit the playing field. Parents are also educated about the signs and dangers of concussions.

Hashtag Cut the Carls (aired 09/01/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A movement to boycott a popular fast food chain is gaining momentum here in Utah. The new hashtag campaign urges people to avoid "Carl's Jr" because of the company's portrayal of women. The company's advertisements feature scantily clad models eating burgers. This story explains that the "#CUTTHECARLS" campaign was started by a Utah organization and explains why the organization feels it is important to try and get the ads off television.

Pediatric Surgery (aired 09/04/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – A partnership between doctors at two hospitals are helping to keep kids closer to home while recovering from surgery. Pediatric surgeons from Primary Children's Hospital are performing general surgery on small patients at Utah Valley Regional Medical Center in

Provo. Surgeons can also do follow up care. This, they say, saves family members time and money since they don't have to travel the hour or so to Salt Lake City.

Utah Good for Babies (aired 09/11/2014 @4:30am 0:20 seconds) A new study ranks Utah in the top ten best states to have a baby. The study from Wallet Hub ranked all fifty states based on medical costs, quality of healthcare, environmental factors, and the number of mom groups and child centers. Utah ranked 10th in the nation on the list. Our viewers benefitted by learning and having a sense of pride that Utah is among the best places in the nation to have a child.

Women, Infants, and Children (aired 09/12/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 16 seconds) – The Women, Infants, and Children Program, or WIC, helps thousands of people in Utah. And they offer more than just financial assistance. The program also provides breastfeeding support to new moms. The program also provides nutritional coaching for parents. Experts say many Utah families qualify for WIC and either don't know it or are too embarrassed to ask for assistance.

Booster Seat Warning (aired 9/17/2014 @5pm, 1:30 minutes) – A new survey says many parents don't follow booster seat guidelines in their cars. "Safe Kids Worldwide" conducted the survey, and say most parents stop using booster seats for their kids before they should. Our story gave parents some of the height and weight guidelines for kids and booster seats. Many of the parents surveyed were unaware of these guidelines. Parents also admitted in the survey they didn't use the booster seats because it was inconvenient during short rides or during car pools. But safety experts say the seats need to be used during every ride. Booster seats are expected to reduce the risk of serious injuries by 45% for children between 4 and 8-years-old.

Utah Best Places to Live (aired 09/18/2014 @4:30am 0:25 seconds) Three Utah cities were ranked among the top 50 places to live by the website 24-7 Wall Street. Orem ranked 30th on the list while Layton and West Jordan ranked 39th and 40th respectively. Our viewers benefitted by learning of national recognition some Utah cities were receiving for having strong economies, low crime rates, and good school systems.

Terrible 3's (aired 09/19/14 @5pm runs 1 minute 30 seconds) – Some parents would argue that 3-year-olds are more challenging than 2-year-olds. Doctors say toddlers at that age are trying to express their independence and when they don't get what they want, they will often express their frustration in the form of tantrums. This can push parents to their limits. That's why parents need to be patient and even have a little bit of a sense of humor. Parents should also pick their battles and remember that toddlerhood is a short stage of life.

Bingham High Dress Drama (aired 09/22/2014 @10pm, 2:15 minutes) – A group of students at Bingham High School say they were singled out at the homecoming dance because school officials said their attire did not meet the dress code. The students claim that the dress code is too strict and finding a dress to meet the standard is almost impossible. School officials say the students were given the choice to go home and

change or just leave. The student organized a walk out in protest of the dress code controversy. This story explains what rules the students broke and lets our viewers know how the school is handling the situation that is creating a buzz in the community

ENVIRONMENT:

Wolverine in Utah (aired 07/02/2014 @10pm, 2:15 minutes) – One of the rarest endangered mammals has been spotted in the Uinta mountain range. Experts caught a wolverine on camera and say the video shows that Utah still has the habitat for them to make a comeback. This story explains how researcher lured the wolverine to the camera and lets our viewers know what wildlife experts hope to learn from the video.

Fire Battle Plan (aired 7/23/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – The weather is hot, dry and windy—a perfect combination for wildfires. Fire officials who represent agencies in the valley and officials for the state forest service are concerned about the dry conditions and what effects fireworks may have on the wildfire season. So firefighters are coming up with a battle plan to prevent fires in the area. Our story featured tips for viewers on how to keep fires from sparking while they light off fireworks for the upcoming state holiday. We also informed them on where to find a map of firework restrictions in the valley.

Iron County Solar Project (aired 08/22/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – Iron County will soon be home to the largest solar facility in Utah. The project is expected to bring great benefits to Southern Utah, including reducing the carbon footprint and jobs for nearly 200 people. Project managers say the panels will absorb enough light to power Iron County. Managers also hope to make the solar project educational by adding a visitor center for people to learn more about solar power. Officials say in the end, residents shouldn't see any change in their energy bills. A groundbreaking for the solar farm is expected in October. The project is expected to cost between \$150-\$170 million dollars.

Utah Earthquake (aired 08/25/2014 @7:30am 1:05 minutes) - A seismologist in Utah examines the possibility of a major earthquake in the state after an earthquake rocks California's wine country.

NSL Landslide Report (aired 08/25/2014 @7:30am :35 minutes) - North Salt Lake City officials release their report into a landslide that destroyed a home. Viewers are informed of the North Salt Lake City's denial of responsibility.

Diesel Spill (aired 08/29/2014 @4:30am 0:25 seconds) A semi-truck crash sent gallons of diesel fuel into Echo Creek in Summit County. The spill happened when a semi-truck and a SUV crashed on westbound I-80 in Echo Canyon. Crews placed booms in the creek to stop the fuel from spreading while cleanup was underway. Our viewers benefitted by learning of a potential hazard and were given a number to call if they saw contamination in their area.

Save the Sage Grouse (aired 09/02/2014 @10pm, 2:00 minutes) – A battle is brewing in a rural Utah community over the need to develop land and the concern over a

protected bird. There are three thousand acres of land southeast of Morgan that some landowners would like to develop but the land is a natural habitat for some sage grouse. This story explains why commissioners rejected the landowner request to develop the land and explains why the landowners are not backing down from the fight.

Prairie Dog Lawsuit (aired 09/11/2014 @ 5:00am 0:30 seconds) Lawyers for a group of Cedar City property owners argued in a lawsuit that challenges protections of prairie dogs. They claimed that federal rules protecting the prairie dog are unconstitutional. Our viewers benefitted by learning of an ongoing dispute that could change the rules regarding protections for prairie dogs in the state.

Bear Attack (aired 09/16/2014 @ 4:30am 0:25 seconds) A Utah man died in a bear attack in the Bridger Teton National Forest in Wyoming. He was in a remote area of the national forest checking a research plot. Authorities are not sure what kind of bear attacked the man. Our viewers benefitted by learning of the death of a local man and by extension to take precaution while in bear country.

