CW Iowa Live Night at the Boone Speedway

Description: Marion County is hoping to make a comeback, with poultry that are bigger and better than ever. Last year, at its peak, the avian bird flu outbreak affected 18 of Iowa's 99 counties -- more than 70 poultry farms. More than 31 million birds were all euthanized to stop the outbreak from spreading. That cost Iowa's economy 1.2 billion dollars and 85 hundred jobs, and today the Marion County fair hosted its first poultry show since the avian flu out break. The energy was high, and everyone we spoke to said they didn't have any losses of chickens but they were bummed because they couldn't have a show last year.

Justis Bacon - 4-H:

"What goes through my mind, I gotta remember next year to try to get that accomplished like make those changes and I like knowing what I need to change with my chickens."

So far this year, there have been no reports of avian flu in Iowa this year, but it did take its economic impact.

Description: It may be hot out, but for those tending to their garden, weeds don't take a rest during the warm temperatures - but don't worry, local five's chief green thumb, Brad Edwards has some quick and easy tips for getting rid of pesky weeds in your patch.

Brad Edwards:

"There is no doubt that gardening can be rewarding and even fun, but I think most gardeners would agree that the least favorite aspect about gardening is weeding it! Yes, it can be a dirty job, and really you DON'T have to do it... but... you should!

The weed I deal with the most is purslane, which is actually edible! Hey, not bad! But weeds come in all shapes and sizes. Heck, all unwanted plants are considered weed in your garden which means even those volunteer plants like this little tomato plant is, unfortunately, a weed. Sorry little plant. L

I don't think there is an easy way to get rid of weeds. Chemicals like Preen that prevent weed seeds from germinating will also inhibit your vegetables from growing, so not a good plan of action for my garden. So, you can either pull them- yes, all one million of them! Or use a hoe or tiller to cut them. The choice is a no brainer to me!

The key to weeding is to stay on top of it. I am usually really diligent in May and June, but it gets harder by July and August when it gets hotter. They seem to get stronger as I get weaker- DAMN YOU WEEDS!

Okay then... I have three things to help me weed the garden- a nice sharp hoe, a pair of nitrile dipped gloves and this funny straw hat! The girl's mother, Cynthia Mitteness is also accused of being involved and is behind bars in Minnesota. Human sex-trafficking is the fastest-growing business of organized crime in the world. And it's happening right here in Iowa. On any given day 150 children are being sex-trafficked in Iowa. Law enforcement and social workers say it's such a disguised crime that it's hard catch on to it. According to a study by the junior league of Des Moines human trafficking is the third-largest criminal enterprise globally a spokesperson with Polk County crisis and advocacy services says in most cases the victims are female and don't look any different from the average person. She says one of the biggest problems is many times these girls are considered prostitutes when they're actually slaves.

Lisa Heldenbrand - Crisis and Advocacy:

"It's extremely scary for them and they don't think they have anywhere to go. And that the people that they're with are their only support system. "

Crisis and advocacy services and Dorothy's House are just two resources you can turn to if you need help. You can also walk into any hospital and tell them you are victim of sex abuse if you're too scared to say you have been involved in human trafficking.

"Joseph white I hope you rot in hell... This will devastate my family forever, we'll never leave this nightmare and I don't ever want to see you out of prison."

"Half of me died 24 years ago; I don't get a second chance with Tim."

White was resentenced to two consecutive life sentences but this time with the possibility of parole. White can apply for parole once a year, but the decision is up to the Iowa parole board whether he's eligible or not.

The public information officer for Polk County says this has been a tough case for the department to handle. 50-year-old Michael Lee Williams of Runnells was arrested Friday on several charges including human trafficking and sexual exploitation of a minor. On

Thursday, Polk County detectives received information from a Carver County Minnesota detective that a sex abuse case occurred in Polk County last month. Investigators say the father of a 9-year female Minnesota resident found alarming social media messages between his wife and Williams which led to the investigation. Cynthia Mitteness was arrested for other criminal acts but deputies say she did contribute to human trafficking. Warrants for her arrest have been filed in Polk County as well as a transfer request. Williams is a convicted sex offender on the Iowa sex offender registry. He is currently being held in the Polk County jail.

