1. Dan Margolies reported on the continuing investigation into possible prosecutorial misconduct connected to prisoners at the Leavenworth Detention Center. Scores of inmates are now seeking to have their convictions overturned in light of revelations that thousands of attorney-client communications may have been recorded and handed over to federal prosecutors.

2. Stephen Koranda, Jim McLean and Madeline Fox of the Kansas News Service held a roundtable discussion on campaign action in Kansas for the first week of October. President Donald Trump is expected to visit Topeka to campaign for Kris Kobach and Steve Watkins, the Republican candidates for governor and the 2nd District congressional seat, respectively.

It's likely that whoever's elected will ultimately decide if KanCare is expanded, or steered in another direction entirely.

9. Secretary of State Kris Kobach has proposed making a change to KanCare, the state's Medicaid program. He wants to combine the current program with a payment system known as "direct primary care," which is sometimes referred to as 'concierge medicine.' Nomin Ujjiyediin examined Kobach's claims that such a change would generate big savings to the program, but found that such expectations are unrealistic.

10. Madeline Fox reported on the surprising strength of Democratic candidates in the Kansas congressional races, particularly in the 3rd District. She examined the Democratic Party's strategy of trying to turn out voters who usually don't bother to show up at the polls. If there is to be a "Blue Wave" of Democratic winners on Election Day, those tactics – rather than persuading the groups that traditionally turn out to vote – may end up being what carries the day.

1. Celia Llopis-Jepsen reported on the Kansas secretary of state's race. Kris Kobach's tenure marked a shift in the focus of the office from basic oversight of elections to a platform for discussing topics ranging from immigration to gun ownership. However, the two candidates running for the office...Scott Schwab and Brian McClendon...are offering two different visions for the future of the position.

2. Andrea Tudhope reported on concerns in Johnson County over election issues. The vote tally was delayed after the August 2018 primary, and county election officials blamed new voting machine software. But there are now further worries about the county's voting machines themselves, in addition to other issues.

Sharice Davids was elected to Congress in the Kansas 3rd District, and Steve Watkins won the seat for the Kansas 2nd.

For many years, Republican control of both the Legislature and the governor's office has meant that there has been no support for Medicaid expansion. But Kelly's election could change that.

7. Sports reporter Greg Echlin prepared a profile of newly-named University of Kansas head football coach Les Miles. Miles won a national championship as the head coach at Louisiana State University. Hopes are high at KU, where the football program has always taken second billing to the school's high-caliber men's basketball program. But transforming KU's football team could be a very tall order.

Sebelius says that coalition building will be key to Kelly's success in the position.

10. Commentator Tom Averill discussed the so-called "migrant caravan" headed towards the southern border of the United States. Most of the people in the group are believed to be seeking political asylum in the U.S. However, the issue of asylum for immigrants has become politically fraught. President Donald Trump has ordered thousands of soldiers to the border to secure it. Averill says the president's reasoning for his actions don't ring true.

1. Jim McLean reported on new leaders in the Kansas Legislature. The election in November changed the political makeup of the Kansas House and Senate, and power shifted between ideological wings of the Republican and Democratic parties.