Gold Fish Petition (aired 09/17/2014 @ 5pm, 1:30 minutes) – A Salt Lake City fifth grader is concerned about gold fish. He claims goldfish bowls suffocate the fish and stunt their growth. He started an online petition to get the goldfish bowls banned in the United States. His goal is to get 100,000 signatures. He is also encouraging people to get big tanks for the fish, or build a pond for the animals—which is what he is doing in his own backyard. Experts at the University of Utah are saying the 10-year-old has a point. One biologist says the small bowls do stunt the fish's growth. And many times, their homes need proper filtration and aeration which many bowls may not have.

ATV Protesters Charged (aired 09/17/2014 @ 10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A protest against the federal government over public lands had resulted in charges. Five people who investigators say organized an illegal ATV ride are now facing federal charges. This stems from the federal government closing a section of land to ATVs in an area just east of Blanding. During the protest, ATV riders rode on the land that is deemed off limits. This story explains the charges the organizers face, the punishment that could be handed down and gives local reaction to the charges being filed.

DIVERSITY:

Anti-Gay Group Coming to SLC (aired 07/02/2014 @ 10pm, 2:30 minutes) – The “World Congress of Families” is holding their annual conference in Salt Lake City next year. This is the same group that pushed for laws in Uganda and Russia where one could get up to 15 years in prison for being gay. The group was invited by The Sutherland Institute, a conservative think tank. This story explains why the Sutherland Institute would invite such a controversial conference into the state and gives reaction from the local gay pride center.

UT Gay Marriage Latest (aired 07/9/2014 @ 5pm, 1:30 minutes) - Supporters of same sex marriage want Governor Gary Herbert to stop the state's fight against gay marriage. Same sex marriage supporters gathered almost 4,000 signatures asking the state not to

appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court to hear the case on same sex marriage. They delivered the petition to the Governor's mansion. An appeal would take almost a year or longer to complete. The Governor was out of town and could not receive the petition in person. But in the past he said only the U.S. Supreme Court can give finality on the issue. Utah's Attorney General also issued a statement saying he plans to appeal directly to the Supreme Court on the issue.

Immigration Vigil (aired 07/09/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – As President Obama spent the day in Texas discussing the growing problem of illegal immigration, people in Utah gathered for an immigration rally. They were joined together in support of the tens of thousands of children who enter the country illegally on their own, without their parents. Our story explains what this group would like to see done to deal with the immigration problem and why they say the children should be allowed to stay in the United States, despite being here illegally.

Gay Marriage Appeal (aired 07/10/2014 @6:00am, 20 seconds) – The state of Utah's fight against same sex marriage is headed to the U.S. Supreme court. The Attorney General's office announced it will file an appeal to the high court sometime in the next couple of weeks. This story updates viewers to the current legal proceedings on the state's battle on same sex marriage.

Women Low Wage Jobs (aired 07/31/2014 @6:00 am, 25 seconds) – Women in Utah are more than twice as likely as men to work at low wage jobs, even when they have superior educations. This story lets viewers know of the pay difference between men and women in the state.

"TransMormon" Documentary (aired 08/13/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A locally produced documentary is shedding light on what it is like to be a transgender member of the LDS Church. The film is based on the life of a young woman from Orem who says she grew up as a girl trapped in a boy's body. Our story explains why the woman decided she wanted to make the documentary and gives our viewers a glimpse into her life as a transgender member of the LDS Church. We also let our viewers know where and when they can watch the documentary if they are interested.

Just Play Cleats (aired 08/14/2014 @7:30am 2:30 minutes) - A group of soccer players were in studio for a guest segment to talk about what they are doing to help refugees around the world get equipment to play soccer and how viewers can help.

Same Sex Marriage Poll (aired 08/18/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – A new poll shows the majority of Utahns do not support same sex marriage. This poll is very different from those released in the past. The latest poll showed an even split between those who oppose it and those who favor it. This poll was sponsored by "utahpolicy.com" and Zion's Bank. The study was conducted by Dan Jones, and found 61% of Utahns completely oppose or somewhat oppose same sex marriage. Only 29% completely supported or somewhat supported gay marriage. 10% of those polled were neutral. Even though many Utahns in the poll opposed same sex marriage, many of them

believe the state would lose its fight against the issue in U.S. Supreme Court. In our story we broke down the numbers of the poll, and also talked to same sex marriage supporters about what they thought of the latest numbers. Supporters say they don't trust the source of the poll and that they may have a hidden agenda.

BYU & Same Sex Marriage Cards (aired 08/20/2:30 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – As the battle of same sex marriage continues in Utah, an ironic situation occurred at the BYU Bookstore. Greeting cards for same sex couples showed up on the store shelves. BYU, of course, is owned by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, which is opposed to gay marriage. Our story explains how the cards were found and how the school believes they made it into the bookstore in the first place.

Capitol Protest Charges (aired 08/28/2014 @7:30am :30 seconds) - Charges are filed against a group of people who staged a protest over Utah's laws regarding sexual orientation. Our story informed viewers of what concerns LGBT groups have with Utah's laws.

Same Sex Marriage Supreme Court (aired 08/29/2014 @6:00am, :30 seconds) – Attorney's for three local gay and lesbian couples are formally asking the U.S. Supreme Court to take up Utah's same sex marriage case. This story updates viewers to the most recent legal proceedings on Utah's same sex marriage fight.

Governor on Sister Wives (aired 08/29/2014 @6:00am, :35 seconds) – Governor Gary Herbert says Utah should appeal a court ruling that is in favor of the family of the reality show "Sister Wives." The ruling struck down key parts of a law criminalizing polygamy. Governor Herbert now says he will defend the laws on the books and will appeal. This story lets viewers know the state's plans to appeal the ruling.

Police Force Diversity (aired 09/8/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – Police departments around the country are evaluating their racial make up in light of a police shooting involving an unarmed black teenager in Ferguson, Missouri. An Associated Press story examined some police departments in Utah and found that Latinos were under represented in the West Valley Police Department. That city's department had only 10 Hispanic officers on the force, which is comprised of 197 men and women. Hispanic residents overall make up roughly one-third of the city's population. Officials for the police department say the department can only hire the people who apply, and they aren't getting many applications. They say only 8% of the applicants are Latino. But Hispanic advocates say the community can feel the racial imbalance of the police force, and that relationships between police and citizens are suffering. Police and community leaders are working together to encourage more Latinos to apply to the force, as well as working to improve relationships between residents and law enforcement.

Supreme Court Same Sex Marriage (aired 09/10/2014 @5:00am 0:30 seconds) Both sides of the gay marriage debate say it's time for the supreme court to settle the matter. In addition, recently Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg said she thinks the court will take up the issue. A final ruling isn't likely before June 2015, but a decision to get involved could

come as soon as the end of September. Our viewers benefitted by learning when the Supreme Court could take up the gay marriage issue.

God Loves Gays Follow Up (aired 09/17/2014 @10pm, 2:15 minutes) – Advocates working to put up a billboard which reads “God Loves Gays” say they are being told the message is too controversial and two major billboard companies are refusing to do business with them. This story explains why the group wants to put up the message and what they hope to accomplish with the “God Loves Gays” campaign. It also gives one of the companies’ reasons for refusing to display the message on their signs.