"If this change goes through more than 60 seniors will be impacted. We spoke to one woman who did not want to go on camera who currently uses the discount. She says although the difference is about \$2.50 it will take a toll on her finances because she doesn't have any other income coming in except her retirement. We spoke to much of

the community around here and many of them agree that seniors need discounts like this.

"I think it's unfair to take it away from them because most of the seniors are on a fixed income, getting social security, maybe a fixed pension, probably not even working. So that's just extra expense that they didn't have to pay before."

The city administrator says the only reason a proposal to make this change has come up is because a state auditor has suggested the discount is illegal and is discriminatory to other people in the community. Description: The golf world is suffering after a major loss on Sunday. Arnold Palmer died at the age of 87. More than a decade ago, he designed and played a course in Polk City. CW Iowa's Jacob Peklo tells us how Palmer's work will continue to impact central Iowa for many years to come.

"One of the first things we did was we lowered our tournament club to half staff. He means a lot to us, and we're going to miss him."

"It's a bit of a blow to golf, but his impact cannot be lessened simply by his passing."

Everywhere you turn at TCI, you can see the impact of Arnold Palmer.

"He liked to have the course natural, leave it the way Iowa is. He didn't want to have a lot of fancy things."

Obviously, Palmer left his mark on the course in a lot of different ways, one of them is this tree on the 13th hole. They tried to start a chain saw to take it down, but it wouldn't get started. So, Palmer said, 'why not just leave it as a marker for the fairway.'

This is the only golf course in Iowa bearing his signature. Polk City's former police chief remembers working security when Palmer came to town for the grand opening.

"There were a lot of people there, and I asked him, 'Mr. Palmer do you want to sign autographs?' He said, 'sure, I'll sign autographs,' and he stood for several minutes and signed for everybody and talked to everybody and was very personable."

Palmer's caddie, Brad Wuhs, remembers being awestruck by the king.

"He hops out and I was really nervous. And I was so nervous, I forgot to change my shoes. So, I was out there, caddying for him, wearing penny loafers."

Tony Hoyles worked at another club that was designed by Palmer, and he vividly remembers the conversation he had with the legend before moving to Iowa.

"He goes, 'the final three holes, they're really tough.' And I'm like, 'but Mr. Palmer, I didn't even tell you where I'm going.' He said, 'you're going to TCI. It's the only course I designed in Iowa.'"

And Hoyles says he knew that Palmer wanted to really connect with everyone he met, knowing he was the same whether the cameras were on, or off.

"The world didn't just lose a golf icon; it lost one of the best people that you'll ever meet."

In Polk City, Jacob Peklo, CW Iowa news at nine.

Another tie Palmer had to Iowa, he was the stroke play medalist at the NCAA Championships back in 1949, which were held at Veenker Golf Course up in Ames.

Most of us can say we know someone with allergies. If you're like me you should be living in a bubble. Others are allergic to food or animals or insect bites. We are told by doctors here at allergy institute that more people need EpiPens and with the rising cost, it's causing major issues.

Vuong Nayima, allergist with Allergy Inst. P.C.:

"The problem is some of them don't want to carry an EpiPen. That's another big issue too. They don't want to pay for it and they're like, well if I have a problem I'll just go to the ER but you might not have enough time."

Doctors say about 10 years ago EpiPens cost about \$200 but today people pay up to \$500, but there are other options. Tonight on Local 5 News at 10, we'll tell you what you can use other than an EpiPen and how you can possibly lower the cost.

It's important to check the expiration date on your EpiPen.

Doctors say an expired medicine will not work to its full potential, if it even works at all.

Description: When Iowa switched from state-run Medicaid to privately managed care, the governor said there would be hiccups, but now, five months later, are things running as smoothly as they should? Some patients say no.

Michelle Meadors:

"I'm an educated, smart woman. I worked in the healthcare field all my life until this auto accident changed my life 5 years ago."

Michelle Meadors grabbed the attention of the crowded room at the state capitol. She wanted to make sure the lawmakers at the table heard her loud and clear. She says Iowa's new managed care system - isn't manageable at all.

"Who does it come down to? My government in Iowa. There is no one else to blame."

Senator Liz Mathis has listened to concerns since the state switched to managed care on April first.

