The stations also broadcast numerous free announcements from non-profit community organizations who request such time to promote their causes.

We also execute a number of "on-location" broadcasts if the event warrants such activity. Catamount Radio believes that *public service is more than lip service*. We know we can encourage more people by example, rather than just more talk.

Sunday 4-9-2023 - @ 6am Duration: 30 minutes

Spot a Tick? And be careful...use the Vermont Department of Health (Tick Tracker)

Use the interactive Tick Tracker to share information about where and what kind of ticks you have found. Report on any ticks you come across — the more reports posted, the better the information for all! **Joining against the possibility of tick infestations.** Do your own personal research and verify... be careful and smart with social media.

Foraging:

Wild edibles are just beginning to emerge. You need to know what you are doing. Fiddleheads, Dandelion Greens, Cowslips and wild you name it. Some edibles have poisonous twins and they can make you sick. Learn about them from people who have experience, know how to prepare them. It can be quite a nice experience. **spoonuniversity.com**

Set up for Trout-this is just me. MAXIMA camouflage (its dark) leader 4 or 6 pound test. Main line 6 pound test. I use a very small barrel swivel between the main line and the leader. Now at the business end I like a 1/16th or 1/32nd oz jig **tungsten** because lead is a no-no now days. Colors and shapes are up to you.

High water more weight? Not necessarily. You can fish where the current is fast and powerful a rod tip away but the current will sweep your offering downstream and perhaps hang it up. Learn how to read the stream or brook, it's fun. There are:

Seams, Slicks, Glides, Quiet Pools, Tail-outs, Plunge-pools, Undercut banks, Riffles and other spots that you need to consider.

The biggest trout that I ever caught and released in the Castelton River I caught about a foot from where my boot was on the bank. Gently lowered the bait which was an emerald shiner at the time right in front of me, just like I was ice-fishing. I had a 6-foot spinning outfit. The fish came out from under the bank and we were off to the races.

Keep a dairy and you will be surprised what you might forget and learn about a successful technique.

Bullhead Fishing

These fish are much more picky and sophisticated than you might think. The next time you catch one hold it in your hand and look it over. This is a very interesting fish. First a word of caution, the bull head has an array of barbs than can inflict a painful puncture. One barb is under the dorsal fin and one each under the gill-fins.

Learn how to hold them and you will be ok. Two sensing fleshy whiskers if you will on either side of their mouth help this little cat fish find its way in the dark and smell its way along. This is a delicious food fish, very meaty, very tasty. They can be field dressed or filleted. Till next time get outdoors in Vermont and enjoy

The Vermont Trout Season is on. The Vermont Wild Turkey Season is just around the corner. Bullhead are being caught, Crappies (Calicos) are also about to stack in some of their favorite spots. Perch are also looking for some of their favorite spawning structure and weeds:

Tracking Ticks in Vermont healthvermont.gov

The Vermont Tick Tracker is a crowd-sourced tool that allows anyone to contribute to our understanding of ticks in Vermont. Ticks have become quite abundant in many parts of Vermont. Fourteen different tick species have been identified in Vermont, but only five are known to carry pathogens — such as bacteria, viruses, and parasites — that cause disease in humans. Climate change and other ecological changes may affect the distribution and abundance of these ticks. The Tick Tracker allows Vermonters to better understand and share how these changes may be occurring.

Fishing from a kayak is very cool you can maneuver them close to shore or anchor them off. The web is loaded with kayak sites and video. But I still respect the heck out of the people who own a flat bottom pram and want to catch bull head and pan fish. Some people own boats that decked out with the latest in technology, some troll for salmon and trout and some seek out bass and compete in contests.

A quick caveat, we as humans seem to function best with a body temperature of around 97-98 degrees F. Cold water emersion can change that dynamic quickly.

Understand the gasp-reflex, dress for cold water emersion and the very least wear a Coast-Guard Approved life vest, PFCD. Give yourself a chance if you happen to go in the drink. A pond, a stream and a lake or the ocean.

Even on dry land make sure you have safety gear in your kit. Plenty of info on the web. If your know Search and Rescue People....they will talk to you and share with you how to keep your family and you safe.

Panic make things worse. Fright, Flight, Fight. Making the best of a bad situation.

Sunday **4-28-2023 -** @ **6am Duration: 30 minutes**

The fish may be seen moving up the falls on warmer days beginning in mid-late April up until early May, according to the F&W department.

The best opportunities to see the jumping fish last for only a few days when water flow and temperature conditions are just right, according to fisheries biologists for the Department. "Many people may not realize we have opportunities to watch fish in Vermont just like there are for birds and mammals," Watch and be amazed. Vermont's annual trout fishing season began on April 8. However, the section of the Willoughby River from the downstream edge of the Orleans-Brownington Road Bridge to the top of the natural falls just upstream is closed to all fishing from April 8 to May 31. Do your fishing with a phone or camera only in the designated area and enjoy!

Turkey Season is just around the corner. Two jakes were in my neighbor's back yard here in the city. City slicker turkeys OMG.

Bears are out and about in a neighborhood near you.

The LCI Derby Guide Magazine is out and its Free-lots of information. You can pick one up at Field Sports right on 7 south of town.

Scout, scout and minimum calling, if any, **pattern your shot-gun**. Know your bird and where they are roosting, foraging and dusting. **Be tick smart.** See Greg and Vermont Field Sports in Middlebury for all your calls, cammo, ammo, shot-guns and binoculars, he can add some better sights and a host of other Turkey gear.

It is a beautiful location, 487 Furnace Rd. that honors the service of veterans by providing them perpetual recognition. The cemetery isn't just for veterans, though, as veterans' spouses and some dependents are also eligible for burial.

The VVMC has a large capacity for future interments. There are 110 acres at the VVMC. The 12-acre expansion funded by the National Cemetery Administration at the VVMC, includes a new 1,230-square-foot Public Information Center, a new 2,652-square-foot maintenance facility, new burial plots to include 410 pre-placed crypts for in-ground casket burials, 390 in-ground cremains plots, and 840 columbarium niches, for a total of 1,640 additional burial plots. Walleye fishing here in the State of Vermont.

First of all as you know, I often quote the writings of the late Harold F. Blaisdel and the wisdom laden comments of his late son Mike. Great guys, and real Vermonters. Both father and son were avid walleye fishermen and would ply the waters of Lake Champlain and other places in pursuit of the tasty fish.

Right now the State of Vermont has done a good job mitigating some of the sea lamprey predation on Walleye with lampricide application in the Vermont rivers where they breed. New York DEC has been a strong partner in this effort.

Bears are still doing their thing with night time foraging in Rutland. A recent cell phone pic of a burly bruin convinces me that really not much is being done to end the visits and some people are actually deliberately feed bears in the City of Rutland. We were also joined by Anthropologist Mark Boglioli and we discuss hunting culture in general and the long-stand traditions of Vermont's Hunting Culture.