Ordain Women (aired 09/18/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) An LDS group seeking ordination to the priesthood announced they were going to change their tactics. Ordain Women members state that rather than trying to attend the all male priesthood meeting at Temple Square, they would instead go to local stake centers to watch the broadcast. In 2012 and 2013 members of the group marched to Temple Square in an attempt to get standby tickets into the conference session. Our viewers benefitted by being kept up to date on the debate over social issues in the state’s most prominent religion.

Traditional Marriage Rally (aired 09/18/2014 @10pm, 1:00 minutes) – Hundreds of people packed the State Capitol Rotunda in support of traditional marriage. Organizers say the rally was a way to thank Utah’s Governor and Utah’s Attorney general for being willing to defend traditional marriage and Utah’s ban on same sex marriage. A small group of same sex marriage supporters gathered outside the capitol giving their reason as to why they should be allowed to get married. This story gives both sides views and explains the latest development in Utah’s case which now at the Supreme Court level.

Judge Shelby at USU (aired 09/23/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – The federal judge who overturned Utah’s ban on same sex marriage is speaking for the first time since making the landmark ruling. Judge Robert Shelby wouldn’t get into specifics about Kitchen vs. Herbert but he did defend his decision to overturn Amendment 3. Shelby said the state’s gay marriage ban deprived same sex couples of their fundamental right to marry. This is the first time our viewers have heard from the man who started the battle over gay marriage and explains to the viewer where the case stands now.

HEALTH/HEALTHCARE:

Pancreas Transplant (aired 07/01/2014 @10pm, 2:45 minutes) – The University of Utah has performed its first ever pancreas only transplant. The procedure was done in an effort to reverse a young woman’s type 1 diabetes and it worked. This story explains how the procedure works and lets our viewers know who might be eligible for the same kind of transplant.

Knee Replacement Surgery (aired -7/03/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 30 seconds) – As the population ages, doctors expect to see more of a demand for knee replacement surgery. Doctors say knee replacement surgery can offer relief for patients who have been living in constant pain. First, doctors will try other methods to help with pain.

However, if the pain is persistent, they will recommend knee replacement surgery. After the surgery, the patient will undergo weeks of physical therapy.

Build Me Up Program (aired 07/03/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – There is a fitness program for older adults designed to help them build strength and confidence. It is called the Build Me Up Program. The program is offered at the LiVe Well Center at Dixie Regional Medical Center in St. George. The classes are small and each participant has a personalized fitness plan that focuses on strength and mobility. The exercises are intended to help make daily activities for older adults easier. These activities include going to the grocery store and housework.

3D Heart Mapping (aired 07/07/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 30 seconds) – Primary Children's Hospital is now using new technology that reduces the amount of radiation exposed to children during heart procedures. The technology uses GPS technology and 3-D imaging to help fix heart problems without major surgery. Studies show that long term exposure to radiation can increase the risk of cancer. So doctors say this technology can reduce that risk.

Doctor Engagement (aired 07/07/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Health care providers want the best outcome for their patients. Intermountain Healthcare is now providing tools to their physicians to help engage their patients. Doctors will now be asking more questions. They will be asking their patients about things like their level of physical activity and nutrition. Experts say this type of personalized care gives patients a voice in the healthcare system.

Hemp Oil Cards (aired 07/07/2014 @10pm, 2:15 minutes) – Parents of kids with severe epilepsy are one step closer to getting cannabis oil for their kids. The state of Utah officially opens its registry tomorrow, allowing parents to get a permit or card to legally possess the oil. Our story tells viewers how many families the state expects to sign up for the cards and explains the state rules surrounding the use of the new hemp oil.

Health Smartphone App (aired 07/09/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Your healthcare is now at your fingertips. Intermountain Healthcare has launched its Health Hub App. The App features tools to help personalize your healthcare. The Health Hub App will let you request appointments, pay your bill, check results of lab tests, and check wait times at the nearest Instacare. And if you hate germs, there is a tool that will let you see what germs (viruses) are active in your area.

Joint Health – (aired 07/17/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – We use our joints every single day. But over time, those joints can simply wear out causing pain and discomfort. Arthritis and weight can both lead to joint problems. There are things you can do now to help add a little longevity to your knees and other joints in the body. First, be sure to stay active. Second, keep your muscles in the body strong.

Tips for a Healthy Pregnancy (aired 07/18/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – It is almost like a checklist that every pregnant woman should carry around. Aside from seeing your doctor regularly, there are many things you need to do to ensure a healthy pregnancy. First, you should add some fruits and vegetables to your diet. In fact, you only need to eat about 300 more calories a day while you are pregnant. So no, you don't need to eat for two. Doctors say you should also be exercising regularly and drinking a lot of water. If this is your first baby, you should look at taking some birthing and breast feeding classes.

Healthcare Subsidies (aired 07/22/2014 @5pm, 1:30 minutes) – Some Utahns could be paying more for health insurance, because of an appellate court ruling. A Washington, D.C. appeals court ruled the government can't subsidize health insurance for states like Utah that don't have a state exchange. 85,000 Utahns have health insurance from the federal government exchange. The average subsidy is 76%, so if it goes away, insurance will be four times more expensive on average. Many Utahns worry they may be left without health insurance. A spokesman for Utah's governor says the court stayed its order during appeal so for now nothing will happen to the subsidies.

Pregnancy and Nutrition (aired 07/25/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Prenatal vitamins contain essential nutrients for women before, during, and after pregnancy. But good nutrition during your pregnancy should not stop there. Experts say women should be eating a balanced diet of protein, calcium, and iron. This includes eating plenty of fruits and vegetables. Women should also drink juice with their prenatal vitamins to help increase the absorption of iron.

Before Your Due Date (aired 08/01/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Experts say communication is key during any pregnancy. You need to discuss your wishes with your family and your physician. You should also start planning for your delivery early in your pregnancy. One way to plan is to take a tour of the hospital where you plan to deliver your baby. Another question you will need to address is who you want in the delivery room. When you do arrive at the hospital to give birth, be sure to give your birth plan to your nurse.

Bone Marrow Transplant (aired 08/07/2014 @4pm runs 1 minute 45 seconds) – A Utah man is alive, thanks to a bone marrow transplant. Will Clark was diagnosed with lymphoma in 2006. He had surgery and aggressive rounds of chemotherapy. His cancer fight would spill over into years and doctors were running out of options. One option was a bone marrow transplant. Will didn't have a 100% match. But doctors at LDS Hospital told Will he could still get what's called a haploidentical transplant. Doctors used bone marrow from someone who is the closet match to help destroy the cancer cells.

Birthing Plans (aired 08/08/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Creating a birth plan can help you have a more positive birth experience. But experts caution, it isn't something you should wait until the last minute to think about. Doctors say women should start formulating a birth plan as soon as they find out they are pregnant. Women

should also sign up for prenatal classes to get some ideas, as well as to help them prepare for the unexpected.