Sen. Liz Mathis:

"I receive a lot of emails, requests, I've intervened, get a young boy an insulin pump, getting an orthotic, getting a doctor's appointment."

Lawmakers say there's no hope to go back to the old Medicaid system - so the best they can do is work with the three private managed care companies to make things better.

"What we can do is wait until the session begins, then change things by law."

In the meantime, about 560-thousand Iowans like Michelle have to do the best they can with what they have - for her that means using her own money to buy necessities like catheter bags, and waiting for parts for her wheelchair.

Michelle Meadors:

"I'm uncomfortable right now. I can't tell you how difficult it is to sit here because the pain, it's because we can't get service fast enough, they won't approve certain things." Lawmakers have confirmed that some care providers have had to go out of business because of the complications from switching to managed care, including getting paid. They say there are also doctors who've said they're not taking anymore Medicaid patients or any at all.

Local mental health advocacy groups are also looking for ways to keep patients out of jail, but it hasn't been easy. Executive Director of NAMI Iowa, Peggy Huppert had this to say: "A lot of people don't belong in jail or prison. They need help, they need treatment. So, that's what we work on."

Despite the efforts the jails are still filling up with mental health patients. In fact, a quarter of the inmates have been diagnosed with mental health disorders, although some experts believe the number is actually higher than that.

Description: New details emerge in the crash that happened last Thursday Des Moines police say Fernando Lopez Aguilar sped through a stop sign at Southeast 6th and Bell Avenue. Five people were sent to the hospital, one of those victims has died from her injuries. CW Iowa and Local Five have been working to uncover information about this deadly crash. We now have strong indications that the driver is in the US illegally. Plus, new documents show the driver of the car knew his brakes were faulty for days before the crash. The crash killed 12 year old Lea Phann of Des Moines. She fought for days in the hospital to survive. She was in a car when it was hit in a chain reaction accident. Police say the driver who caused the crash is 18 year old Fernando Lopez Aguilar. We've uncovered the criminal complaint showing that Aguilar knew his brakes weren't working for three days prior to the crash. When he went speeding through Bell Avenue last week, he knew he would be unable to stop quickly. Since Aguilar did not have a drivers license or insurance, Iowa senator Chuck Grassley is now asking for a full review of Aguilar's immigration and law enforcement history. CW Iowa asked senator Chuck Grassley about the deadly collision that took 12 year old Lea Phanns life late last week.

Sen. Chuck Grassley:

"I learned about that in the last couple of days from a whistleblower, who knew something about the accident."

The whistleblower allegedly told Grassley, prior to the incident, Aguilar had received deferred deportation protection under the Obama administration - but has since fallen out of status and is here illegally. Since hearing this, Grassley's requested Aguilar's complete immigration status, including past incidents with the law. But he said getting those documents from ICE and the Department of Homeland Security has not proven easy to get.

"A lot of agencies in this town, don't want negative information coming out of their agencies because they're number one goal is too look good"

However, ICE has reached out to the Polk County Sheriff's Office and the Polk County Jail.

Sgt. Bracelin:

"Shortly there after ICE contacted us and requested to notify them before he's released if he tried to post bond, currently his bond is 560 right now"

Bracelin said ICE has the ability to view incoming and current inmates within Polk County. CW Iowa asked Polk County about the possibility of ICE coming to get Aguilar to face his potential federal violations. Sergeant Bracelin tells me that he doesn't think that is likely.

"Firm believer people who've violated our laws been in accidents because people who are in this country, they should abide by the laws."

We also talked to a witness at the scene of the accident who says Aguilar had two children in the car with him. He faces one child endangerment charge right now for the eight-month-old in the car. The criminal complaint also contains witness statements showing there was another child in the car at the time. Police tell us they are investigating based on this information.

Description: First it was Louisiana, now Minnesota. For the second time in just two days this week, the justice department is asked to investigate a police-involved shooting that ended with a black man dead. The latest fatal shooting happened last night in Minnesota during a traffic stop, the aftermath of that shooting was streamed live on the internet. That video, viewed more than a million times, sparking outrage across the country. ABC's Elizabeth Hur is in New York with the details.

"Your people keep killing my people!"

Tensions boiling over...

"I want you to be real. This isn't black anger, this is black grief."

... and the Minnesota governor getting an earful from an angry and frustrated community.

