	Noticias 23	2-Jul	5pm	2:32	Eden Soto reports on Judge Clay Jenkins' visit to detention sites in McAllen. Accompanied by Senator Royce West and Dr. Frederick Haynes, Judge Jenkins evaluated the conditions to prepare Dallas as a host city for undocumented children held at the overcrowded border detention sites. Approximately 2,000 children are expected to be housed in Dallas.

However, without proper legal representation these children are not able to apply for it.

Organizations do not credit the government's campaign to warn of the dangers of the trip to cross the border. In a surprising setback, the leadership on Thursday was forced to abandon a vote on the slimmed-down \$659 million measure, then huddled with GOP members -- some who had rushed back from airports -- to figure out a way to secure passage of a bill that would make it easier to deport the tens of thousands of unaccompanied children from Central America flooding into the United States. Republicans planned to meet again Friday in hopes that revised versions of the border bill and a companion measure designed to rein in President Barack Obama's ability to take executive actions on deportations could sway tea partyers and other conservatives.

Federal agencies have been overwhelmed by tens of thousands of immigrant families and unaccompanied minors from Central America crossing illegally into the United States. Many are being processed and released within days, with a requirement to enter immigration court proceedings at a later date. Texas' Rio Grande Valley has become the epicenter of the latest immigrant crisis, as more Central Americans have crossed illegally from Mexico into that sector than any other stretch of America's 1,933 mile border with Mexico. The Department of Homeland Security also announced this month that the number of families found crossing the border decreased to 3,295 in August. The number had reached its peak in June with 16,329 families.

Having faced hardships in their countries of origin, those children will require sociological help either in the schools at large or in classroom within detention centers. Most of the undocumented children are concentrated in the states of California, Texas, Lousiana, Georgia, Florida, North Carolina, Virginia, and New York.

This demographic shift has been driven by rising numbers of Hispanic pupils. Figures are gathered by the US Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics. It records the number of pupils in the state school system across the United States - and it publishes forecasts of enrolments in the years ahead. There have also been questions raised about the use in education of the term ethnic "minority", when there is no longer a majority ethnic group within the school population.

Univision Network News	19-Aug	5:30pm	1:57	More than 300,000 California children between the ages 4 and 11 need mental health care, but only one in four is treated, according to a new policy brief from the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research; this, despite the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommending early-childhood intervention as a critical step in reducing the severity of mental health problems in adulthood. While about 8.5 percent of all California children in the 4-to-11 age group are identified as having mental health care issues -- including conduct problems, emotional symptoms, hyperactivity and problems with peers -- parents reported that 70.8 percent of these children went without emotional or psychological counseling over the previous year, according to the study, which used California Health Interview Survey (CHIS) data from 2007-09. The study looked at a number of factors that contribute to mental health needs among children and obstacles that may contribute to a lack of treatment. Among the findings: Poor health, other factors increase likelihood of mental health needs.
Despierta America	9-Jul	6am	:34	A new study suggests that if you follow this pattern -- drink coffee first, then hit the gym -- you are more likely to lose more weight. The study was published in the international journal of sport nutrition and exercise metabolism. Researchers found that athletes who took in caffeine before their workout burned fifteen-percent more calories for three hours after they completed their exercise than those who did not. So how much caffeine do you need? They found that this effect kicked in for a 150 pound woman after roughly 300 milligrams of caffeine -- that's the amount in a 12 oz. Cup of coffee. But before you brew a whole pot -- there is the risk of overdoing it. Dietitians say the maximum amount of caffeine that you should have for enhanced performance and with minimal side effects was just the equivalent of about 16 oz. Of coffee.

Despierta America	9-Sep	6am	4:00	A respiratory illness that has already sickened more than a thousand children in 10 states is likely to become a nationwide problem, doctors say. The disease hasn't been officially identified but officials suspect a rare respiratory "Viruses don't tend to respect borders," ABC News Chief Health and Medical Editor Dr. Richard Besser said. "It is only 10 states now, but it's going to be across the country. So if your state doesn't have it now, watch for it, it's coming." Doctors say they are not even sure yet how this particular virus spreads, though the back-to-school season is a normal time for illnesses to spread among children. "This is a very common time for outbreaks. Kids come back to school, they like to share things, they bring them home to their little brothers and sisters, and enteroviruses tend to occur in the summer," Besser said. "But this one, this particular Enterovirus 68, is very rare and they have no idea why it showed up this year." At Children's Hospital Colorado in Denver, officials say that between Aug. 18 and Sept. 4, doctors saw more than 900 pediatric patients with symptoms of the respiratory virus in the emergency room. Of those who came in, 86 were admitted into the hospital and a handful ended up in the intensive care unit. "It can start just like a cold -- runny nose, sneezing, and coughs.

Noticias 23 Edicion Nocturna	28-Jul	10pm	1:59	A Fort Worth doctor on a mission trip to Liberia has contracted Ebola. Kent Brantly is receiving intensive treatment in an Africa hospital. Ebola is an aggressive infectious virus that kills 50% to 59% of people infected. Symptoms appear 21 days after contracting the illness.
Noticias 23	1-Aug	5pm	2:34	The international community is working together to address the Ebola outbreak in Africa and stop it from becoming an epidemic. At the moment, there is not a cure for Ebola. The only form of contracting the illness is by being in contact with an infected individual. Two American with the illness will be transferred to the U.S. to receive treatment. This will be the first time the virus enters the U.S.

Ebola has taken the lives of more than 3,000 individuals, an area which the confirmed case had traveled. The individual boarded a commercial plane and did not show any symptoms until days after arrival to the U.S. The Ebola virus is not contagious by air. An individual must have contact with bodily fluids of an infected individual, which includes blood, saliva or sweat. Symptoms of Ebola include headaches, stomach pains, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, hemorrhages, and muscular pain.
Despierta America	31-Jul	6AM	3:00	The U-S Peace Corps announcing its pulling hundreds of volunteers from Liberia, Sierra Leone, and Guinea. The State Department says there are no plans, *at this point*, to issue travel restrictions to any of those countries. Ebola is different from other viruses like the flu - it spreads only through close contact with bodily fluid. At airports in Liberia, they are using handheld thermometers to check passengers leaving the country. Twenty US airports have quarantine stations to isolate anyone showing symptoms of the virus.
Univision Network News	13-Aug	10:30pm	1:54	There is an experimental vaccine developed in Canada, but, it has only been tested in non humans. According to a <a href="#">stanford university site</a> , a fifth of the world's population was infected in that epidemic, and an estimated 20 to 40 million people died of the flu. According to that site, "more people died of influenza in a single year than in four years of the Black Death Bubonic Plague from 1347 to 1351." The infection rate was even higher in the U.S., where 28% of the population came down with the disease and 675,000 died - at a time when the U.S. population was less than a third of what it is today. Believe it or not, the Stanford website reports that "the effect of the influenza epidemic was so severe that the average life span in the U.S. was depressed by 10 years."
Univision Network News	30-Sep	5:30pm	1:41	Federal health officials on Tuesday confirmed the first case of Ebola diagnosed in the U.S., a patient who recently traveled from Liberia to Dallas and a sign of the far-reaching impact of the out-of-control epidemic in West Africa. The unidentified patient was critically ill and has been in isolation at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital since Sunday, officials said. Health authorities have begun tracking down family and friends who may have had close contact with the patient and could be at risk for becoming ill. But officials said there are no other suspected cases in Texas. At the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Dr. Tom Frieden said the patient left Liberia on Sept. 19, arrived the next day to visit family and started feeling ill four or five days later. He said it was not clear how the person became infected.