Local Ebola Doctor (aired 08/08/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – One Utah doctor is trying to clear up misconceptions about Ebola and the serum that was used on the two Americans who contracted the disease. The Ogden doctor worked at the same hospital where the aid workers are being treated and says hospitals in the states need to be concerned and ready for the deadly disease to spread to the United States. Our story explains what this expert thinks hospitals should be doing now to prepare and explains why the serum, which seems to work to help cure the disease, is not being sent to Africa to help with the epidemic in that country.

Enhanced Fitness Program (aired 08/21/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – There's a free fitness program across Salt Lake County that aims to keep seniors active and healthy. It is called the enhanced fitness class. During the class, seniors will work on cardio, strength training, balance and agility, and flexibility. Trainers will also modify workouts to accommodate seniors who may need a little assistance.

Breeched Babies (aired 08/22/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – A new study shows that many babies in breech positions are still delivered naturally which can increase the risk for complications. Generally, babies will turn upside down into the birthing position around 31 weeks of gestation. If the baby hasn't turned, doctors will first try to turn the baby. If that doesn't work, the woman and her doctor will need to decide if the baby should be born naturally or if a c-section should be performed. There are risks and benefits for both procedures, so it is important that a woman talks to her doctor.

Smashing Scales (aired 08/25/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A group of high school student gathered in Park City to "smash the danger of eating disorders." The group got out sledgehammers and literally smashed scales with negative messages attached to them. The goal of the event was to put a dent in hazardous thinking and unhealthy habits. Our story shows what is being done to try and fight negative body image issues in young girls and explain how viewers can get help if they know someone struggling with an eating disorder.

Life Jacket Loaners (aired 8/26/2014 @7:30am :40 seconds) - After a man dies in a drowning accident, his family honors him by building life jacket loaner stations for others to use. The viewer is informed of where these stations are and how they can help create more.

Healthcare Commission (aired 8/28/2014 @5pm, 1:30 minutes) – The legislature's health reform task force heard testimony concerning Governor Gary Herbert's plan to broaden Medicaid coverage. One woman who testified said she could not qualify for Medicaid when she was diagnosed with cancer, because she was told she made too much money. In her testimony, the woman says she is now bankrupt from medical bills, and hasn't seen her oncologist since October. Some lawmakers on the task force who

listened to testimony say they sympathized with the woman's story, but still don't want Medicaid expansion.

Suicide Prevention (aired 09/01/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 20 seconds) – Mental illness is something that many people suffer with every single day and sadly, they suffer in silence. Primary care doctors are now getting more tools and resources to help those struggling with mental illness. Family members, experts say, also play a vital role when it comes to mental health. Family members should not be afraid to talk to their loved ones about concerns they have with their behavior.

Governor Herbert Medicaid (aired 09/10/2014 @5:00am 0:30 seconds) Governor Gary Herbert says his office is still negotiating with federal officials on his alternative Medicaid expansion plan. In a teleconference yesterday Governor Herbert said that rather than requiring people to work in exchange for health coverage, the two sides are instead talking about having participants go through job search and training programs. Any agreement with federal officials must also be approved by Utah's legislature. There is no deadline to approve a plan. Our viewers benefitted by being kept up to date on the progress of a potential Medicaid expansion deal.

PCH Virus Presser (aired 09/11/2014 @4:30am 1:30 minutes) Utah Health Officials held a press conference regarding concerns about Enterovirus D-68. As many as 100 kids have been admitted to hospitals throughout the country showing symptoms of the virus. The CDC was testing to see if the kids actually had the virus. Our viewers benefitted by learning the symptoms of Enterovirus and how they could avoid it.

Communicating with your Provider (aired 09/16/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – The internet is a wealth of information, especially about pregnancy and birthing plans. But the information you read online may not always be accurate. If you have questions, doctors say you can certainly do some research online. However, they encourage all pregnant women to also talk to their healthcare providers. Another way to get accurate information is to attend prenatal classes.

Governor's Healthcare Plan (aired 09/17/2014 @5pm, 2:00 minutes) – Governor Gary Herbert returned from Washington, D.C., where he has been trying to make deals on his Medicaid expansion plan. The Governor says he believes his trip made headway, and thinks he may have convinced some Democrats on his vision. Herbert is still unwilling to reveal all the details of his plan, until he knows he has an acceptable agreement with the Obama Administration on the issue. The Governor says a lot of details still need to be worked out before he will lay out his "Healthy Utah Plan." But we do know some details of the plan. It differs from the President's plan by building in recipient responsibility to Medicaid expansion—meaning those who use the assistance will need to pitch in to help as well. If it's adopted, the "Healthy Utah Plan" will be launched as a three-year pilot program, and then evaluated to see if it will be kept around permanently.

Fall Prevention (aired 09/18/2014 @5pm runs 1 minute 20 seconds) – The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimate that one out of three older adults will fall every

year. In many cases, the falls happen inside the home. We spoke to the co-owner of Brightstar Care in Murray. She tells us some of the biggest hazards in the home include stairs, rugs, bathtubs, cords, chairs, and thresholds. One way to help reduce the risk of falls is to have experts come to your home and do a risk assessment.

GOVERNMENT/POLITICAL:

Rainbow Family Costs (aired 07/11/2014, @6:00am, 25 seconds) – The Forest Service spent \$500,000 overseeing the Rainbow Family Gathering. This story sums up the arrests and cost to clean up the gathering by the anti-government group.

Property Tax Mistake (aired 07/14/2014 @10pm, 2:00 minutes) – Cities and counties all across Utah have been cheated out of 100 million dollars in property tax money. For years, Salt Lake County Officials say years of miscalculations cost Salt Lake City alone 17 million dollars in property tax revenue. An auditor's report showed that an error in the way property taxes were calculated and a lack of communication between county assessors and the state tax commission led to the mistake. This story explains how the error happened, what it means for taxpayers and what lawmakers are going to do to fix the issue.

Shurtleff and Swallow (aired 07/16/2014 @5pm, 1:30 minutes) – Former Utah Attorneys General Mark Shurtleff and John Swallow were accused of corruption and arrested, but many questions still remain in the investigation. One of biggest questions is why the Federal Department of Justice dropped its investigation of the men. Corruption cases are often federal cases, but the Department of Justice decided to drop its case. Federal officials would not comment on why they stopped investigating. Mark Shurtleff believes the case was dropped because they listened to his side of the story. He also claims prosecutors on the local level refused to listen to him. The Salt Lake County District Attorney says the federal Department of Justice performed badly. The local FBI continues to investigate Shurtleff and say they want justice in the case.

Sandy Dumps Gun Law (aired 07/27/2014 @6:30am, 25 seconds) – Sandy city has repealed its laws restricting carrying guns in public places. Last night the council unanimously approved the ordinance changes. It is no longer a violation to pack a gun into city recreational facilities. This story lets viewers know about the recent law change and what prompted it.

