DESCRIPTION: BAD EATS: A Harmful Law For Animals & People. 99% of the meat and dairy products we eat in this country come from industrialized factory farms. By and large, these are terrible places for animals, and voters in some states have passed laws to make those farms a little more humane. Unfortunately, some in Congress are doing the bidding of big agriculture lobbies and trying to pass what is known as the EATS Act, which would effectively negate those state laws, and prevent others from being passed in the future. On this episode of Voices For The Animals, we'll talk with Wayne Pacelle, President of Center For A Humane Economy and Animal Wellness Action about EATS Act and what it means for animals and the safety of our food supply.

DESCRIPTION: On Mountain Lions: How to Embrace our Wild Predatory Relatives. We discuss the efforts to protect predators, particularly the mountain lion, who are still somewhat numerous, but declining fast in the world of sprawling housing developments and freeways. In this industrialized country, we have had a war on the wild; what we call "predators". Helicopter gunners shooting wolves to protect caribou herds in Alaska, or taking them out in Idaho to benefit elk. But really to benefit the human hunters who prey on the elk. Humans are the greatest threat to mountain lions. Every day is open season on mountain lions in Nevada. The majestic cats are under attack as prey for hunters, as unintended victims of traps set for bobcats, and as the primary target of a \$900,000 a year state-sponsored effort to cull species deemed problematic by the state. In California, close to 40 million people live within, or adjacent to, cougar habitat. Vehicle strikes, rat poison, inbreeding, wildfires, poaching, urban encroachment complaints, livestock depredation kill permits, and freeway systems are contributing to what scientists call an extinction vortex.

In this episode, we investigate the story of New York based attorney Steven Donziger who represented Ecuadorian communities demanding justice from Chevron-Texaco for one of the largest-ever oil disasters, where they deliberately dumped more than 16 billion gallons of toxic wastewater, spilled 17 million gallons of crude oil, and left hazardous waste in hundreds of open pits dug out of the forest floor. In a historic judgment, Chevron was found liable by Ecuadorian courts and ordered to pay \$9.5 billion. Chevron says it will never pay. We look into how Chevron, supported by US federal judges, is using retaliatory attacks against Mr. Donziger and the Ecuadorian People, and how their actions set a dangerous precedent and represent a growing and serious threat to the ability of civil society to hold corporations accountable for their misdeeds around the world.

Danny says, "We are the original caretakers of this land; being Indigenous, we've gone so far away from taking care of Mother Earth. We hadn't grown any plants here since before contact. Once contacted they took all our farming and we hadn't farmed since we started growing hemp. It's really quite amazing how it's been a big full circle moment".

Benally, 48, was an environmental and social activist as well as an acclaimed artist. He was a talented silversmith and a founder of the award-winning Indigenous punk rock group Blackfire along with his sister Jeneda and brother Clayson. The group, rooted in both Navajo traditional music and punk rock, railed against cultural, environmental and social injustice. He moved on to become one of Indian Country's strongest advocates for preserving sacred spaces, cleaning up abandoned mines, supporting Indigenous peoples' rights and reclaiming the Earth's health.

The Mayan peoples' traditional homelands were recovered after the armed uprising of the Zapatista Army of National Liberation (EZLN) in 1994 and are concrete evidence of how Zapatismo in Chiapas has improved the living conditions of the communities based on organization, autonomy, and self-determination. The federal lawsuit was filed after a year-long investigation alleging that when someone in the County experiencing a mental health crisis calls for help, the County routinely treats their health emergency like a crime, dispatching tactically-trained, armed law enforcement officers instead of trained mental health professionals. As a result, people with mental health disabilities in the County have been discriminated against, deprived of immediate medical care and are being unnecessarily exposed to citation, arrest, involuntary hospitalization, and police uses of force.

There is an overriding theme that 2023 represents: Collective Work and Responsibility: To build and maintain our community together and make our brothers and sisters' problems our problems and to solve them together.

Michael Twitty, reflects on black culinary tradition and its African roots.