"Our babies are dying, our babies are dying and I'm tired."

"Enough is enough! It stops here!"

Emotions running high following the fatal police shooting of 32-year-old Philando Castile during a traffic stop outside St. Paul - Castile's girlfriend in the car with her young daughter...

"I told him to get his hand off him."

"You told him to get his id and his drivers license."

... live-streaming the aftermath on Facebook.

"Nothing within his body language said kill me I want to be dead. He did not do nothing but what the police officer asked us!"

On Thursday, the Minnesota governor turning to the justice department for an independent review; just a day after the same request was granted for this police shooting in Louisiana. Police - responding to a disturbance call about a man brandishing a gun, shooting and killing 37-year-old Alton Sterling.

"I will not rest or not allow him to be swept in the dirt."

Back in Minnesota, the governor apologizing to castile's girlfriend doing little to calm the crowd.

"I can't tell you how sorry I am."

"I don't want you to more sorry. I want you to be more careful. We want justice."

All of the officers involved in Louisiana and Minnesota are now on paid leave.

This as the FBI director says, "the FBI will likely get involved with the case in Minnesota."

Everyone has questions and opinions on this issue. Things like how should Castile have communicated that he was carrying a weapon, what happened in the car before his girlfriend started streaming, and ultimately, we want to know what this means for Iowans. We spoke to Jack Bruner, a member of our community, who is pointing a finger at the how the justice system handled this situation. He had this to say:

"Too frequently we see them using their trigger fingers rather than something else and there are other ways of administering justice and I don't think violence and guns are the way to go about doing that."

Today, the Iowa state patrol directed us to a law that answers one question: if you are carrying a weapon, there is nothing in the Iowa state law that requires you to reveal that, although officers say it's always a good idea.

Description: A Polk County employee is under investigation after posts made on his social media accounts. Officials say 20 year old detention officer Alan Blaylock made Twitter and Facebook posts regarding a woman's race, the inmates he oversees, and his job within Polk County; including a comment about "murder over the woman's color of her skin."

The sheriff's office was made aware of the posts over the weekend. Blaylock started his job in March and was just promoted to full time. Officials say he has not had any complaints with inmates or other employees, but the posts are being investigated and taken seriously.

Sgt Brandon Bracelin from the Polk County Sheriff's Office said, "The posts that we've seen are concerning and most certainly inappropriate, in the fact he's a Polk County Sheriffs Office employee, we hold our employees to a higher standard as does the general public."

Blaylock is continuing to work at the jail for now. Depending on the investigation's findings, he could face ethics training, suspension, or termination.

Phyllis Young says she didn't think she'd see the day that would happen.

Phyllis Young:

"Back in 1974 we coordinated the first international treaty conference. There were about 5 thousand Indian people. I thought I would have to go to the spirit world to see over 200 flags together... I'm overwhelmed,"

But today a federal judge laid down a decision 200 nations didn't want to hear.

"We have been told no all of our lives... We are going to give the most of what we have in the positive sense in a peaceful way,"

For the people we spoke to today, it didn't matter which way the decision went. This battle was long from over.

"It's the beginning,"

Danielle Ta'Sheena Finn:

"Of course I feel we have the right. We need more time to get our act together, including us and the pipeline. We need to work together."

And after a statement issued by the Department of Justice, that might finally start to happen, but Young says there is still a long fight to be fought.

Description: Des Moines Public Schools are making a first in the country move in education. In the next three years, all sixty schools will be switching to something called 'Schools for Rigor,' focusing less on standardized testing. Teachers were in training today to learn how to better teach the students in this way. Six schools, from high school to elementary, are starting out the pilot program. It's more hands on, focusing on active lessons rather than note taking and basic reading. The program falls under the common core standards, therefore the schools won't be losing any federal funding under the change.

"Greatest change is teacher center, teachers doing heavy lifting and hard work to where students are engaged and are working hard, if not harder than the teacher."

By 2019, all sixty Des Moines schools will be under this curriculum. This new "rigor" program does fall in line with the federal common core standards, so federal funding isn't impacted. Des Moines schools head back to class on Wednesday. And so do West Des Moines, and Ankeny. Waukee, Urbandale and Southeast Polk go back tomorrow.