City Manager Resigns (aired 8/13/2014 @7:30am :25 seconds) - The West Jordan city manager announced his retirement. We explain why he says it was time to step down and what is next for the city.

Shooting Vigil (aired 8/13/2014 @7:00am 2:10 minutes) - A group of citizens held a rally to demand more police transparency and accountability after an officer shot and killed a man in South Salt Lake. The group also demanded changes for police in how they apply deadly force in certain situations.

Justice for Geist (aired 08/13/2014 @7:30am 2:20 minutes) - A group of concerned citizens addressed the city council after a dog was shot while contained in its yard. They discussed new training for police and the use of force, something that could affect viewers in the Salt Lake area.

Democrat Fixer (aired 08/13/2014 @10pm, 2:00 minutes) – Local democratic candidates for the Utah legislature are getting some help from the National Democratic Party. Michael Sargent is with the democratic legislative campaign committee and he is in Utah to help democratic leaders come up with a plan to get more democrats on Utah's Capitol Hill. This story explains how the minority party is trying to gain state seats and highlights the unique campaign efforts of one woman who is running for the Utah Legislature.

State Crime Lab Tour (aired 08/14/2014 @7:30am 2:05 minutes) - State officials offer a tour of the state lab where crime evidence is processed. Viewers are shown how public funds are being used to help process this evidence.

Police Militarization (aired 08/20/2014 @7:00am :45 seconds) - The Salt Lake City police chief discusses police tactics and the idea of police militarization. Viewers are made aware of what the SLCPD is doing to make sure they keep the public safe.

Constitutional Convention (aired 08/21/2014 @5pm, 1:30 minutes) – An Oklahoma Senator is proposing a new Constitutional Convention. He spoke at a Utah Solutions Summit sponsored by Utah Senator Mike Lee and Governor Gary Herbert. Senator Tom Coburn says the convention would be used to restore the Founding Fathers' intent to reign in the federal government's power. Senator Mike Lee didn't agree that the U.S. needed another Constitutional Convention, but he is sponsoring a bill to keep federal bureaucrats from making what he calls unnecessary rules. Both senators agree the federal government isn't working and needs change.

Utah County Commissioner Race (aired 08/21/2014 @10pm, 2:30 minutes) – A write-in candidate is creating some drama in the race for Utah County Commissioner. The man say he is joining the race because of one reason, his opponent's questionable character. The man he is running against has filed bankruptcy several times. He's also been charged with theft but the case was dropped. This story lets the voters know who is running for office, the background of both candidates and explains why the one candidate feels his struggles in the past will make him a better leader in the future.

Beers with Becker (aired 8/27/2014 @5:00am 0:25 seconds) Mayor Ralph Becker sat down to have a drink with the people of Salt Lake City. The mayor hosted an event called "Beers with Becker" at O'Shucks bar and grill. Mayor Becker said the event is a chance to relax and talk with people about things going on in the city. Our viewers benefitted by learning of an event they could attend to speak with the mayor.

UTA Audit (aired 08/27/2014 @7:00am :45 seconds) - An audit was released that shows how the Utah Transit Authority is using public money to fund projects. Viewers

were informed of how the agency uses taxpayer dollars and what can be done more efficiently.

Capitol 13 Charges (aired 08/28/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) Thirteen people arrested after a protest pushing for lawmakers to pass a bill that would outlaw discrimination against gay people have been officially charged. The protesters were arrested in February for blocking entrance to a legislative meeting. All 13 protesters were charged with disrupting a meeting. Our viewers benefitted by learning the latest action taken against protesters seeking social change.

Sister Wives Ruling (aired 08/28/2014 @4:30am 0:35 seconds) A federal judge issued a final ruling striking down parts of Utah's anti-polygamy law. Attorney general Sean Reyes said his office is reviewing the ruling to decide on a possible appeal. Our viewers benefitted by learning of judicial action that resulted in a change in Utah law.

West Jordan Flooding (aired 08/28/2014 @7:30 am :50 seconds) - A group of homeowners says the City of West Jordan does not have adequate storm drainage after heavy rains cause a flood in their neighborhood. The story shows viewers how their tax dollars are being used and what the city is doing to deal with the problem.

Governor on "Sister Wives" (aired 08/29/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) Governor Gary Herbert says Utah should appeal a court ruling that is in favor of the family of the reality show "Sister Wives." The ruling strikes down key parts of a law criminalizing polygamy on the grounds that it violated religious freedom. The Attorney General's office had 30 days to decide whether the state would appeal. Our viewers benefitted by learning the Governors stance on a controversial court ruling.

UTA Salary Follow Up (aired 08/29/2014 @7:00 am 1 minute) - An audit of the Utah Transit Authority was released to the public. The report showed high salaries for the agency's executives and some other activities critics say are questionable. Our story looks into the audit and the effects on taxpayer's money.

Shurtleff Filings (aired 09/11/2014 @5:00am 0:30 seconds) Former Utah attorney general Mark Shurtleff is asking prosecutors to turn over all information state and federal investigators have collected on him. Shurtleff filed the request in order to prepare his defense in his bribery case. Prosecutors say both Shurtleff and his successor John Swallow accepted gifts and money from several businessmen. Both former attorney generals deny any wrong doing. Our viewers benefitting by being kept up to date on a high profile legal case.

Appropriation Meeting (aired 09/16/2014 @ 5pm, 1:30 minutes)—A legislative committee looked into some rumors concerning immigrant children coming to Utah. 60,000 kids have come to the United States without their parents. The federal government is placing some of those children with relatives already in the country, and others in foster care. Legislators were hearing complaints that some of those families were being paid up to \$35,000 to take in an immigrant child. The committee did some

investigating and found that no one had been paid. As of the end of July, only 85 immigrant children had been placed in Utah. 35,000 kids have been placed nationwide. Our story also noted there would be some taxpayer costs for taking in the children, since they would need to be sent to school.

UTSCO Draper Tax (aired 09/17/2014 @4:30am 0:30 seconds) The Utah Supreme Court was set to hear arguments and make a ruling in a lawsuit filed by Draper taxpayers against the city. Some taxpayers had sought to get a tax referendum on the November ballot because they thought they were being overtaxed. Draper leaders shut down the effort, and the group sued to be able to get the referendum on the ballot. Our viewers benefitted by learning that the Utah Supreme Court was going to rule on an issue that could affect people in both Salt Lake and Utah counties.

Budget Surplus (aired 09/17/2014 @6:00am, :25 seconds) – Utah has some extra money in the bank for next year. The state finished the 2014 budget year with a 166-million-dollar surplus. This story lets people know about what lawmakers are planning to do with that extra cash.

1st Congressional Debate (aired 09/23/2014 @10pm, 2:15 minutes) – Utah's first district congressman, Rob Bishop, went head to head in a debate with democratic challenger, Donna McAleer. The two answered question on public lands, gridlock in Washington and immigration. This isn't the first time these two candidates have challenged each other, back in 2012 Bishop beat McAleer by 46%. This story informs our viewers where the candidates stand on different issues and explains how McAleer plans to beat Bishop this time around.

