Obama and aides said they are delaying executive orders on immigration until after the Nov. 4 congressional elections because immigration has become such a volatile political issue.

Although the immigration legislation that stalled in the House is all but dead for the year, Obama said he still had hope for its passage. House Republicans will see the political peril ahead, he predicted. Obama made the remarks at an event that sought to reach out to so-called millennial, the generation of Americans born roughly between 1980 and 2000. The stop was part of Obama's campaign season effort to promote his economic agenda to the Democratic base, particularly young people, women, African Americans and Latinos.

Obama said that before the end of the year, he is going to take whatever lawful actions at the White House, although he declined to offer specifics on what an executive order might look like. The president said he plans to reach out to Republican leaders in both chambers to gauge their agenda, but added that he is done waiting for lawmakers on Capitol Hill to take action. Republicans are almost certain to cry foul when Obama takes immigration action. A group of conservative Republican senators, including Ted Cruz (R-Texas) and Jeff Sessions (R-Ala.), sent a letter on Wednesday to Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) threatening to use procedural means to block any executive action by the president. Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.), who won re-election Tuesday and will likely be the next Senate majority leader, said during a press conference ahead of Obama's speech that Republicans could take up immigration reform, but the chances of that happening would be hurt if the president takes executive action.

But preparations are already being made for the first group of people who will stay at the center. They are expected to arrive in the next few weeks.

Safety experts said about 12 million vehicles worldwide have been recalled because of the problem. The airbags are made by Takata and are in place in some Toyota, Honda, Mazda, BMW, Nissan and General Motors models. NHTSA said it was particularly urgent for vehicles owners in Florida, Puerto Rico, Guam, Saipan, American Samoa, Virgin Islands and Hawaii to take immediate action.

The figures are generally up to date through Dec. 13. About half of those enrolling are first-timers and half are returning customers, suggesting there are about 2 million Americans new to the program. The figures look good for the administration meeting its goal of 9.1 million customers signed up and paying premiums in 2015, independent experts said. But they predicted the program won't meet another target: the 13 million enrollments in 2015 forecast by the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office.

The full court was deadlocked, five to five, on a request for a new hearing.
