Eckert has defended the library's actions on how it handled the 'sensitive materials' debate which was sparked after some patrons complained about sex education books in the children's section.

The debate has evolved into a conversation on outright banning certain books from the library's circulation - especially some about the LGBTQ-plus community. He told KLEK-LP FM in Jonesboro that the library has done nothing wrong...