HUD Secretary in Town (aired 09/23/2014 @10pm, 1:45 minutes) – Only two months on the job as Secretary of Housing and Urban Development and Julian Castro is already rumored to be a potential candidate for Vice President in 2016. Castro was in Salt Lake City to deliver the key note address for the closing gala of the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Convention. This story gives our viewers a look at an up and coming political figure who could be the next vice president of the United States.

Utah Polygamy Appeal (aired 09/25/2014 @5:00am 0:30 seconds) Utah Attorney General Sean Reyes filed a notice of intention to appeal a ruling that struck down a key portion of Utah's anti-polygamy law. The judge's ruling was in favor of the Brown family, who star on the TLC reality show 'Sister Wives.' Our viewers benefitted by learning what action the state is taking to keep the law as originally written.

FRANCHISES: **PAY IT FORWARD:**

Salons For Survival (aired 07/2/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – Utah has great facilities that help cancer patients battle their disease, but getting to Salt Lake City from rural Utah can be daunting financially. That's where Alicia Marrelli comes in. She rallies salons around Price, Utah each year and raises thousands to help breast cancer patients. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Spencer's Wishes (aired 07/9/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – It was three simple wishes to Santa Claus from a young boy dying from brain cancer. It became the passion of his parents to bring joy to children suffering with physical and emotional trauma. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Second Chance Wildlife Rehab (aired 07/16/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – Debbie Pappas is one of the only people in the entire state of Utah legally allowed to rescue and rehabilitate injured eagles, hawks and other birds of prey. The Second Chance Wildlife Rehabilitation center in Price is saving our feathered friends every day. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Cancer Wellness House (aired 07/23/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – A diagnosis of cancer means enduring some hard times in a hospital. But the Cancer Wellness House in Salt Lake City expands on traditional treatment for all aspects of life for both the patient and their family. This non-profit house has given hope to some 10,000 people over the years. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Kids Closet (aired 07/30/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – Warm and clean clothes are something every parent wants their kids to wear as they head out to school. But nearly 65% of students attending school in Helper, Utah are below the poverty level and need some help. That is where the Kids Closet comes in to help at Sally Mauro Elementary school. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Clothes for Children in Need (aired 08/6/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – A simple pillowcase can clothe a child. Michelle and Scott Bawden of Sandy fell in love with helping children around the world. They got their family involved in helping Utah humanitarian organization YouthLinc. Michelle makes dresses from pillowcases, and puts together sewing kits, which Scott delivers to villages in Central America, Asia and Africa. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Kruisers for Kids (aired 08/13/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – What is the owner of an incredibly beautiful classic car to do if they want to show off their ride and help children at the same time? Join Kruisers for Kids, of course. For two decades, this non-profit has invited hundreds of classic cars to shows and every penny earned goes to Shriners Children's Hospital adaptive bike program, which means disabled and sick children are able to ride trikes and do what kids do best, have fun. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Utah Diaper Bank (aired 08/20/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – Babies go through a lot of diapers and cost parents a small fortune. That means problems for those unable to afford diapers. Victor Velivis realized there was a need in our community for those parents in need and created the first ever diaper bank in Utah. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

LOSS Suicide Group (aired 08/27/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – It's a club nobody wants to join. But for those who have lost someone they truly love to suicide, it is a safe place to find others who understand what they're going through. When a person takes their own life, they often leave behind people who loved them and struggle with the loss. Loved Ones Suicide Survivors (L.O.S.S.) was created by May Bradley after she lost her daughter, Talese. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Bronco's BYU Foundation (aired 09/3/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – The popular ALS Ice Bucket Challenge brings much needed attention and donations to a very important cause. And it's also bringing help to other great causes like the Holly and Bronco Mendenhall Foundation. The BYU football head coach, his wife, and the entire BYU football team, bring hope to children and families facing significant life challenges. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Refugee Resettlement (aired 09/10/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – They survived nightmares to escape war and brutality. Now refugees from as far away as Africa and the Middle East find themselves in Utah. That's where Catholic Community Services comes in to help. Carol Barman leads volunteers in the Refugee Resettlement Program, teaching everything from English, getting around town, ordering in restaurants, and sometimes what a vacuum cleaner does. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Pawsitive Pawsibilities (aired 09/17/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – Morgan and Tabitha met for the first time last year. It was Tabitha's first day at school, which was made possible thanks to her service dog Sunny. Tabitha lives with Muscular Dystrophy and Sunny keeps her from falling. Now Tabitha and Morgan have started a non-profit called Pawsitive Pawsibilities. They raise money to help cover the cost of service dogs for other teens. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

Fit To Recover (aired 09/24/2014 @10pm, 3:30 minutes) – Addiction shatters lives and is a battle to overcome. Ian Acker found exercise on his road to recovery from drugs and alcohol. He created Fit To Recovery to provide a community of health and sharing for people struggling to overcome addiction. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

PERSON 2 PERSON:

Frank Layden (aired 07/6/2014 @10pm, 5:30 minutes) – Shauna Lake spoke with former Utah Jazz head coach and general manager Frank Layden. He told Shauna about life now that he is retired along with some of the successes and failures he has faced throughout his life. The two discussed growing up, family, coaching, retirement, and the partnership with his wife Barbara. Viewers gained an insight into the life of the former coach.

Tyler Glenn, pt. 1 (aired 07/13/2014 @10pm, 5:00 minutes) – Shauna Lake had a conversation with lead singer of the band Neon Trees, Tyler Glenn. The two discussed his rise to the spotlight and when the band gained their big break. At the end of this part of the interview, Tyler revealed to viewers that he was both Gay and Mormon. Our story highlighted how a band who got its start in Utah has been able to go on and make big waves within the music industry.

Tyler Glenn, pt. 2 (aired 07/20/2014 @10pm, 5:30 minutes) – Shauna Lake spoke with front man for the band Neon Trees. This was part two of the conversation in which Tyler speaks about the challenges he has faced with being both gay and a member of the LDS Church. Tyler says it is something that he has known for many years and that he does not feel that he has to choose between his sexuality and his faith. Through this story, viewers gained an insight into the struggle and lifestyle of someone who has recently battled the decision to come out.

Kirby Heyborne (aired 07/27/2014 @10pm, 5:00 minutes) – Shauna Lake had a conversation with actor and entertainer Kirby Heyborne. Kirby first made a name in Utah after starring in several LDS films. Since then, he's moved to Los Angeles and made a living as an actor, narrator, musician and comedian. This story showed viewers how a working actor balances his work alongside having a family at home.

Alan Hall (aired 08/3/2014 @10pm, 4:45 minutes) – Shauna Lake spoke with the chair of the board of trustees at Weber State University and chairman of Prosperity 2020, Alan Hall. At a young age, Alan learned the importance of education throughout life and began giving back at an early age. Viewers learned how Alan's involvement with business and education is leading the state of Utah into the future.

