And how her advocacy began with protesting encroachment into the neighborhoods and has moved to include retaining that advocacy voice as chair of the Galen Center Advisory Committee, the Strategic Planning Advisory Committee and the University Village Project Advisory Committee. She spoke about how the Jenesse Center has been Offering 35 years of life-saving services, Jenesse Center Inc. is a nationally recognized non-profit domestic violence prevention and intervention organization. Jenesse works locally, nationally and globally to shine a light on violence against women, girls, men and boys and advocates the basic human right for all people to have peace in their homes and relationships. Jenesse's culturally sensitive programs and services not only transition families from crisis to self-sufficiency, but transforms the lives of its clients and the community at large by offering education, referrals and resources that go beyond shelter. Housing women and children from 30 days up to two years through our emergency and transitional shelters, Jenesse also provides a variety of support services, including mental health counseling, independent life skills classes, computer training, job referrals, after school programs for children, field trips, tutoring and comprehensive, direct legal services. Jenesse takes a proactive stance in educating young people to learn what healthy relationships look like and works to break the generational cycle of violence.</p>

5am	:30	Andrew Skinner founder of the Triumph Foundation came into Spotlight on the Community to speak about his non-profit charity that hosts The Wheelchair Sports Festival. This free event to introduce wheelchair sports to people that are newly injured, veterans, children, and others with disabilities; as well as provide learning opportunities to the general public and showcase people living with physical impairment in a way that members of the community do not often see. The Wheelchair Sports Festival brings everyone together of all abilities - able body and disabled alike - to take part in a weekend of games and activities. He also spoke about how his organization Triumph-Foundation helps people triumph over Spinal Cord Injury/Disorders and the Triumph Foundation provides resources, hope and security to people living with paralysis – not just initially when the injury/disease occurs, but as a lifelong support network. Additionally, we hold events that are a captivating force within the entire disabled community. We are the go-to organization for people living with impairment in Southern California.
5am	:30	Pastor Erwin Guevarais is the pastor and head of New Dawn Christian Village, which is a church that's extremely active in the community. The church itself is based out of Frank D. Lanterman School for special needs children and works with the school to provide services for the kids like an annual toy giveaway. He came in to speak about how the NDCV also does a lot for the homeless like collecting clothes to donate and helping to feed the homeless. They also help raise money for programs that sends people to Haiti to help clothe, feed, and house children in Haiti as well as helping to sponsor similar projects for Africa. He also spoke about how New Dawn is a church that is rich in love and dedicated to providing services for their community. They call their church a village because they believe in the power of unity, relationship and service. And they currently meet on Sundays at 10:30 a.m. in the Frank D. Lanterman auditorium near USC.

5/8/2016	1	Dignity Health Northridge Hospital	5am	:30	<p>Mary Jane Jones, Chief Nursing Executive at Dignity Health Northridge Hospital came into Spotlight on the Community to speak about Nurses Week is a weeklong celebrated event starting May 6 to May 12 throughout various hospitals around the country to honor the profession of nurses from its early years to recent years here in the US. In 1954 National Nurses Week was first observed in recognition of Florence Nightingale’s mission to the Crimea War, a hundred years earlier. It wasn’t until May, 1982 that May 6 was established as National Recognition Day for Nurses, and in 1991, it expanded to a weeklong celebration. Ms. Jones also oversee’s 600 nurses so was very informed on the entire history of nursing and how it all goes back to the dignity of patient care, all patients care motto, "Dignity with Kindness." She spoke about how over 100 years ago settlers and migrants moved to this country at a time when work conditions and health conditions were rough, many immigrants were given no place or care but even back then, the nurses cared for all no matter if they were rich or poor, young or old, color of skin, race or creed. Doctors cured the patients, nurses saved them and made them whole again. She also spoke about the long term benefits of nursing and that how there will always be a need for nurses so it's a great career to go into</p>
