Arkansas lawmakers have advanced a bill that would prohibit employers from requiring workers to be vaccinated against COVID-19. Members of the Senate Public Health, Welfare and Labor committee today (Fri) voted unanimously to advance Senate Bill 732, sponsored by Republican Sen. Blake Johnson of Corning. Johnson said his bill would allow people to refuse COVID-19 vaccines as a condition of employment or education for two reasons.

Johnson amended his bill to include other sources of funding for unemployment payments to people who get fired for not complying with a vaccine mandate. But UA Little Rock law professor Josh Silverstein (STINE not steen) says the proposal runs counter to traditional conservative ideals of limited government involvement in private businesses.

The bill passed on a voice vote and now goes to the full Senate for a vote. This comes as lawmakers are meeting to re-draw the state's four U-S Congressional districts, though the legislature adjourned for the weekend without taking action on any proposed district maps.