Gayle Ruzicka (aired 08/10/2014 @10pm, 5:15 minutes) – Shauna Lake sat down with president of the Utah Eagle Forum, Gayle Ruzicka. Gayle tells viewers how her parents were politically involved when she was growing up which led her to become involved in politics as well. Gayle is a big advocate for traditional marriage. Viewers were able to learn why she believes the things she does and how her background led her to push for what she says is right.

Kerry Jackson (aired 08/17/2014 @10pm, 5:00 minutes) – Shauna Lake had a conversation with radio host Kerry Jackson. Kerry grew up on a farm in a small town in Utah. He is a self-described geek. He is also a cancer survivor. This story highlighted the struggles Kerry has faced throughout his life from battling cancer to being bullied as a child and provided hope for viewers who may also face similar struggles.

This report uncovers the questionable alibis, failed polygraphs and a provocative video that involves the three men who last saw Smith alive. In the years since Smith went missing, his family has been seeking answers to what happened to him after a night of heavy drinking and gambling in the ship's casino. His disappearance was ruled a likely accident and the case has gone nowhere, despite reports of arguments on the stateroom balcony, furniture being moved and a bloodstain on the overhang of the lifeboats. Mike Jones, an attorney for the Smith family, is now trying to get the case moving again. He has gained access to Royal Caribbean's internal investigation and has learned about the existence of a videotape in the possession of the FBI, which was recorded just hours after Smith went missing by three of the four men to last see Smith alive: cousins Zach Rozenberg and Greg Rozenberg and their friend Rusty Kofman. The other passenger, Josh Askin, is not on the video. Attorneys for Rusty Kofman and Zach Rozenberg have declined to comment. Greg Rozenberg's attorney says his client just made stupid comments. While initially cooperating, Askin's attorney has now told him to take the Fifth Amendment in all questioning. All four men say they had nothing to do with Smith's death but the men are still on the FBI's radar in this cold case. Mike Jones believes that Josh Askin knows what happened. He continues to prod the FBI to re-open the case. In months prior he had made local police aware of explicit death threats he was receiving regarding his involvement in Meyer's ministry. Barlow entered the house that morning through an unlocked basement window and upon entry he found spray-painted messages on the walls, with the phrases "you have paid" and "punished", and when he went upstairs he discovered the bodies of Coleman's family strangled to death in each of their beds. An investigation began and soon after police discovered Coleman was having a serious affair with cocktail waitress Tara Lintz, a high school friend of Sheri's. Sheri's friends came to her defense telling police Sheri said her husband was having an affair and if anything happened to her, Chris did it. Moreover, the crime scene lab found the handwriting on the wall matched

up to Coleman's script. Two weeks after the murders police had enough evidence to charge Coleman with first-degree murder of his family. The trial for Coleman began two years later and the prosecution's computer experts discovered the e-mail threats came from Coleman's laptop, and one can of the spray paint used on the walls of his house was purchased at a local hardware store with a computerized signature linked to Coleman. The jury needed more evidence though, and it came from one of the jurors who noticed the date on a picture of Coleman and Lintz kissing which proved Coleman lied to them about when the affair began. After a guilty verdict, the judge sentenced Coleman to life in prison. 48 HOURS MYSTERY spoke to Coleman by phone and he denied planning to divorce Sheri to marry his mistress and said he did not know who murdered his family. When charges were dropped and he was released from jail, Kentucky State Police spoke to the Army and they came to the same conclusion: a case for murder, this time to be tried by the Army's Judge Advocate Generals Corps (JAG) because Burke on active duty at Fort Campbell when the crimes were committed. He would face a court martial trial which is very different from a civilian court trial -- there is always a verdict and never a hung jury. The trial commenced and the JAG prosecution team was able to present physical evidence -- a tiny piece of glass taken off of Burke's coat, which was similar to the shattered glass door at the crime scene. The panel decided that Sgt. Burke was guilty and that he would serve a life sentence without parole. He would also be dishonorably discharged and stripped of his rank. Noemi Ponce Sigler, the original investigator's daughter, says her father was told to step away from the case because a deal had been made between the Church and the police regarding Feit. In 2002, the McAllen Police Department asked the Texas Rangers Cold Case unit to re-examine the murder. The investigation took a dramatic turn when a former monk, Dale Tacheny, told police that Feit admitted to killing a young woman while Tacheny was a counselor at a monastery. Joseph O'Brien, an assistant pastor at the church in 1960 also told investigators that Feit told him that he did it. Despite these new findings, Hildago County District Attorney Rene Guerra doesn't believe the case is strong enough to take to court, though he would have prosecuted Feit in 1962 on the charges. Members of the Garza family have pinned their hopes on Ricardo Rodriguez, a candidate for Hildago County District Attorney, who has said he would look into the case. After a night of passion, Tang was dead. On the morning of September 11, 2009, Randone summoned police because Tang wasn’t breathing. He maintained she overdosed on the drug GHB (Gamma hydroxybutyric), which they both took before going to bed. However, police didn’t buy the story. Police believed he beat Tang to death because they counted some 320 bruises, lacerations and abrasions on her body. The medical examiner who did the autopsy on Tang believes the bruising on her face and bite mark on her tongue were a result of Tang’s struggle to breathe. Randone was charged with her murder and after prosecutors saw her body, they added another charge: torture. On November 14, 2011, two years after Tang’s death, the trial began in a Pasadena courtroom. Prosecutors tried to prove Randone caused Tang’s death, but the defense painted Tang as a drug addict and said she died of an overdose. The defense called former San Diego Deputy

Medical Examiner Dr. Harry Bonnell to the stand. Dr. Bonnell said homicide is impossible in this case because the PEA (pulseless electrical activity) found in Felicia's body proves it. He went on to tell the jury there is no PEA in smothering victims and the causes of PEA are drugs or blood volume loss. Prosecution was denied the opportunity to rebut Dr. Bonnell's testimony. The jury came up with the verdict of not guilty of torture and not guilty of murder. Jurors, who did not want their names to appear on the episode, claimed Dr. Bonnell's testimony was crucial in declaring Randone not guilty. Four days later Mackenzie was found dead along the banks of the Columbia River. She had been strangled, stabbed and beaten. Investigators looked at a list of potential suspects, including her boyfriend, who failed part of a lie-detector test, though he had a solid alibi. They talked to her parents, who had gone through a bitter divorce. And police talked to her mother's boyfriend, with whom she had tangled with in the past. Liz Reid, a police informant, came forward claiming to have seen the actual murder on videotape -- shot by the killers. However as the task force began to investigate this, a tip came in about Chris Wilson, a classmate of Mackenzie's from the Academy of Hair Design. After police linked DNA at the crime scene to Wilson, he was charged with her murder. Wilson claimed he was innocent and his mother hired attorney John Henry Browne. Police dismissed Liz Reid's story after she changed it several times and they did not find a video. When the task force searched the apartment that Wilson lived in during the time of the murder, they found a stain which tested positive for Mackenzie's DNA. Prior to the trial, D.A. Gary Reisen made Wilson an offer -- plead guilty to manslaughter and serve only six-and-half years in prison -- but Wilson turned it down and the trial began. Fearing an unfair trial after the jury questionnaires came back believing Wilson was guilty, Chris Wilson accepted a new plea deal -- fourteen years in prison in exchange for agreeing to these words: "...I also did recklessly cause the death of Mackenzie Cowell by strangulation and by stabbing her with a knife". In 2011, it was determined to be that of Amy Hurst. Investigation led to her husband, Bill Hurst, who was in Kentucky. Police were able to get Hurst into custody, and he was indicted on first degree murder charges -- he was found guilty. Detective Schoneman says she will keep trying to find Wendy Huggy. regarding his dark, violent side, and eight months later he was arrested for the murder of his wife. In 2012, he was convicted at trial. He was scheduled to leave Singapore in a matter of days when he was found dead. Journalist and 48 HOURS consultant Ray Bonner, who broke the story in London's Financial Times, says police made mistakes in the investigation, and that he is quite surprised, because Singapore is a sophisticated place. With pressure mounting, Singapore expanded a coroner's inquest into Shane Todd's death. In all, seventy witnesses testified over the course of ten days of testimony. The state's coroner ruled that the cause of death was suicide by hanging. He also found nothing legally wrong with the IME - Huawei relationship, yet determined that the meeting Shane's boss had with IME colleagues was “improper, but not witness tampering.” Shane's family feel betrayed, and plan on taking their quest for truth to Washington, pressing for a congressional investigation and a meeting with President Obama. Adam Kaufman called 911 and unsuccessfully tried to revive her. Lina's death gripped Aventura, Florida because she was 33-years-old when she died in 2007, and the circumstances around her death were strange. For eighteen months, Adam says he badgered the Dade County, Florida medical examiner's office seeking a conclusive explanation for his wife's death. They thought she may have had an allergic reaction to a spray tan, but in April 2009, Adam was charged with killing his wife by "mechanical asphyxiation". The trial began in May 2012 and the prosecution led the jury to believe the couple had an unhappy marriage, and fought the morning of Lina's death. Adam's defense no longer blamed Lina's death on her spray tan because there wasn't enough evidence to support it, and instead they attacked what they believed to be a botched investigation by the police. There was bruising and abrasions found on Lina's arms and legs and the defense said this was from Lina being moved from room to room by firefighters, and not a struggle with Adam. Moreover the defense said Lina died of natural causes and undiagnosed heart failure, more specifically acute and chronic myocarditis. Adam himself, and Lina's mother, Frida Aizman, both testified about Lina's prior fainting spells. Frida Aizman shared her support and love for Adam while on the stand. After eight hours, the jury reached a verdict of not guilty. Four years later, Mueller was arrested for first degree murder. His first trial ended in a mistrial. (5) Judge Thokozile Masipa said she made her decision based on Pistorius’ state of mind and believes it was not his intention to

commit murder. (6) professional athletes sometimes develop an air of invincibility that includes the assumption that whatever happens, someone is going to take care of it. That arrogance can convince an athlete that he doesn't have to play by the rules. This issue, and that of domestic violence, is dominating the headlines in the United States with the release of the videotape of Baltimore Ravens player Ray Rice attacking his then-fiancé, now wife, in an elevator. This incident, like the shooting of Reeva Steenkamp, has caught the world's attention, and once again linked violence with athletes in the public's mind. (7) The verdict is in, the trial is over, but the story is far from over. Pistorius is out on bail awaiting his sentencing. She had had a tumultuous relationship with Nathaniel Fujita: they dated for three years, with continual breakups and reconciliations. At the end of their senior year of high school, Lauren had broken the relationship off for good and was looking forward to college and meeting new people. Fujita, too, was to go to college, but he struggled to come to terms with the breakup. His mother, worried about him, took him to a psychiatrist. Their relationship was discussed by their friends on social media. Lauren secretly visited Nathaniel one last time to see how he was doing -- the meeting proved fatal. Two families were forever changed. Through interviews with friends, police investigators, Nathaniel's uncle and Lauren's parents, their relationship is examined. Also discussed are several high school programs aimed at helping teens recognize the signs of a healthy or unhealthy dating relationship. 48 HOURS: “A Raging Son” - a report about the investigation into the 2012 death of Weight Watchers executive Danielle Thomas, and the murder case against her boyfriend, Wall Street attorney Jason Bohn, who claimed being neglected by his mother as a child should keep him from spending his life in jail. Thomas was found dead in the bathtub of the Astoria, Queens apartment she shared with Jason Bohn. Thomas and Bohn had a whirlwind romance and she moved to New York to be with him. Everything seemed to be falling in place for the financial analyst, and while there was talk of marriage, the relationship had become physically and emotionally abusive. Police had been called. Bohn had been arrested for assault. Now, Bohn was arrested and charged with murder. Bohn’s defense is that an explosive moment of anger that resulted in Thomas’ death was directly connected to his bad childhood. Bohn’s attorney asserts he was abandoned by his mother Maureen O’Connell, a wealthy publishing executive, and he experienced profound neglect and abuse that caused a mental illness called Intermittent Explosive Disorder. Prosecutors dismissed his claims and they assert that audio recorded in an accidental phone call made while Thomas was still alive suggest Bohn knew exactly what he was doing. At trial, the Ivy League grad and Wall Street lawyer is found guilty of murder. 48 HOURS: “Paradise Lost” - an investigation into the 2010 shooting death of Wall Street millionaire John Bender, who was killed in his exotic home in Costa Rica. His wife, Ann, is charged with the crime, but she claims innocence. After making a \$100 million fortune on Wall Street, Bender and his wife bought land in Costa Rica where they built a nature preserve, along with an elaborate, four-story hilltop home with no walls or windows as the centerpiece. The couple seemed to have everything; but both suffered from severe depression, became isolated, and were not entirely welcomed by the locals. They lived in fear after an abduction attempt and a break-in, and were forced to arm themselves and hire a security team. On January 8, 2010, John Bender died from a bullet wound to the back of the head. Was it murder, suicide or accident? Prosecutors say it was murder. Ann Bender says her husband was trying to kill himself

and had been suicidal for some time. Other issues in the investigation include: allegations that the trustee of the Bender's \$100 Million fortune siphoned money from the trust, and the Bender gem collection, which to the Costa Rican authorities, looked like it could have could be a smuggling operation. Nineteen months after the shooting, Ann Bender was charged with murder. At trial, Ann was found not guilty of murder; but in Costa Rica, there is no double jeopardy rule and Ann was brought up on the same charges again and this time was found guilty. 48 HOURS brought in the world-famous independent forensic team of Richard and Selma Eikelenboom, who, after examining all the evidence, say there were problems with the conclusion drawn by the prosecution. Today, Ann Bender is in prison continuing to fight for her innocence. **On screen text graphic:** The Bender gems, worth an estimated \$20 million, were confiscated by the Costa Rican authorities.
